# **AC. Houghton Elementary**

**Rock Wall:** The ACH Parent Group and our student body have combined to finance the construction of a lateral rock climbing wall in our gym. This wall will be painted as a rock bluff scene and it will allow an entire PE class to participate in the climbing activity at once. Anticipation is great as construction proceeds. We are trying to hurry to get it completed within the next couple of weeks so that current third and fourth graders, who did a lot of the fundraising, can use it before they move on to Irrigon Elementary.

# **Heppner Elementary School**

It is a privilege to report the recent happenings of Heppner Elementary School. It is hard to believe that May is already here, our enrollment at HES is 189 students which is the same as it was for the April report. Our current attendance percentage for the year is 95.6% this is up slightly from last month and as always we will continue to promote the importance of regular attendance to the students and parents of Heppner Elementary School. HES recently started the third round of OAKS testing and I am happy to report that most of our students have met or exceeded the benchmarks for their grade level. We will continue working hard to get the few remaining HES students over the benchmark hump during this third and final round of testing.

April was full of many exciting events which took place at HES, with the highlight being the "Honor Card Assembly" which was held on April 16<sup>th</sup> where 68 HES students received Honor Cards and Certificates for the third quarter. Honor Cards are given to students that maintain positive grades, behavior and attendance during each quarter of the school year. HES students performed very well at the district sponsored math contest held at RHS on April 16<sup>th</sup>. We also held our Kindergarten Roundup on April 21<sup>st</sup> and pre-enrolled 32 Kindergarten students for next year. This was a pleasant surprise compared to this years KG class which consists of 22 students. Kolby Currin won his 4<sup>th</sup> grade class a free field trip to "Ag Fest" in Salem on April 24<sup>th</sup> as the winner of an essay contest sponsored by Ag Fest.

With the fourth quarter well under way we are rapidly approaching the end of the school year. Our 28 sixth grade students headed for the hills this week for Tupper Outdoor School. Other noteworthy events which will be taking place in the next few weeks include; Monday, May 25<sup>th</sup> Memorial Day - No School, Thursday, May 28<sup>th</sup> - Spring Concert, Thursday, June 4<sup>th</sup> - HES

Field Day and BBQ, Tuesday, June  $9^{th}$  – HES Awards Night, and Wednesday, June  $10^{th}$  is our last day of school.

I would like to end this report by again thanking each of you for your support of Heppner Elementary School, and for your commitment to all students of the Morrow County School District.

# **Heppner High School**

- ➤ Our spring sports are doing well finishing up their seasons and preparing for district and state competitions. It looks like we have a great chance at being district baseball champions, district girls and boys golf champions, and no doubt we will have many district champions in track.
- Our spring school play- A Broadway Review was a hit with many of our student body showing their skills and talents over 5 performances. It was well attended and was a success.
- ➤ We took 38 students to the Pendleton Army National Guard Aviation Open House two weeks ago. It was a great time where our students learned about aviation, what the National Guard is involved with in the state of Oregon and across the US, technology, job opportunities, and aviation mechanics. It was an amazing trip where our students using night vision goggles, and watched helicopters fly equipment and use a water bucket. The show also included four sky divers that jumped out of a helicopter at over 6,000 feet. It was enjoyed by all and received positively by all students that attended.
- Our FFA group attended CDE days in Corvallis again this spring. It was a fun time for our students to compete in several events and see a large scale Ag show and career fair.
- ➤ Our GOAL interviews went without a hitch. All of our students did well and this process included over 20 community members that volunteered. It was fun and exciting to hear the presentations of our students and what HHS has helped them prepare for.
- ➤ We received our preliminary writing scores back from the state for grades 7 and 10. The word to describe our progress with writing is, AMAZING! We had 27 of our 28 students in the 7<sup>th</sup> grade conditionally meet, meet, or exceed on meeting the standard. In the 10<sup>th</sup> grade, 34 out of 36 students conditionally met, met, or exceeded with meeting the standard. Truly, these results are unprecedented and reason to celebrate at HHS. Our double dipping in writing, efforts with cross curriculum intervention, and giving students multiple opportunities to be graded on the rubric- has paid off. YAHOO!
- ➤ Our third testing window is fast approaching us, and we are making a huge push to get those last remaining students over the top in math, and reading. I will give you an update on our progress and percentages from HHS in June.
- ➤ We are finishing up with giving AP exams to our students. This week we will have that part of our AP program accomplished. Below are the numbers of students we have in our AP classes and how many are taking the test is in parentheses. AP Biology- 24, (2), AP Calculus- 16, (2), AP Chemistry- 25, (0), AP Language Composition- 28, (9), AP Government- 18, (5).
- ➤ Dave Fowler and I took a trip down to look at Scappoose HS and their proficiency model that they are using in their school. It was an amazing trip that has got the ball rolling with how to implement the 8 period day at HHS using a proficiency

model. My staff and I are excited about moving this direction and will be developing and working on skill sets that are packaged for all of our students to meet proficiency standards via performance assessments.

## **Irrigon Elementary School**

**Outdoor School**- The last week of April we went with Windy River Elementary School to have Outdoor School together. It was a wonderful experience to have done this together. The students got along great. The staff worked well together. It snowed, but we all adjusted and had a good week of fun, work and friendship.

**5<sup>th</sup> Grade OAKS Tests**- While the sixth grade was gone, the 5<sup>th</sup> grade concentrated on taking the OAKS tests. We exceeded last years 5<sup>th</sup> grade tests in both Reading and Math!! We're pumped! In Math we got 69% passing the OAKS tests, and in Reading we got 77% passing the OAKS tests. We're very happy.

**The Tempest-** Ms. Osturlund's class presented the play, The Tempest". It's a Shakespearian play. They did a lot of work to prepare the scenes, the costumes and memorizing their parts. Kudos to Ms. Osterlund, for getting kids excited to re-creating this drama.

**WRE Writing Fest**- We attended the Writing Fest at Windy River Elementary. All the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> graders all across the district came and went to classes about writing. Everyone behaved. Students learned lots more about writing from our guest author and our very own teachers.

**4**<sup>th</sup> **Grade Transition**- We are making plans and preparations to add on the 4<sup>th</sup> grade to our building next year. We are excited, working hard and ready to meet the new challenge.

**Oregon Scratch-It**- Last month Ms. Rowe and I went to Hamley's in Pendleton to scratch out the winnings of \$1594 dollars for our school program next year. We are on a roll here at IES and I hope it never stops!

At the festival, students shared writing samples they had written, learned and practiced new writing techniques taught by teachers and writing professionals, and attended presentations by famous authors. The weekend started with Morrow County students engaging in hands-on history and science lessons at the Oregon Museum of Science and Industry (OMSI). The students stayed Friday night on the USS Blueback, the last diesel submarine built for the United States Navy, on loan to OMSI by the Navy. During their time at OMSI, the students took an extended tour of the Blueback, participated in science activities led by the OMSI staff, enjoyed a planetarium show, and camped overnight on the submarine.

#### **RHS SUMMER SYMPOSIUM**

This summer Riverside teacher William Pullen along with seniors Vicky Hernandez, Viviana Colin and Mayra Barrera will participate in a summer symposium sponsored by the Oregon Council for the Humanities. The annual symposium has participants study an issue or theme from several academic and social areas. 
**Enrollment:** 314 **Attendance:** Average attendance for March was 93.58%
