NWRESD Local Service Plan Presentation

SPECIAL PRESENTATIONS

Northwest Regional ESD Local Service Plan (LSP), Dan Goldman, Superintendent, NWRESD Mr. Goldman introduced Ross Tomlin, and Kim Lyon. Mr. Goldman thanked Mr. Erlebach for his leadership, he has been a great partner with the ESD and a great mentor to his peers.

Mr. Tomlin stated that the ESD serves 20 school districts across four counties with approximately 100 thousand students. The LSP needs to be approved by the ESD board and then by 2/3 of the component districts who are supported by the ESD, no later than March 1. The 20 school district superintendents have unanimously approved the LSP.

Kim Lyon directed the members to pages 37 and 38 which cover some of the services the district receives. Those pages are attached to these minutes.

Mr. Goldman shared that 90 percent of the State School Fund (SSF) is allocated to school districts, with only

ten percent going to ESD operations. NWRESD is the largest of the ESDs in the state. Seventy-five percent of school district allocations go to individual school district accounts and 25 percent of school district allocations are spent on core services.

Mr. Goldman explained how the plan is developed, that there are three parts to the plan; core services, menu services and the Student Success Act Technical Assistance Plan services.

Integrated Guidance Presentation

Integrated Guidance, Paul Erlebach

Mr. Erlebach recognized Kate Pattison who has helped the district write our continuous improvement plan previously and has done a lot of work with us as we have developed our Integrated Guidance application. The draft application can be found on the website, on the home page at the bottom of the footer or by clicking here.

Ms. Pattison shared that the Integrated Guidance Application reduces the redundancy across several programs. The districts continuous improvement plan (CIP) is due to be revised as well. She reviewed the seven goals of the CIP. The integrated guidance and continuous improvement plan have both been developed with a lot of community engagement intended to help the district team develop goals and strategies. The seven goals are as follows:

- 1. Improve 3rd grade reading and literacy for all student groups
- 2. Increase the percent of students attending school regularly at each school
- 3. Improve 9th grade on-track supports for incoming and current students
- 4. Increase the number of students who graduate and complete high school
- 5. Improve student well-being
- 6. Increase community and family engagement
- 7. Enhance support for staff

Ms. Pattison also reviewed the draft Integrated Application and the timeline for submitting the integrated application.

Timeline for the Integrated Guidance application February 2023 – share with board and the community March 2023 – Board approval of integrated application By March 31, 2023, the application will be submitted to ODE

Mr. Erlebach stated that the plan would provide guidance for the superintendent and the board going forward. A lot of work has gone into the plan by district leadership, staff and community, and he is very happy with it.

English Language Arts Curriculum, Tracy Bennett

Reports ELA Curriculum

Ms. Bennett provided the board with an update on where we are with our ELA curriculum adoption. Last year they spent time on building knowledge on how to teach reading. Teachers have selected Wit and Wisdom. Six teachers are piloting this curriculum at this time. They are also working with Foundations. Feedback from teachers has been amazing, this is a program that will take a lot of work and will take some time for teachers to be properly trained. Some of the teachers who are not piloting the curriculum have become interested, and will have the opportunity to use it toward the end of the school year. The printed materials in the conference room are for module one.

5 Activity Updates

National Ocean Sciences Bowl: Students recently completed a marine debris survey in partnership with Jesse Jones from CoastWatch and Denise Harrington with NOAA at Manhattan Beach Wayside. This community science survey will be completed monthly in order to monitor the amount and type of debris found on our beaches, as well as the conditions and recreational use of the our beaches. The 12-member NOSB team also traveled to OSU to attend a 2-day science event on 2/3-2/4, where they met with OSU faculty and graduate students to learn about their studies and research opportunities at OSU. They also toured a number of labs on campus, including the wave lab, ice lab, laser lab, and learned from researchers and grad students about how you can evaluate past ocean conditions (even up to 800,000 year ago!) from looking at ice cores and "shells" of certain ocean organisms, and how ocean acidification is currently affecting organisms like oysters and crabs.

Mathematics- The state has adopted new math standards and has modified the required credits to reflect both college and CTE pathways after graduation. We will be working to realign our math scope and sequence to reflect the new standards.

Spanish- We will be piloting new materials in anticipation of adopting in 22-23.
