Comprehensive Needs Assessment

Demographics

Demographics Summary

The Wylie ISD District Site-Based Committee identified strengths and weaknesses based on data from multiple sources to develop the district plan for the 2012-2013 school year. Wylie I.S.D. serves 3,391 students enrolled on 5 campuses. The district consists of a population with 12.5% Hispanic students, 78.0% White students, 3.3% African American students, and 2.4% of Asian and 0.3% Native American students. The district has 16.5% Economically Disadvantaged, 0.6% LEP, and 16% At-Risk. Our economically disadvantaged students have increased to 18.50% this year. Two campuses are Title I Targeted Assistance campuses. This year we had an overall enrollment increase of 7.5%.

Demographics Strengths

The district attendance rate is 96.7% which is up .2% from 2009-2010. The mobility rate has remained fairly consistent. Special education numbers have decreased as a result of the implementation of RtI strategies throughout the district, primarily at the elementary, intermediate, and junior high campuses. While special education numbers at the high school remain high, decreased numbers at the lower grade levels will produce reduced high school numbers over the next few years. Teacher student ratios are generally a little higher than the state average on all campuses. However, this year we moved our kindergarten classes back to the Early Childhood Campus to ease overcrowding at the Elementary campus. The new middle school campus will be completed in 2013 and the opening of this new campus will help the Intermediate and Junior High School lower the total number of students.

Demographics Needs

Improve the achievement of our low socio-economic students because the number of students in this subgroup is increasing. The Hispanic and African American subgroups continue to score below campus and state commended averages in most areas. Targeted intervention for these areas has proven beneficial and must continue for the upcoming school year.

Student Achievement

Student Achievement Summary

Wylie I.S.D. uses a number of methods to disaggregate and analyze data. Campuses use benchmarks to conduct progress monitoring for struggling students. The district also uses DMAC (Data Management for Assessment and Curriculum) to analyze campus benchmark assessment. We have also disaggregated preliminary TAKS/STAAR/EOC results to determine strengths and weaknesses. While the district has shown growth in the progress of our ELL students on TELPAS, Hispanic students still continue to struggle on the TAKS/STAAR/EOC testing. Also, while commended scores continue to rise, there is still a significant gap between the performance of white students and other subgroups. The performance of African American and Hispanic students has improved in many areas, but continues to lag behind in the areas of math and science. It is also necessary for us to adjust the type of instruction provided to our special education students to make sure they are successful at a higher cognitive level.

Student Achievement Strengths

Wylie ISD staff share a common understanding of the major components of the Response to Intervention framework. There is an increased understanding and stronger implementation of the framework at the Elementary and Intermediate level than at the secondary level. The district utilizes a number of tools to monitor student learning and proactively identify potentially struggling students. District-wide staff members have processes and vocabulary in place for teaching problem solving. All campuses use benchmark assessments to obtain early identification of struggling students in order to provide targeted intervention and have intervention strategies in place to encourage student achievement.

Student Achievement Needs

Wylie ISD will use the data to address identified needs in both regular and special education student achievement. The secondary campuses will use the Elementary and Intermediate model for RtI to implement a more focused RtI program on those campuses. All campuses will use incremental testing to identify student weakness and will provide early intervention to address those needs. Students will be directed to after school tutorials as well as in-school intervention assistance.

School Culture and Climate

School Culture and Climate Summary

Each campus in Wylie I.S.D. has developed a discipline plan that addresses the needs of that campus. The Elementary and Intermediate campuses focus on the development of strong character traits and decision-making. Students are taught that each choice they make, good or bad, comes with a positive or negative consequence. At the secondary campuses, the plan focuses on behavioral expectations in order to provide maximum learning opportunities in the classroom setting. Secondary campuses have a high level of participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Many students participate in multiple activities.

School Culture and Climate Strengths

Wylie I.S.D. staff members develop ownership and commitment to the students and campus goals. Student safety is a high priority and efforts are taken each day to ensure safety. Each campus is small enough to allow staff to provide individual attention to students as needed. Student surveys indicate that students feel safe at school and enjoy attending.

School Culture and Climate Needs

Each campus must ensure that systems are in place to provide consistent enforcement of campus and district expectations. Students are unable to reach maximum performance unless there is an environment that is conducive to success. Each campus will re-evaluate its use of campus in-school suspension settings to make sure students spend as much time as possible in the classroom. Steps will be taken at each campus to reduce the number of discipline referrals, including providing training and assistance to the classroom teachers in addressing student issues more effectively. Behavioral and academic intervention will take place in the regular education classroom with assistance going to the classroom rather than students coming out.

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention Summary

Wylie I.S.D. maintains a 100% Highly Qualified staff at all times. Wylie ISD currently has 348 staff members with 208 of those being classroom teachers and 32 instructional aides. At the end of 2010-2011, Wylie ISD had 32 teachers leave the district and there were 3 transfers within the district. Ten teachers with 3 or less years of experience left the district during the 2011-2012 school year and the other 20 teachers who left had more than 3 years of experience. The turnover rate this year was higher than in past years. The turnover rate for 2010-2011 was 10.6%.

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention Strengths

Wylie ISD provides a strong professional development program for employees. Instructional staff members have access to online as well as face-to-face sessions over topics that are targeted to their interests and instructional assignment. Staff members choose summer sessions that address their professional goals to attend that can then be used for comp time during the school year. All professional development sessions are logged in a Professional Development folder. Campus administrators are responsible for the implementation and supervision of campus mentoring programs for all new staff. Mentors are also provided to assist with lesson planning, curriculum development, and instructional presentation. All staff members can request assistance, not just the new staff.

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention Needs

An increase in staff stability along with targeted professional development is the key to improving student achievement at these campuses. With a stronger presence of administrators in the classroom and an increase in the emphasis on continuous student engagement, the instructional focus for the 2011-2012 school year must be strengthening the Tier I level of instruction. Providing that high level of support and intervention for the instructional staff will improve the quality of instruction as well as produce a positive, content school climate.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Summary

Wylie ISD uses Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills as the foundation of the curricular program. Each campus develops a timeline for assessing student performance periodically throughout the school year and the data from those assessments are used to direct instructional focus. Wylie I.S.D. has a variety of assessment tools available to provide data for diagnosis including Texas Primary Reading Inventory, Star Reading Assessment, ALEKS Math, iStation Reading, Fluency Reading Trainer, Orchard, Lexia Reading, Think Through Math, campus Curriculum Based Assessments, and GT screening. Students are placed in the intervention model that is least restrictive but will provide the most productive acceleration of learning. Professional development in differentiating instruction has been provided to all staff members and use of this practice is monitored throughout the district. Identification and targeted intervention at the individual student level is a priority at all campuses.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Strengths

Teachers work collaboratively to develop and implement instructional objectives. Students who are unsuccessful are identified early and provided targeted intervention opportunities. The district uses DMAC (Data and Management Software for Assessment and Curriculum) to disaggregate the data. That data is used by classroom teachers, specialists, and administrators to address the needs of individual students. Wylie Junior High has double blocked classes in Reading and Math to provide additional sustained instructional time. Wylie High School offers double blocked math classes to provide more instructional time.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Needs

All campuses have strong intervention systems in place. Continued training in differentiation is needed to strengthen staff, especially the new teachers. Frequent walkthroughs in all classes by administrators will identify continued areas of need. Some secondary staff must also receive more training on the use of data to guide instructional decisions.

Family and Community Involvement

Family and Community Involvement Summary

Wylie ISD has numerous opportunities for parents to be involved in all aspects of the educational process. Each campus has a Campus Site Based Committee which includes parents, community members, and business members. Wylie PTO has representatives on each campus and monthly meetings to solicit parental involvement. The district website is maintained to provide current information on events and announcements important to parents and community members. The use of School Connect as an information delivery system to send out important information through emails and texts is a valuable tool to keep parents informed. Student grades and attendance information is available through a parent portal that can be accessed online.

Family and Community Involvement Strengths

Each campus has a series of events each year to provide parents and community members an opportunity to see first-hand what is happening on each campus. Open houses, family nights, parent-teacher conferences, program meetings, holiday programs, and award presentations are just a few of the ways Wylie ISD campuses reach out to community and parents.

Family and Community Involvement Needs

Wylie I.S.D. continues to have strong family and community involvement. Campuses need to continue to identify strategies to get parents involved in the development of parent events and trainings in order to ensure these events meet their interest and needs.

School Context and Organization

School Context and Organization Summary

Wylie ISD uses surveys and campus committees to identify needs and develop plans for addressing those needs. Wylie ISD focuses decisions on the Eight Components of a Title I Targeted Assistance Program. Teacher input is solicited and valued in developing campus practices that support instruction and learning. Each campus has developed a plan to identify classroom instructional weaknesses as well as individual student weaknesses. The challenge becomes developing a consistent, effective plan for addressing those needs to ensure student success and the growth of strong student engagement.

School Context and Organization Strengths

Teachers at the campuses are provided common planning times to allow for collaboration and lesson development. Campus staff has a good understanding of good instructional practices and intervention techniques, although many still need practice and support in the implementation of those practices.

School Context and Organization Needs

The classroom setting is the primary learning environment at campuses and must be supported by all other programs. Removal from the instructional setting should be avoided when at all possible in order to provide maximum learning opportunities. Instead of students being "pulled out" of classrooms, instructional support must be sent into the classrooms to build up the Tier I instruction. Consistency in grading policies and instructional expectations across grade levels and subject areas is an area to be addressed. The need for common planning time is a need across all campuses. Teachers also want more opportunities to learn from each other through observations and peer coaching.

Technology

Technology Summary

Wylie ISD is committed to providing technology resources to help our students be successful in a 21st century environment. Student instruction integrates current technology resources as a tool for learning. Campuses have a variety of tools such as desktops, laptops, netbooks, iPads, Promethean Boards, SmartBoards, projection devices, and software programs that can be used to address particular instructional strategies and learning styles. Teachers receive professional development on the integration of these tools for authentic learning. Ebooks are providing students with an alternate way to access written text and research information.

Technology Strengths

Every classroom in Wylie I.S.D. has access to Internet and all campuses have interactive whiteboards. District technology support provides services to ensure equipment is working properly as well as providing instruction on integrating technology into daily teaching practices.

Technology Needs

Each campus has a variety of proficiencies among staff on technology capabilities. Administrators need to continue to identify areas of need and provide opportunities for professional development to address those needs. The availability of on-demand professional development is a need to allow teachers to get assistance as they need it to maximize instructional use. Reluctant staff members need to be supported and encouraged to continuously find ways to incorporate technology into the instructional program in their classroom.

District Policy on Sexual Harassment and Dating Violence

As required by state law, the district has adopted policy regarding sexual harassment and dating violence, and this policy is included in the DIP. Specifically, district policies FFH(Local) and FFH(Exhibit) address sexual harassment and dating violence under the broader category of Student Welfare.

The preamble to district policy FFH(Local) states:

"The District prohibits discrimination, including harassment, against any student on the basis of race, color, religion, gender, sexual orientation, national origin, disability, or any other basis prohibited by law. The District prohibits dating violence, as defined by this policy. Retaliation against anyone involved in the complaint process is a violation of District policy."

State Compensatory Education Statement

State compensatory education funds were authorized by the legislature to provide financial support for programs and/or services designed by school districts to increase the achievement of students at risk of dropping out of school. State law, SECTION 29.081, Texas Education Code, requires districts to use student performance data from the state legislatively-mandated assessment instrument known as the Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills(TAKS) tests and any other achievement tests administered under Subchapter B, Chapter 39, of the Texas Education Code, including norm-referenced tests approved by the State Board of Education to provide accelerated intensive instruction to students who have not performed satisfactorily or who are at risk of dropping out of school. These funds are used only to meet the costs of providing a supplemental compensatory, intensive, or accelerated instruction program. Criteria for identification of students at risk of dropping out of school is defined under Section 29.081 of the Texas Education code.

Non-Discrimination Statement

It is the policy of Wylie ISD not to discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex or handicap in its vocational programs, services or activities as required by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972; and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended.

It is the policy of Wylie ISD to support the campuses as they provide a free, appropriate education to all students, consisting of regular and special education and related aids and services in career and technology education programs that are designed to meet individual educational needs of disabled persons as adequately as the needs of non-disabled persons are met and are based upon adherence to provisions set forth in 34 CFR 104.33-104.36; 34 CFR 104.31-104.40; (see also standards under V-C, V-D, V-E, V-F, V-G, and V-H).

It is the policy of Wylie ISD not to discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, sex, handicap, or age in its employment practices as required by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended; Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972; the Age Discrimination Act of 1975, as amended; and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended.

Wylie ISD will take steps to assure that lack of English language skills will not be a barrier to admission and participation in all educational and vocational programs.

Dyslexia

Dyslexia is a neurological disorder manifested by a difficulty in learning to read, write, or spell despite conventional instruction, adequate intelligence, and socio-cultural opportunity. It varies in the degree of severity and its primary characteristic is difficulty with phonological

processing.

Wylie ISD follows Texas Education Agency (TEA) guidelines for identifying dyslexia students. These guidelines are mandated by the Texas Education Code (TEC) and require testing students for dyslexia and providing instruction for students with dyslexia. In addition, Wylie ISD provides ongoing training for educators regarding dyslexia.

Wylie ISD in compliance with TEC has developed procedures for:

- Data Gathering
- Formal Assessment
- Identification of students
- Providing instruction

Dyslexia students are provided a multisensory reading approach that includes the instructional components mandated in Texas Administrative Code (TAC).

Bullying Prevention, Policy, and Plan

BULLYING PROHIBITED

The District prohibits bullying as defined by this policy. Retaliation against anyone involved in the complaint process is a violation of District policy and is prohibited.

DEFINITION

Bullying occurs when a student or group of students engages in written or verbal expression, expression through electronic means, or physical conduct that occurs on school property, at a school-sponsored or school-related activity, or in a vehicle operated by the District and that:

- 1. Has the effect or will have the effect of physically harming a student, damaging a student's property, or placing a student in reasonable fear of harm to the student's person or of damage to the student's property; or
- 2. Is sufficiently severe, persistent, and pervasive enough that the action or threat creates an intimidating, threatening, or abusive educational environment for a student.

This conduct is considered bullying if it:

- 3. Exploits an imbalance of power between the student perpetrator and the student victim through written or verbal expression or physical conduct; and
- 4. Interferes with a student's education or substantially disrupts the operation of a school.

EXAMPLES

Bullying of a student may include hazing, threats, taunting, teasing, confinement, assault, demands for money, destruction of property, theft of valued possessions, name calling, rumor spreading, or ostracism.

RETALIATION

The District prohibits retaliation by a student or District employee against any person who in good faith makes a report of bullying, serves as a witness, or participates in an investigation.

EXAMPLES

Examples of retaliation may include threats, rumor spreading, ostracism, assault, destruction of property, unjustified punishments, or unwarranted grade reductions. Unlawful retaliation does not include petty slights or annoyances.

Suicide Prevention Plan

- 1. The following updated intervention plan is to be implemented on each campus in the Wylie Independent School District:
 - a) When a student threatens or attempts suicide, the counselor, nurse, principal, or assistant principal who first learns of the threat or attempt will talk with the student immediately. At this time, the staff member involved will obtain a "no harm" agreement from the student.
 - b) With the student's knowledge, the school official will telephone a parent or guardian and request that he or she come to school at once. When the parent or guardian arrives, he or she is to be informed that the student is in crisis and needs to receive counseling services from a qualified mental health practitioner. At this time, the parent should be given the names of qualified professionals in the community who can provide these services.
 - c) With the written permission of the parent or guardian, a school staff member will call the District Testing Coordinator, who will

immediately schedule a counseling session with a professional counselor that will include the student and parent or guardian.

- e) If school personnel have difficulty contacting a parent or guardian, the school staff member that is working with the student will arrange to have someone remain with the student until a parent or guardian can be contacted.
- f) The school staff member that is working with the student will notify other personnel such as the student's counselor, grade level associate principal, nurse, and principal of the action taken.
- g) If the student is seen by one of the contracted professionals, the professional will complete the Suicidal Intervention Follow-Up Form and will return it to the District Testing Coordinator. Upon receipt, the testing office will send a copy to the student's school counselor.
- 2. It is the principal's responsibility to see that all staff members who are responsible for implementing this plan are thoroughly familiar with it.
