To Whom It May Concern,

Our district's most remote, isolated Title I middle school is Salvador Garcia Middle (SGMS), which is located in a very poor, remote area of Webb County characterized by substandard housing, limited access to transportation, limited resources, and neighborhoods that are home to high risk populations. SGMS students are plagued by a 98.94% poverty rate, discipline and behavior challenges, academic underachievement, poor extracurricular participation, and are often unable to receive academic help from their family due to a high rate of illiteracy among the adult/parental population.

United Independent School District is requesting funds to establish an ACE community learning center will be established under the 21st Century Community Learning Centers Grant Cycle 9 from the Texas Education Agency. This ACE center will provide a program beyond the regular school day (after school and during summer) offering significant expanded learning opportunities to those students most in need of academic assistance as identified from standardized test scores and classroom grades in core academic areas, as well as those at risk due to behavioral issues, attendance, and failure to be promoted to the next grade level.

The proposed program will benefit participating students by providing opportunities on site and via virtual educational field trips for academic assistance and enrichment; offering a broad array of student services to include health screenings, counseling, recreation, and college/career readiness and support; literacy and educational programming for families to include opportunities for literacy and related educational development. All activities will be provided in a school-based, drug-free, supervised environment.

The specific challenges facing the SGMS and the wider United ISD community concerning sustainability are financial. The oil and gas industry downturn has majorly impacted the Webb County area: workers have lost jobs, employers have lost business and shut down, the school district has lost oil and gas mineral revenue, and the retail sales tax collected have decreased significantly due to fewer shoppers with less funds. United is facing a potential \$30-35 million dollar shortfall in the coming academic year; however, our most needy students at SGMS are our priority and need the ACE program the most.

As such, the Board of Trustees of United ISD listed by name in the left column of this letter, have committed to identifying and providing funding to sustain the SGMS ACE program over time, as the grant guidelines require the district to cover a three to five percent yearly decrease in funding for years 2 through 5 of the program operation. This ongoing yearly increase will be covered by district budget processes.

Additional funding to keep the center running after year 5 will be sought through private, local, state, and federal funding and community/other sponsorships. It is also expected that the oil and gas sector will begin to recover in the next few years, and that recovery will drive job growth and retail expenditure increases which in turn will support increased state and local funding. United ISD will seek partnerships with the local institutes of higher education and local government and community agencies to help enrich the program and offset program costs.

It is our sincere hope that this project receives funding through your agency in order to help meet the academic needs of the students at this most worthy campus. SGMS is a Title I schoolwide campus, with 97.93% economically disadvantaged, 44.31% Limited English Proficient (LEP), and 99.59% Hispanic students who live *Colonias* in a remote area along the border to Mexico. We support this project fully.
