Principal's Report

SISD **Food Service audit** was the end of October. We think the audit when well. One area that we can improve on is our Production Records. November 10th Teacher Inservice

Our certified staff came together at Thorne Bay School at the Nov 10th teacher inservice to train on the Measure of Academic Success (MAPS) testing instrument. Northwest Education Education Agency (NWEA) did a great job facilitating this training with our staff. With this training we now have a better understanding of interpreting and using the MAPS testing data to understand and modify our instruction to meet the individual needs of our students. Alan and I will be checking in with the teachers throughout the school year on how they are using this data to help drive their instruction.

CURRICULUM HIGHLIGHTS:

Our pre-school focus is language and social skills development and with their support, we continue fostering a school wide use of sign language. We continue to build upon success with the Daily Five (5) literacy and math instruction and dedicated Writers' Workshops. We are incorporating Visualizing and Verbalizing and Story Grammar

Marker across curriculum in our 1st though 12th grade classrooms to support their writing and reading comprehension skill development and enhancement

Holiday Dissections: Our 2017-2018 course of study includes World History social studies, science (life science, magnetism and electricity), literacy studies, art and music. We are completing Holiday Dissections as part of our world history studies. We utilize holidays as part of our studies as they are something that have present day relevance, is familiar, and is often part of our daily lives. A Holiday Dissection examines the holiday's origin, change over time, current practices and how and why those practices came about. The learning targets include: 1) I can make connections to understand how history may unfold and how history is documented. 2) I can unearth "change over time" and explain the impact of that change on history as we know it today. 3) I can explain the relevance of current practices to our history.

Writing our story: We will continue to use primary source documents, fieldwork and information from elders to map our world's true story and they will evaluate the question, "Who determines our history?" In doing so they are starting by exploring their own story and identifying who they are as learners. Our school is in the middle of completing their books about their efforts to prevent the use of [pesticides on the island. For Upper Intermediate, Junior High and High School their next step is to travel to Juneau and give copies of their books to Governor and the members of the Legislature. They also plan to deliver copies ort every town and school library in the state.

<u>Social Thinking</u>: We have started a school wide exploration Michelle Garcia Winner's Social Thinking work to help our students understand and master the social communication soft skills that are key in our changing world. They are also learning about expected and unexpected behaviors and their impact. The books are available at Hollis School should anyone wish to view them.

Authentic, Place-based Citizen Science Activities:

- Journey North our Primary students are taking the lead on the Virtual Butterfly Migrations, Tulip Test Gardens and seasonal wildlife, weather and daylight observations.
- National Weather Service: Our Junior High and High School students helped to launch our assumption of the duties to operate the Hollis Weather Station. Our Intermediate students have been trained and are assuming daily responsibility for this operation.
- Trees: Our Intermediate students will be taking the lead for caring for our steklings to support this critical research.
- Wolves: This is our second year and our Junior High and High School student are more than prepared to take the lead for this project.

New activities in November:

Bird Expeditions: On November 13, 2017 we will be launching a school wide e bird expedition – Primary learning targets address the tools to learn developmentally

appropriate research skills and requirements and nonfiction report writing. We are building upon our work at the 6+ Traits workshop to support their skill development. Our focus will be on quality and reading to learn and writing to learn. The research will result in a poster for Primary students, an Essay for Intermediate and a Paper with citations for Junior High and High School Students. The project will culminate with a sculpture where they will utilize that they learned about adaptations to create their own bird. They will then write another paper explaining their sculpted bird and the purpose of the adaptations selected. After the winter break, they will launch our winter short story focus as they write a story about the bird they created.

DIVE: We know that when a wave comes at us, Hawks "go deep" - we dive into the problem. Thus our student aptly named their Directed Learning time "DIVE TIME" – Diverse, Independent, Vital, Exploration Time. This Week we are launching our 2017-2017 Junior High and High School DIVE time – students will begin writing their applications as they reflect upon their goals and narrow their focus. Project proposals will be presented to the DIVE Team who will provide intentional feedback. Proposals are revised until accepted and then the real work begins.

TESTING AND GOALS:

With MAPS and AIMS completed and PEAKS data on hand, Junior High and High school students will be examining their data to help them inform their academic and character goals.

ACTIVITIES:

Hollis Hoops Project:

We have almost met project funding goal with ten of our twelve hoops funded. When we reach the required funds (\$600.00) we will launch the project.

As we shared in last month's report - This is a chance to share in a phenomenal integrated learning experience for everyone at Hollis School while also providing a wonderful addition to the Hollis School Cross-Generational Outdoor Lifelong Fitness and Play Area designed by Hollis students and members of the Hollis Community. Hollis students will design and build a giant State of Alaska backboard with standard and small sized basketball hoops that will be located on the backboard to represent different communities on the map. To make this happen we are selling twelve (12) hoops with nets that we anticipate will represent twelve (12) Alaska communities to include but not limited to: Hollis, Juneau, Fairbanks, Seward, Anchorage. Student planning may change the selected hoop locations but they cannot change the number of hoops. All investors will be recognized with a student created "Map Key". We already have 3 investors. After the nine remaining and nine remaining slots to fund and then we will launch our project. Guided by learning targets our students will form a team to plan, organize, manage budgets and supplies, design and build the Alaska Hoops Project! They will also provide investor reports. NOTE: We have contacted all of our donors and they have affirmed their continued support as we strive to complete fundraising. We notified them that the project may now be delayed until spring when both funding and weather will be suitable to support

successful project completion.

Dancing with the Spirit: We had a great week with Dancing with the Spirit. Everyone challenged themselves to try something new and everyone, bar none, cited the well attended Ho Down as a highlight. We are so appreciative of the support if our community. Reflection is an important part of the Hollis School culture. After thoughtful sharing about their Dancing with the Spirit experience our Hawks used their growth mindset to complete a watercolor reflection of their experience. This was a "quick paint" – one draft, no "re-do's" – every "mistake was an opportunity to fine its purpose and add to the quality of the work. Every Hawk did a phenomenal job letting go of their desire for perfection and allowing the art to just be. When they shared their work all of them saw how what they had at first seen as devastating mistakes were in the end, lovely additions to their work.

And what did they share about their DWTS experience? Here is what they said about how the instructors, music, dance and support from their community inspired them:

- They were willing to stretch themselves to support us and that feels pretty good.
- I am more willing to try new things. They were willing to be e vulnerable in front of others and so I now have the courage to d be vulnerable when learning something new.
- There are more people out there than I thought there were that will listen.
- They made me feel that no matter how hard something is, I should give it a try because they were willing to do that for us.

Hollis students were interviewed by KBRD for a recent story about Dancing with the Spirit.

Chickens: Sadly we lost a large number of chickens during two mink raids. We trapped the mink and rebuilt the floor and are hopeful we have now sufficiently re-enforced coop to keep them safe. We have some new pullets and more on the way. We hope to soon have our egg production back on track so that we can meet community demand.

Garden: After we completed reading the book, "Seedfolk" Sam began working with our students to complete some initial planning for the 2018 garden. He has been using some of the new curriculum to support student learning in the garden. He has spent much of the past few weeks completing our fall harvest while also locating and adding seaweed and cardboard to put the garden to bed for the winter. Thanks to Gale Force Gardens we have over 100 daffodil bulbs and we are working with our students to get them planted to ensure our SS Hollis will be sailing in a sea of yellow in the spring.

Morning Community: Morning Community continues to evolve under student leadership. We are proud of their efforts to ensure every child is heard. Their daily reflection is meaningful and their planning allows their work to continue to blossom.

Respectful Discourse Accountable Talk: Our students have long worked on using accountable talk strands to improve their writing as well as support their ability to conduct discussions and provide helpful feedback.

This year Hollis Junior High and High School students raised the bar as they have committed to participate in discussion to add to and deepen their and others' learning. They have been perplexed by some of the public discourse by citizens, the media and even our elected leaders that they have been exposed on the media and feel they and their peers can help to change the climate from one of angry tones that build walls to one that strives for a "culture of respectful discourse." They reviewed many strands to support this goal and created a guide that they believe will support them in their efforts to engage in respectful and inclusive discourse. They are so committed to their use that they elected to hang their strands from the ceiling above their conference table so they are always reminded of the importance of their careful use until such time that they can effectively use the strands and meet the learning targets with automaticity *Archery*: Our students have excitedly transitioned to archery with Coach George Vasquez and newly certified Assistant Coach Sam.

Basketball: We had three students commuting to Thorne Bay to practice and play on a three school combined Thorne Bay SISD Middle School basketball team. Thank you to our carpooling parent and Coach Gunkel for a great experience. Our younger students are practicing with Coach Sam and are excited for the elementary basketball season to get underway. They also cannot wait for our next indoor soccer season.

CELEBRATES:

Basketball: We want to thank Coach Gunkel for his caring work with the students as they worked hard. We celebrate that they won the 2017 Island Tournament and came in second at the Shoenbar Shootout!

School Board: Kimejoe Lambeth has been sworn in as a member of the Southeast Island School District Board of Education. We are proud of her efforts and her commitment to understand each item before she votes so she has arranged to review all documents and have a briefing to ensure she is informed. We are excited about her commitment to work with her colleague, fellow student Board representative Abigail Hills to be a voice and advocates for all district students! Way to go Kimejoe!

Carrs Safeway Grant: We are excited to share Hollis received a \$5000.00 Carrs Safeway grant to support the Upper Immediate, Junior High and High School students' work to take their work to prevent the use of pesticides to a new level. Last year they realized sometimes you need to allow others to join in the take ideas to where they can have the most impact and it its with their published books and their anticipated journey to Juneau that they will see their work realized.
