School Operations Updates

Facilities Department

Key Highlights:

- April was a busy month with several utility-related issues and inclement weather causing flooding, tree damage, and a partial power outage.
- A total of 333 requests were made in Operation Hero during the month of April, compared to 260 in March, 297 in February, and 294 in January.
- Key incidents included:
 - The campuses experienced a partial outage due to severe weather on the weekend of April 4th, which lasted until Monday afternoon, April 7th.
 - A sixty-foot portion of the sanitary sewer waste line on the North end of Bradley had to be removed and replaced due to breaks. This revealed an unaccounted waste line on the "Utilities Package" drawings, allowing DCI engineers to update their drawings and avoid a costly oversight.
 - The severe storm in early April caused damage to several trees and flooding in the basements of two buildings.
 - Vandalism occurred at Reed High School's North façade glass door, with a rock thrown at the glass door sometime between the evening of April 28th and the early morning of April 29th.

Maintenance and Repairs:

- Routine maintenance involved disassembling and relocating three metal carports and removing two dead Oak trees.
- Emergency repairs included addressing a partial outage, storm damage to trees, a blocked drain causing sewage overflow, water intrusion in the Helen Keller Admin building, and repairs to gas and water lines cut by a demolition contractor.
- Preventive maintenance included work on air-cooled chillers and trash pickup.

Facilities Improvement Projects:

• Planned projects for summer include installing tankless water heater racks to improve energy efficiency and relocating the department to the ASB Maintenance Shop.

Safety and Compliance:

- All fire extinguishers were inspected in April as required by state mandate.
- Safety initiatives will follow the completion of OSHA 30 training.

Resource Management:

• Budget details were not provided.

Energy and Sustainability:

- No energy usage report.
- Sustainability initiatives are covered in the facilities improvement projects.

Staffing and Training:

• The department remains understaffed, with a maintenance tech position declined due to low pay and a skilled tradesman position unfilled.

Challenges & Opportunities:

- Aged buildings and extensive landscaping.
- An unused CAW water account was closed, saving \$77.36 per month.

Other Relevant Information:

• The buildout for the OperationsHERO EVENTHQ module will be completed this summer, with adjustments to the "FT" workflow for field trip requests.

Challenges and Struggles:

- Academic challenges include the need for more curriculum alignment and specific pacing guides.
- Behavioral challenges stem from a variety of reasons, but all have the common factor of extremely delayed language development. These behaviors are also influenced by external factors such as family dynamics.
- Resource challenges include facility issues like restroom repairs and odors.
- We are continuing to search for more effective, fun recess activities for K-5 students.

Action Plan for Improvement:

- A survey will be sent out soon asking teachers, paras, and therapists for ideas and suggestions.
- Academic goal: Gauge utilization of HQIM materials.
- Behavioral goal: Encourage the use of de-escalating techniques and support VB-MAPP.

- School culture goal: Promote respect among students.
- Strategies include collaboration between the SEL team and Lower School teachers, and analyzing classroom data to understand behavior incidents.

As we approach the final weeks of the 2024-2025 school year, the Related Services Department remains highly active and deeply involved in supporting our students' success. This period is filled with annual IEP meetings, Evaluation Programming Conferences, and continued interdisciplinary collaboration to ensure appropriate services and placement decisions for the upcoming school year. Our team is committed to attending, contributing to, and facilitating these essential meetings for our students and their families.

In addition to our core responsibilities, our department has enjoyed participating in numerous end-ofyear events and student field trips. These opportunities allow our staff to support students in generalizing communication, motor, and social-emotional skills in real-world settings. We are proud to highlight several special milestones and outreach efforts within our team:

- **Millie's Retirement**: Millie, our beloved Physical Therapist, will retire at the end of the school year. She began her career at ASD in March 1998 and has been a tireless advocate and service provider for deaf and hard-of-hearing children across the state for the past 27 years. Her professionalism, compassion, and deep understanding of DHH access needs have made her an invaluable team member. We are grateful for her dedication to ASD's mission and wish her all the best in this next chapter of her life.
- Lenae's Maternity Leave: Lenae, one of our Lower School speech-language pathologists, is preparing for the arrival of her first child, Manning Garrett Sullivan, expected in July. Lenae will be taking the full 12 weeks of maternity leave offered by the state. We are working closely with Nicole to ensure our students continue to receive consistent, high-quality speech-language services during Lenae's leave. We celebrate Lenae as she prioritizes her growing family and appreciate her thoughtful planning for continuity of care.

- **Derenda's Guest Speaking Engagement**: Derenda, our middle school SLP, recently served as a guest speaker for an undergraduate Communication Sciences and Disorders class at UALR. Her presentation sparked meaningful discussion about the rewards of working with deaf and hard-of-hearing populations to support their language access and development. One inspired student chose to shadow Derenda on-site at ASD on May 1 to learn more about the field firsthand.
- **Beth Helms' Guest Lecture**: Beth Helms, our new Related Services Coordinator, gave a guest lecture at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences (UAMS) for graduate students in the College of Health and Behavioral Sciences. Her presentation focused on social communication as one of the missing links for D/HH individuals and emphasized the importance of interdisciplinary and culturally responsive service delivery for this population.
