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November Board Report Dr. Keri Launius, Executive Director of Academics

This report provides an update on the key efforts undertaken by the Academics Department over the past month, focusing on instructional consistency, strategic campus planning, and data-driven decision-making across the district as we progress through the fall semester.

Strategic Implementation of Core Curriculum

A significant focus this month has been driving the deeper implementation of high-quality instructional materials (HQIM) through the Strong Foundations Implementation Plan. We are working in close partnership with Education Service Center (ESC) Region 4 to ensure the successful rollout of the Bluebonnet Curriculum across our elementary grades. This collaboration with Region 4 is critical to ensure our curriculum fidelity meets the state's highest standards, laying a solid foundational basis for literacy and mathematics instruction.

In parallel with curriculum planning, we have intensified our campus-level support. We are utilizing embedded Region 4 supports, Product Advisors, to provide targeted, in-classroom coaching and professional development. This team is currently deployed at Stewart Elementary and Hitchcock Primary schools, working directly with our teachers on best practices for mathematics and literacy instruction. This model provides immediate, job-embedded support, helping teachers translate training into effective classroom practices and accelerate student learning in these critical areas.

I have dedicated substantial time this month to working individually with all principals on their strategic objectives. Our meetings have focused on defining their campus goals and identifying the instructional and resource needs necessary for the 2025-2026 school year. Furthermore, we are refining the principals' use of formative assessment data to make real-time, responsive adjustments to their Campus Improvement Plans (CIPs). This ensures that our CIPs are dynamic working documents, reflecting our commitment to continuous, data-informed improvement rather than static annual requirements.

I had the distinct pleasure of conducting campus visits across all five of our campuses (Kids First Head Start, Hitchcock Primary, Stewart Elementary, Crosby Middle, and Hitchcock High School) to build relationships with principals and deepen my understanding of each campus's unique culture and instructional priorities. Observing our dedicated teachers and strong campus leaders in action is invaluable, reinforcing the strengths we can leverage and highlighting areas where targeted support is most needed. Finally, the department is initiating crucial data work: I am collaborating with Mrs. Stall to develop new data trackers. These trackers will enable a robust comparative analysis of our Beginning of Year (BOY) data between the 2024-2025 and 2025-2026 school years, providing the Board with quantifiable metrics on early academic trends and the impact of our current interventions.

The Academics Department remains committed to ensuring every Hitchcock ISD student receives an excellent education through strategic planning, deep instructional coaching, and a strong focus on data-driven results.

FOOTBALL

In a dazzling display of gridiron magic, senior defensive back Brian Harris electrified Class 3A as the Texas Built Ford Tough Player of the Week for Week 5. Brian Harris snagged three jaw-dropping touchdowns—a lightning-fast kickoff return, a pick-six interception, and an opportunistic fumble scoop-and-score. Cook Ford General Manager, Anthony Loya beamed with pride as he handed Brian the gleaming award at the fieldhouse just days ago. This standout performance catapults Harris into elite company, earning him an invitation to a star-studded January banquet at The Star—the iconic Dallas Cowboys training facility—where he could claim the coveted Class 3A Texas Built Ford Tough Player of the Year title.

The football team will start the playoffs on Thursday, November 13th vs Little River Academy in Hempstead. This is the fourth year in a row we have played Little River Academy in the first round of the playoffs. The team is looking forward to the challenge ahead.

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October 2025 SRO Monthly Report

Wednesday, October 1st

- Threats made towards a HS student. Offense report taken.
- Two HS students were engaged in a heated verbal disturbance. Officer intervened and deescalated the incident.
- HS student reported receiving a message from a fake phone number. Ongoing issue between 4 HS students.

Thursday, October 2nd

- Parents of an HS student requested additional disciplinary action against another student from an incident that occurred last school year. Parent was advised that corrective measures were taken at the time and no further incidents have occurred.
- Recovered lost/stolen cell phone from the fieldhouse.
- Assisted Hitchcock PD officer with combative subject in the 6600 block of Wayne Johnson.
- HS student was found walking down the railroad tracks. Student advised he just finished with cross-country and decided to leave early. Referred to admin.
- HS student was issued a cease and desist order and entered into a stayaway agreement with another student.

Friday, October 3rd

- Two HS students were issued stayaway agreements due to a previous fight.
- HS student reported a lost/stolen phone.
- HS student made an outcry of self-harm ideation. Parent was contacted and parent took student for evaluation.
- Two CMS students were playing with a paper airplane, another student took the airplane away from one of the students playing with it. The third student would not return the airplane student and struck the other student in the head with a steel mug when the student attempted to retrieve the airplane. Assault Causing Bodily Injury charge filed.
- A HS student instigated a fight between two other students during the pep rally. Referred to admin.

Monday, October 6th

- A tip was received about a student in possession of a Vape. Admin search of the student and possessions was conducted with no contraband being located.
- Gulf Coast Center evaluated a PES student after she made claims to want to hurt another student.

Tuesday, October 7th

- Officer deescalated disturbance between two HS students when one was pushed by their friend and bumped into another student.
- A stayaway agreement was issued after a mutual assault at the previous weeks football game. Parents declined charges being filed.
- Complaint issued to CMS student after he repeatedly grabbed a female student and asked her if she wanted to kiss him.
- Two PES students were found to be fighting outside the building. Referred to admin due to ages of the students.
- A parent was issued a criminal trespass warning due to aggressive and abusive behavior over an incident involving his Son.
- A verbal disturbance on bus 5 where a student reportedly made a serious threat. Video was reviewed and the threat could not be heard.

Wednesday, October 8th

- A HS student reported harassment over personal issues. Incident referred to admin.
- A P3 tip resulted in an administrative search of the DAEP room. No contraband was located during the search.

Thursday, October 9th

- A threat assessment was completed on a HS student due to verbal threats made.
- An administrative search was conducted on a HS student due to a vape detection alert. The student was found to not be in possession of contraband.
- The parents of a HS student requested an administrative search due to suspected narcotic possession. The parents further requested a stayaway agreement be issued for another student due to inappropriate online activity. Referred to admin.
- Two HS students were interviewed regarding a threatening comment. It was found that both students were joking around when one made an off the cuff statement. The threat was found to be not credible.
- Vehicle unlock for a HS student. Student signed a liability waiver and the vehicle was successfully unlocked.
- Two HS students were reported by staff for gambling on school property. One student had already been issued a warning for past similar conduct. The student was issued a complaint for misdemeanor gambling.

Friday, October 10th

- Officer completed an information report on their involvement in an administrative investigation. A meeting will be held regarding possible further LE involvement.
- An administrative search of a HS student was conducted due to a vape detection alert. The student was not found to be in possession of contraband.
- Officer purchased and donated shoes as well as several articles of clothing to a student in need.

Friday, October 17th

- A non-Hitchcock ISD student incited a disturbance with HISD fans due to ongoing tensions between multiple students. The incident was handled by Hitchcock PD officer working the game. The male was later identified and issued a criminal trespass warning for all HISD campuses.

Monday, October 20th

- A HS student reported receiving an Instagram message from a former student wanting to fight. This incident stems from ongoing tensions between several students. The student was referred to Hitchcock PD, due to the incident not occurring on campus.
- A HS student made an outcry of sexual assault. Incident was referred to Child Protective Services and Hitchcock PD.
- A HS student was subjected to an administrative search due to a vape detector alert. The student was found to be in possession of a THC vape. The student was charged with felony possession of a controlled substance and was transported to the Galveston County Juvenile Justice Center.
- An allegation of harassment at the 4H barn was reported by two HS students. The incident was investigated and was unfounded. While the person(s) were found to be in the Crosby parking lot, they were merely picking up a CMS student and were not even remotely close to the students.

Tuesday, October 21st

- Officer investigated a reported harassment at the 4H barn. Video was located that proved the incident to be unfounded. This incident is related to ongoing issues between 4 HS students and their families.
- Officer intervened and deescalated a verbal disturbance between HS students. Incident was referred to administration.
- A CMS student was reportedly slapped while on a school bus. Video was reviewed and the assault did occur. The student was slapped on the right side of his face with an open palm. Parents wished to file charges and a complaint was issued for assault physical contact.
- A CMS student was found to be in possession on a knife. Student advised that it was from a camping trip he took over the fall break. The student's story was confirmed and the incident was referred to administration.

Wednesday, October 22nd

- Fire alarm sounded at SES campus. The building was evacuated and the alarm was found to be false. Low water pressure in the fire suppression system is believed to have been the reason for the alarm.
- Officer conducted an investigation into an incident that occurred prior to fall break. A CMS student reported that another student spit on her face. Video footage did not support the allegation, students were referred to administration due to their behavior in the footage.

Thursday, October 23rd

- Officer assisted staff with unlocking and ISD vehicle.
- After receiving a vape alert in the HS café restroom, an administrative search was conducted. HS student was found to be in possession of a THC vape. The student was taken into custody for possession of controlled substance PG2 and was transported to the Galveston County Jail.

Friday, October 24th

- Officer investigated a reported assault that occurred on the HS campus. Security footage was reviewed and the incident was unfounded, the students were play fighting. Incident referred to administration.
- Officer conducted an initial investigation into a reported family violence incident. Officer concluded that the offense occurred in La Marque. The student was provided with a Notice to Adult Victims of Family Violence and information for the Galveston County Resources & Crisis Center. The offense was referred to La Marque Police Department.

Monday, October 27th

- Officer and administration at CMS are investigating inappropriate comments made to a female student by a male student. Additional students are being spoken with to determine if there are witnesses. Parents will be contacted and criminal charges are possible.
- Officers assisted a parent that went into labor while in the pickup line at PES. Parent was taken to the hospital by a friend.
- HS student reported that he was pushed by another student while walking to the bus ramp. Video was reviewed and the incident was confirmed and the other student was identified. The reporting student found the contact to be offensive and he wished to file charges. The other student was issued a complaint for assault by physical contact.

Tuesday, October 28th

- Officer intervened in a verbal disturbance during lunch at the HS. Incident referred to administration.
- A parent was issued a criminal trespass warning for all HISD campuses following threats of physical harm made towards a HS administrator.

Wednesday, October 29th

- A parent of a HS special education student reported to LE that he daughter has been experiencing inappropriate contact from a SMS student while on the bus route. The brothers of the female HS student ride the same bus and reported the incident to their mother. Initial investigation found that the student in question has already been isolated for approximately 2 weeks due to touching other students. At this time the investigation is ongoing. Approximately one month of video footage is being reviewed.
- HS student reportedly violated a stay away agreement. This is an ongoing dispute between 4 HS students and their parents. Incident referred to administration.
- Officer was notified that a HS student was receiving messages attempting to instigate a fight at school. The investigation revealed that the messages were part of an ongoing family dispute.

Thursday, October 30th

- HS student made physical contact with a teacher after being told to leave for disciplinary purposes. The teacher declined to file charges, the incident was referred to administration.
- Officer gave a Halloween safety presentation to Kid's First Head Start students.
- A teacher reported a road rage incident at arrival. The teacher advised that the vehicle was honking at her while on the roadway. Video was found of a white car, believed to be driven by a male, enter the PES parking lot behind the teacher. The vehicle drives into the main parking lot, makes a U-turn and exits the parking lot. No license plate could be obtained from the video.

- HS student was found to be in possession of a THC vape. The student was taken into custody for possession of a controlled substance penalty group 2 and was transported to the Galveston County Juvenile Justice Center.

Friday, October 31st

- Officer intervened and deescalated a verbal disturbance between HS students.
- Verbal disturbance involving a HS student using profane and abusive language towards a teacher. The teacher opted to have administration handle the incident, instead of filing a charge for disorderly conduct.
- Officer assisted a student in obtaining temporary housing through the Galveston County Resource and Crisis Center. Student removed herself from home due to family violence issues in the household.
- HS student threatened to kill another student after she took his seat in the cafeteria. Administration suspended the student and a threat assessment is pending.
- At the conclusion of the senior football game, an angry parent approached coaching staff and began to insult, use abusive language and threatened one of the coaches. AD brought the incident to my attention and requested the parent be escorted off campus and further suspended from coming back. The parent was aggressive in nature and used abusive language towards officers when he was requested to leave. The following Monday the parent was issued a criminal trespass warning for all HISD educational campuses, at the request of HS administration.
