

# Minnesota Department of Health Dashboard

Mahtomedi Public Schools is currently in a Distance Learning model. We have asked families and staff to continue reporting positive cases and close contacts so that we can better gauge COVID-19 spread within our learning community and prepare to return to Hybrid learning. The case numbers for students and staff reflects self-reporting of cases during distance learning.

Staff at Mahtomedi Public Schools continue to work in our school buildings during distance learning and we will continue to report staff cases and quarantine data during distance learning.

COVID-19 Exposure and Close Contact notifications will continue to take place during Distance Learning for families and staff entering school buildings.



# **Learning Model Change Request Process**

Families who would like to make a learning model change for the second semester (January 26-June 10), may fill out the learning model change form for each of their children.

- Families who chose Distance learning during semester one and would like to switch to Hybrid learning for semester two.
- Families who chose Hybrid learning during semester one and would like to switch to Distance learning for semester two.

In order to organize our staff and schedule to meet the needs of family requests, we need families to commit to a learning model. The learning model change forms will be open from December 7-18. The form will close at 5 pm on December 18.

### Tier 1 Update

Free care is provided during distance learning to children provided that all of the parents or legal guardians in the child's household are workers in Tier 1 industries.

#### **New changes for Distance Learning 2.0:**

- Mahtomedi Adventure Club (MAC) and paraprofessionals staffing Tier 1 care received technology training for students' devices (iPads and Chromebooks) and learning platforms (Seesaw and Google Classroom).
- During Tier 1 and MAC care, students attend their distance learning classes and receive academic support from staff.

Current Tier 1 numbers: Approximately 110 students per day
