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COVID News Update 07/01/2020

The nation's top infectious disease expert told a Senate committee the U.S. could see 100,000 new cases of COVID-19 daily if behaviors don't change. Currently, the U.S. is reporting around 40,000 new cases a day, mainly across the South and the West. That figure has climbed sharply recently. The NYT calculates that the number of new cases has grown 80% in the past two weeks. Deaths from COVID-19 are still going down, but that could change as time goes on and hospital beds run on short supply.

Limiting the spread

Governments inside the U.S. and out have taken steps to keep the virus from spreading beyond hotspots. For the first time in months, the EU is opening its borders today to 15 countries...but visitors from the U.S. (and Brazil, Russia, and more) are not allowed because of their COVID-19 situation.

New York, New Jersey, and Connecticut, states that "went through hell" early on in the pandemic, are not keen on going back. Yesterday, they doubled their list of quarantine-restricted states to 16, and this week New Jersey pushed back its reopening of indoor dining.

Late Monday, Arizona followed recent moves by Florida and Texas in closing some businesses including bars. Los Angeles has closed beaches and banned fireworks displays for the upcoming July 4 weekend.

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
