The need for student support has continued to rise in recent years. During COVID, we added three social worker positions across the district to help meet our students' needs. These positions were originally funded through ESSER dollars and have proven to be highly effective in supporting students. As those funds are no longer available, we are seeking to maintain up to three social worker positions to continue serving the students of Bemidji Area Schools.

These staff members focus on students' social, emotional, and foundational needs. Based on Maslow's hierarchy of needs, we understand that students must have their basic needs met before they can fully engage and succeed academically. In practice, we have seen that some of our most vulnerable students require additional supports to access their school day.

We have had these supports in place for the past few years and are now working to identify a sustainable funding source to maintain these vital resources for our students. Our social workers build relationships, foster trust, and create the support necessary for students to thrive in the learning environment. By addressing foundational needs, we enable students to focus on achieving their academic potential.

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We are interested in expanding our student intervention services to better support academic growth. Intervention services are implemented when a student is identified through the formative assessment process and/or classroom observation as needing additional support. Once identified, a series of classroom-based interventions are provided. If these initial interventions do not lead to adequate progress, an interventionist is brought in to work with the student. Interventionists provide targeted, individualized support—either in small groups or one-on-one—to help students close learning gaps.

We would like to use this funding to increase the number of interventionists available, allowing us to reach more students who are struggling academically. Students who receive intervention services consistently demonstrate stronger academic growth and are more likely to get back on track.

We are working to provide a high-quality professional development program for our staff through an aligned and comprehensive staff development plan. This work will take time as we transition from a siloed approach to a more collaborative system that connects Q Comp, staff development, and technology integration.

Our goal is to offer teachers meaningful opportunities for both leadership and growth. Through our Q Comp plan, we are supporting teacher leadership, while our staff development process allows for individualized professional learning. We have already begun this work by realigning Q Comp positions to promote collaboration and strengthen our teaching and learning processes. Additionally, we are developing a staff development calendar to better coordinate our efforts and maximize impact on classroom instruction.

We plan to expand our onsite professional development offerings, focusing on technology integration, culturally responsive teaching, and best practices in reading and math instruction. We aim to strengthen these opportunities to better support our teachers and enhance instructional quality.

Ultimately, our goal is to improve the quality of teaching and, in turn, student learning outcomes. We have made significant investments in the science of reading for both core and special education teachers, and we are committed to sustaining this work to ensure it leads to lasting improvements in student achievement.

Bemidji Area Schools has identified the need to strengthen the district’s core curriculum and implement evidence-based instructional practices in a systematic and sustainable manner across all grade levels, PreK–12. To guide this work, a district committee was convened to determine the most effective approach and selected the Marzano process as the framework for curriculum development and alignment.

Through this process, each grade level identifies its priority standards and integrates the remaining standards within a cohesive instructional framework. Following this, proficiency scales are developed to clearly articulate the knowledge and skills students are expected to demonstrate at varying levels of mastery.

Currently, grade-level teams are developing aligned assessments and preparing to use assessment data to inform instruction, guide targeted interventions, and extend learning opportunities for all students. While this work is ongoing, the district has already observed measurable improvements and positive outcomes resulting from these efforts.

The Marzano Curriculum Process directly supports Bemidji Area Schools’ goals for both academic achievement and integration. By establishing a unified, evidence-based curriculum framework across all grade levels, the district ensures that every student—regardless of background, school, or program—has equitable access to high-quality instruction and clearly defined learning expectations. This systemic approach promotes consistency in teaching and learning, reducing variability and closing opportunity gaps among student groups.

Furthermore, the use of proficiency scales and aligned assessments enables teachers to monitor student progress with greater precision, identify learning needs early, and implement targeted interventions that support continuous growth. This data-driven approach not only enhances academic achievement but also advances the district’s integration goals by ensuring that all students receive the resources, instruction, and supports necessary to reach their full potential.

Bemidji Area Schools has identified the need to strengthen the district's core curriculum and implement evidence-based instructional practices in a systematic and sustainable manner across all grade levels, PreK-12. To guide this work, a district committee was convened to determine the most effective approach and selected the Marzano process as the framework for curriculum development and alignment.

Through this process, each grade level identifies its priority standards and integrates the remaining standards within a cohesive instructional framework. Following this, proficiency scales are developed to clearly articulate the knowledge and skills students are expected to demonstrate at varying levels of mastery.

Currently, grade-level teams are developing aligned assessments and preparing to use assessment data to inform instruction, guide targeted interventions, and extend learning opportunities for all students. While this work is ongoing, the district has already observed measurable improvements and positive outcomes resulting from these efforts.

The Marzano Curriculum Process directly supports Bemidji Area Schools' goals for both academic achievement and integration. By establishing a unified, evidence-based curriculum framework across all grade levels, the district ensures that every student—regardless of background, school, or program—has equitable access to high-quality instruction and clearly defined learning expectations. This systemic approach promotes consistency in teaching and learning, reducing variability and closing opportunity gaps among student groups.

Furthermore, the use of proficiency scales and aligned assessments enables teachers to monitor student progress with greater precision, identify learning needs early, and implement targeted interventions that support continuous growth. This data-driven approach not only enhances academic achievement but also advances the district's integration goals by ensuring that all students receive the resources, instruction, and supports necessary to reach their full potential.
