Verna Dorsey Holley joined the faculty as the first African American Choral Director in the school's history in 1978 after
serving the Lansing School District as an elementary and middle school music teacher at Cedar Street School and
Otto Middle School. She was hired by the late Dr. Clyde Carnegie. Under her leadership, she elevated the school's
choral output bringing culturally relevant choral literature including African American Spiritual while
maintaining a rich choral tradition that made the Sexton Choir a force in the community. Verna Holley
continues to be a beacon for excellent music education in the Lansing Community. She will turn 90 years old in 2026
and still instructs students in Lansing and abroad in singing and piano lessons from her home.
