Free Meals for Children in Rural Communities

In the wake of the ongoing COVID-19 crisis, McLane Global has launched Emergency Meals-To-You – a public-private partnership between USDA, Baylor Collaborative on Hunger and Poverty, PepsiCo and others – designed for home delivery of shelf-stable, nutritious meals to students in rural areas missing school due to closures.

The Emergency Meals-To-You program was established to ensure kids don't go hungry during this difficult time. As such, McLane, together with its partners, is working to deliver at least 1 Million Meals a week to children in rural communities who don't have access to meals. Meal kits include two weeks' worth of nutritious, shelf-stable foods such as milk, cereal bowls, snacks, entrees, fruit cups and juices for one student.x

To be eligible to participate in the program, school districts must meet the following requirements:

- Participate in the National School Lunch Program,
- Have at least 50% of enrollment eligible for free or reduced-priced meals,
- Have an announced closure of at least four weeks (not counting spring break), and
- Fall under the designation of rural area (can be checked <u>here</u>).

Students in qualifying school districts who were receiving free or reduced priced meals through the National School Lunch Program are eligible to participate in the program. School districts will reach out to families with more information and instructions for signing up, but parents are also encouraged to visit MealsToYou.org and proactively register their children to receive free, nutritious meals. Once a school district is enrolled, a student who signs up for the program can expect to start receiving meals delivered to their home in about one week. Each student who is enrolled in a household will receive their

own meal kit.

Distribution and delivery have already begun, and partners are ramping up quickly to reach the goal of providing more than 1 Million Meals per week across rural America.

Help us by spreading the word and making sure that your local school district is signed up so that students can benefit from the program.
