- Ask your child how she feels about school.
- Ask your child if there is anything that they want you to talk about with their teacher.
- Tell your child that you and the teacher are meeting and make sure that they can attend
- Check your child's grades and ask your child questions about their assignments.
- Make a list of topics that you want to talk about with the teacher.

### **During the conference**

- Be on time for the meeting.
- Relax and be yourself
- Ask the most important questions first
- Take notes on what you want to remember

### After the conference

- Talk about the positive points of the conference with your child
- Talk about the areas of concerns and help make a plan to improve in those areas.

### **Potential Questions**

- What are my child's strengths and areas of improvement?
- Does my child complete their classwork and homework?
- Does my child participate in class?
- How is my child doing in Reading and Math?
- What can I do to help my child at home?

"He has great manners and is polite and respectful to peers and teachers in the hallway. Santiago also goes out of his way to help others."




### 8th grader Valeria Sanchez

### 6th grade ELA update

In our sixth-grade English Language Arts argument unit, students will explore how to craft well-reasoned arguments and understand diverse perspectives. Through structured debates, your child will practice listening carefully, thinking critically, and expressing their ideas clearly and respectfully. Engaging in debates helps students build critical thinking skills, confidence, and the ability to listen and respond thoughtfully to others. We also encourage you to support your child's learning by continuing to read from a variety of genres at home. Reading a wide range of stories broadens a better understanding of people and cultures, strengthens vocabulary, and deepens one's appreciation for different perspectives. 


### 7th Grade ELA Update

In 7th Grade ELA, students have just finished our first unit and will be starting our second unit, A Long Walk to Water novel study. This unit will go until Thanksgiving break! Students will get their own copy of the novel and be able to bring it home at the end of the unit. While reading the novel, students will be exploring the following essential questions:

- How do we overcome life's challenges?
- What can one generation learn from another?

Some literature focus skills that students will be working on are: summarizing the text, comparing & contrasting the characters' experiences in the novel, analyzing passages in the text, and determining the meaning of unknown words/using context clues.



We have created a novel study packet that allows students to interact with the text through various prompts and resources.

For homework each week, students should still be reading 30 minutes. They will also receive a short paired text to compare to the novel. Students will create a one pager at the end of the unit for

their assessment.

Here is a short blurb about the novel:

"A Long Walk to Water begins as two stories, told in alternating sections, about two eleven-yearolds in Sudan, a girl in 2008 and a boy in 1985. The girl, Nya, is fetching water from a pond that is two hours' walk from her home: she makes two trips to the pond every day. The boy, Salva, becomes one of the "lost boys" of Sudan, refugees who cover the African continent on foot as they search for their families and for a safe place to stay."


\*\*This book does contain elements of war, poverty, and being separated from family. We are fully prepared to have these discussions with students and know they can handle this exceptional novel.

### 8th Grade ELA Update

Unit 1: "Rites of Passage"

The pilot 8th-grade ELA team is working with a new curriculum by Savvas: My Perspectives, focusing on the first unit called "Rites of Passage," which invites students to investigate the milestones, challenges, and triumphs of growing up through powerful literature and creative expression. Students have read a variety of texts, videos, and other media as they discuss how single experiences can change a life. Designed to engage students at a pivotal stage in their development, the curriculum blends classic and contemporary texts that reflect themes of identity, independence, and belonging. Through discussions, writing projects, and multimedia storytelling, students connect personal experiences to the broader human journey of becoming.



### Unit 2: Novel Study

The pilot 8th-grade ELA team is excited to continue with our next unit and our anchor text, The Outsiders by S.E. Hinton. This unit invites students to investigate themes of identity, belonging, and social class while developing critical reading, writing, and discussion skills. Through the Savvas: My Perspectives framework, students engage with engaging lessons, interactive multimedia resources, and collaborative activities that bring a classic adolescent story to life. As students analyze character motivations and personal growth, students make meaningful connections between the novel's challenges and struggles and their own experiences, fostering empathy and a richer understanding of what it means to stand up, stay true, and find one's place in the world.
