Principal & Director Reports

January 2008

A.C. Houghton Elementary

We had incredible participation by our parents and community in December for our Christmas programs. We have long since outgrown our cafeteria seating and/or in the ability to do our program in one night. We did two programs, one preschool-first-grade, and one grades 2-4. Attendance for the lower grades was a little over 500 and for the upper grades 550 plus. These are the largest programs we've ever had.

After-School Program Changes

During January were going to be adding some programs to our after-school extended learning opportunity. We are gearing up to offer extra help to students who have not yet passed their math and reading benchmarks. Reading scores are in extremely good shape but we need to do a lot of extra work in math. We are going to add what we will call a benchmark math section for the third and fourth grade participants. In order to do this, we will be adding some educational assistant time, within our budget available, and we will be temporarily exiting some students who have been participating but who have either passed their benchmarks already or are very close to passing. This hopefully will make room for approximately 35 slots for this involvement in benchmark math improvement. We will be concentrating on the problem-solving vocabulary and the mathematical operations necessary to do the appropriate grade level benchmark math.

Buck and Elizabeth

Last year the musical duo of Bach and Elizabeth were here for four days. They will be working with our third and fourth grade students writing and recording unique songs for their grade level. This is a tremendous musical experience and the CD of original songs that they produced sold out last year, purchased by our parents and staff, which helped a little bit to fund their visit. We are looking forward with great anticipation to their visit.

Geography Bee

This year's Geography Bee will be held in the middle of January. Our winning students will compete in countywide competition. This is a test of geography skills at an international and national level.

Morrow County Ski Program

The 14th year of the Morrow County Ski Program, a four Saturday skiing experience for families and individual students, will begin January 5. If you know anybody in the county interested in going, please have them call John Sebastian at 922-3321, at ACH.

- ➤ Josh Browning our Jr. High LA teacher will be attending a Power Standard workshop at the ESD for several days working on the standards that mean the most when teaching. He will bring back what he learns and share his findings with our staff and take on a leadership role of sharing information district wide with our LA Professional Learning Community.

Student Multi-Disciplinary Team

In the time school starts and by the time we have enough referrals and students identified with behavior issues, it's about November when we see the need to go to the next the professional level of serious intervention. Behavior of students is getting much better. This team of parents, teachers, counselors and school administration come together and create a plan to help the child change and be more successful at school.

Reading Implementation Plan

In December's in-service day, our staff met to create more time in the school schedule to teach more math, and also to create a plan on implementing the newly purchased reading curriculum. I am confident that our teachers are focusing in on the exact math and reading standards which are most pertinent in showing the best results in student achievement.

Family Education Night Finale

On December 11 we had our last night of the Family Education Night in IES. We will resume the first week in February. We celebrated a pot-luck dinner and we gave out awards to our student and teacher volunteers. There were about 40 people present. People are encouraged and continuing to attend classes in two levels of English, US Citizenship and tutor classes for children in school. We plan to start again in February.

IES Christmas Concert

We celebrated our 5th & 6th Grade concert last month. There were over 150 people in attendance. Our local PTO provided refreshments and cookies. People stayed and had a great time talking; staff attended as well. It was a nice time talking with parents. The kids amazed me on how well they really played. It was a nice success.

Battle of the Books

To promote reading, about 80 students and 10 staff members have gotten together to start the Battle of the Books program which was in our school action plan of improvement. Students have been given a list of books and the books to read and have battles of answering questions. The winners will be given movie passes and enjoy being the champions of the program. I myself was also requited to be a reading coach by a group of 5th graders. We're making reading fun and competitive here at IES.

Academic Assembly

Financial Aid Night

In early December our counselor, Johanna Davis, arranged for BMCC to present to parents the needed items for college financial aid. The presentation focused on the Federal and state resources available to students. It was information that any student could use, not just students attending BMCC. As the meeting ended the parents were encouraged to stay behind and log onto the computers and set up PIN numbers for their FAFSA forms which students can begin to turn in January 1st. The presentation was attended by 20-30 parents and students.

Knowledge Master Open is designed to stimulate learning and recognition for academic achievement. The Knowledge Master Open runs on a classroom computer to allow a team of students the opportunity to compete in a large academic event without the expense of traveling to a central site. The competition is presented twice each school year by Academic Hallmarks, a Colorado software publisher. WRE competes as a team against thousands of students in the U.S. and several foreign lands at both the state level and the national level. The team faces the computer to answer 100 questions in the event, which earns them points for speed and accuracy of their answers. The winter contest will be January 23 and the spring contest will be in March.

National Geographic Bee, a nationwide contest for schools in the United States for grades four through eight. There are three levels of competition: **school**, **state**, **and national**. The winner of the school level competition will go on to take a test to compete against others at the State level and then on to the National level if he or she is the state winner.

The preliminary competition was held December 22, 2007. **The Preliminary Competition** consisted of seven Preliminary Rounds of 30 questions each. The top ten students from the Preliminary Competition will advance to the **Final Competition** to be held *on January 16* in Windy River Elementary's gymnasium. It should be a lot of fun and very challenging.

Windy River Elementary gave away three bicycles at the December Student of the Month Assembly. Students who met their benchmark during the first round of testing in November were eligible for the bikes. We had a drawing for 4th grade, 5th grade and one for 6th grade. There were over 40 names in

Sam Boardman Elementary


