

Instructional Coaches

December is almost over! A lot of eventful things have taken place during this month. At the beginning of the month our reading consultant Debbie Hunsaker came to visit. During her visit she met with the intervention PDSA teachers and reviewed a few things, including a review of student progress checks as well as establishing next steps for goal setting. We also were able to conduct a few ELA walkthroughs in both 4th and 5th grade classrooms. We are happy to report that our consultant is pleased with the maintenance of our ELA block and that we have implemented the recommendations made by our literacy audit. We discussed our coaching cycles and how that was progressing with each coach. Both of the instructional coaches have been working hard to help complete the WIDA testing.

Every year, the instructional coaches take charge of doing some fun activities with the staff before the Christmas break, so we continued our tradition by having Secret Santa and a Christmas food contest. Secret Santas were revealed during our final PD session and a great time was had by all.

We currently have two active coaching cycles and will complete follow ups with other staff members in need of support in the new year. Merry Christmas and a prosperous new year to all!

Counseling Center

Greetings from the Napi Counseling Center! The center strives to provide a school counseling program that is aligned to the American School Counselors Association (ASCA) and is designed to improve student outcomes. "The ASCA National Model: A Framework for School Counseling Programs" outlines the components of a school counseling program that are integral to the school's academic mission and was created to have a significant positive impact on student achievement, attendance and discipline. The center uses a 3 tiered approach to delivering services.

Tier I (all students) - All students in grade 4 participate in the Character Education Class as part of the specials rotation. The Character Education Classes utilize the Second Step Curriculum and students are currently learning how our brains and bodies react to strong emotions and things we can do to calm down before reacting. The lessons support our Kindness Campaign and are a foundational part of our MTSS in creating a positive school environment for all of our students at Napi Elementary.

Tier II and III (some students based on need) - Supportive Services are provided to students based on need. These services include; Dessa Small Groups, Individual Check and Connect, Tamarack Grief Groups, Clothing Closet, Youth Dynamics Case Management and Weekend Food Program for students who have been identified. Dessa Small Groups are conducted on Tuesday and Thursdays and students have participated in lessons on using their positive voice and inclusion during the month of December. There are currently 10 students being served by individual check and connects on Monday and Wednesday. The fall Tamarack Grief Groups, for students who have experienced loss and are grieving just wrapped up with 10 students completing the activity.Our emergency clothing closet is stocked with winter coats, gloves, hats, school clothing and undergarments and personal hygiene supplies. Students stop in and grab what they need at the end of the school day and we work very hard to find items that we are either out of or don't stock. It is the goal of the Counseling Center to be an on-stop location to support our students and to remove barriers to student academic success.

During the month of December, the Counseling Center also served as a hub for the Toys for Tots program and all Napi students received 2 gifts provided by our local veterans.

Spookinaapi Project

During the month of December Spokinaapi Specials worked on Christmas ornaments while having discussions about making healthy-decisions and self-regulation. The students seem to enjoy working on something as we collectively discuss ways to self-regulate when emotions may feel intense. The month went by so fast that I wanted to do something fun with them before they left for their winter break.

Spokinaapi also assists in helping with Dessa Groups that focus on social emotional learning. I try to do fun activities with the students that they can work on as I do a lesson from the Aperture Education System. Some of the lessons are too long for the time frame of groups so I take key components from the lessons and focus on those subjects. Spokinaapi also creates a space for lunch groups during both grades, that allows students to spend their recess in the Spokinaapi office playing board games, kinetic sand, coloring, and playing with the doll house.

For the Month of December it was my turn to facilitate the Student Council meetings with students. Students gather to form their opinions related to things that are going well in the school and things that they feel need improvement. This group of students had great ideas and examples of positive things going well at Napi. Their focus was primarily on commending the staff here at Napi for making learning fun and providing activities. They also commented how the staff focus on the positive behaviors of students and provide attention to that behavior and they feel it will encourage all students to seek positive seeking behaviors.
