

We are done with first semester...whew! Went fast...and now we are at the time of year where students in grades 9-11 should be thinking about classes they would like to take next year. Students in these grades need to think about opportunities that exist here on campus. College Now articulated college level classes and AP for all Juniors, Seniors, and some Sophomores are available. Our school offers more than any other in our region in this regard and it is important to encourage your child to take a risk and register for a rigorous set of classes as they mature through the educational process. Choices students make now can have a major impact on their futures and it is important for parents to have a say in regards to class loads and rigor. By now, many of you are well aware that soon our Junior students will be taking the statewide assessment in March and April called Smarter Balance. This assessment is the statewide assessment our state uses to test students on national Common Core standards. Common Core was initiated by the federal government to replace a previous federal education program called No Child Left Behind. This assessment is to measure college and career readiness. It is a tool that gives us a snapshot into the preparation a student has been given. By no means, is it defining nor should it be interpreted that way.

In other school news, the first semester has ended and it is important to have a conversation around your son/daughters report card. Earning credits towards graduation is the world we live in. It takes 24 to graduate and a passed semester class is worth half of a credit. Below are five talking points that can help navigate the subject of how your son/daughter is doing with credit acquisition and school progress.

- 1) Ask your child how things are going at school. What are some likes and dislikes, and try to uncover any problems.
- 2) Encourage your child to be a problem solver- to inquire at that lowest level possible with their teacher.
- 3) Ask your child about what they think their performance level is. Ask about in a class situations, consistency of turning in class work or homework, organization, and the use of time. A question about your child's friends might give some insight into the level of peer influence your child is being subjected to as well.
- 4) Be sure to ask your child how you can help support. ParentVue is a great tool to help these conversations.
- 5) Ask if the student knows where they are in regards to being on track to graduate and how they know.

Seizing an opportunity to question your son/daughter's progress is a large part of education. I appreciate the effort to work in harmony to educate the most precious commodity of our society, our children. By working together, we can identify any problems and discover ways to help a child. Likewise, the strengths of the child can be recognized and rewarded. We are half way there...

Mustangs stop losing skid versus rival Knights

New Oregon Promise Helps Pay for Community College

The state is launching its Oregon Promise program—offering new high school graduates and GED recipients an opportunity to have some or all of their community college tuition covered. Grants are for students entering a community college in Oregon in Fall 2016.

You may qualify if your

- Graduate from an Oregon high school or complete the GED in Spring/Summer 2016
- Have a 2.5 cumulative GPA or higher
- Have been an Oregon resident for at least 12 months prior to enrolling in community college

Steps to tide;

- Apply for the Oregon Promise between November 1, 2015 and March 1, 2016, including:
 - Complete the Oregon Promise application (online or written)
 - Submit your high school transcript or GED scores
 - Complete the FAFSA or its approved alternative
 - Once approved, Enroll in an Oregon community college within six months of graduating high school or completing the GED (Fall 2016)—and accept all state and federal grants
