### Lulu Walker Elementary School Where Kindness is the Key to Success

In August of 2013 the Walker Technology Committee established the goal of having school wide wireless access and a minimum of 6 wireless devices per classroom.

At this time, through several grants and minimal funding from the state of Arizona we have been able to install wireless access points throughout the campus. Walker Elementary Students and Staff now have wireless access in all classrooms and the library. Additionally, we have been able to purchase two wireless devices per classroom.

Two wireless devices per classroom is great but six per room would allow the teacher to better meet the individual needs of each student through the use of small group instruction and individualized independent work.

We are requesting \$3,200.00 to purchase 8 Chromebook Laptops at a cost of approximately \$400.00 each. This would allow us to add 1 Chromebook to each  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  grade classroom and both special education classrooms.

#### **Chromebooks Laptops:**

Why Chromebooks and wireless access...connectivity and access to Internet, and technology resources is paramount in a classroom environment. Having contact with a device that is online can open doors for students, teachers, and parents to help promote student success. Student performance will increase due to the interest of being able to interact with a wireless device. Our population of students does not always have access to Internet at home, and once a week in the computer lab does not cater to the ever increasing need to have proficient technology savvy learners. Classroom applications are wide open and constantly being developed and updated, the options are almost unlimited if the access is available.

One example of a student application, inside of the classroom could include students interacting with reading resources and manipulatives in small groups. If there are several wireless devices in a classroom, the students are no longer chained down to a single station, the can get up and move with the device as needed. Having the option to read something and instantly be able to research the same topic without having to go to the library or computer lab saves time, and keeps the interest levels high. To move seamlessly between applications, internet, and books on the same device has incredible implications for student success. Students would also be able to develop, create, produce,

and generate original products that include but are not limited to interactive slideshows, movies, podcasts, papers, comics, posters, magazines, artwork, blog journals, wikis, and web quests. The device itself is a window that opens an entire world of possibilities waiting to be explored, developed, and shared.

The benefits of having wireless access with devices that can utilize the Internet are numerous. All stakeholders involved in student success would be affected and even challenged to learn and grow together. Communication from students to teacher and parents would be easily achieved with access. Opportunity waits inside of the classroom anytime that the need arises, spanning any and all subject areas. Wireless Internet access and tablets are merely tools to help students achieve success. Increased student productivity, interest, performance, communication, along with complete resource portability gives anyone involved enough reason to invest. As a teacher, motivation of students impacts the learning environment and can help with retention, understanding, and application of information. Furthermore, teachers would be able to adjust and tailor the experience depending on student needs. At risk students can be targeted and supported while providing extensions for those who are beyond the needs of others. Having tablets with wireless Internet access are paramount to promoting student achievement.
