House Bill 420 - Title IX Reporting for the 2024-2025 school year

Requires reporting of the following information each academic year:

- the number and type of interscholastic sports available at the school, by gender;
- the number of students competing in gender-designated interscholastic sports, by gender;
- participation discrepancy between males and females within gender-designated sports;
- the amount of spending that the school devotes to gender-designated sports;
- a comparison and evaluation of designated practice and game locations in gender-designated interscholastic sports.
- the amount of spending that the school devotes to each gender-designated sport reported in total amount and on a per student basis

House Bill 420 - Requirements for Identified Gender Gaps

• If there is a discrepancy between gender-designated sports of 10% or greater, the school develops an action plan to address the discrepancy.

Possible remedies to increase athletic participation:

- Try-out dates, contact information, and associated information for each sport clearly posted in visible areas.
- Active recruitment and improving our grass root programs.
- Separate cheer squads that support sports other than football and basketball. Those
 cheer members could help coordinate student sections and the cheerleaders. This
 would take some planning, but it's an area where schools could increase girls'
 participation levels.
- Coaches could encourage multiple sports participation. For example, a basketball player that needs improved conditioning could join the Cross Country team.
