

Check and Connect Training with Kari McKay

Ms. McKay has trained all special teachers and teacher assistants in Check and Connect.

Check and Connect is a upper Tier 2 or Tier 3 intervention for students K-12 focused on graduation and preparedness for success after High School. Of the dropout prevention interventions reviewed by the U.S. Department of Education's <u>What Works Clearinghouse</u>, Check & Connect is the only program found to have strong evidence of positive effects on staying in school. We will be working with our list of students with 40 + attendance absences.

- Specials teachers were given Professional Development on Wonders Foundational Skills kit for pull out of intensive students.


Beginning in October, students will begin Enhancement-Blow the Lid Off Reading Skills. Each student will be grouped with like abilities and will walk to instruction. This 30-minute Enhancement block is explicitly taught to help students fill gaps in their phonics skills in a quick manner. The program follows the phonics continuum. This Enhancement will affect all students...it assists students with their deficits and also enhances on grade level with higher level skills.

Specials teachers will also begin to pull out students during the small group instruction to teach them foundational skills with the Wonder Works program. We will be working with our bubble group students to help them improve their skills.

<u>Math</u>


This is our third year following the guided math framework. We will be refining our framework for math warm ups (beginning of the math block-5 to 15 minutes) to implement number talks. Daily number talks help build a student's number sense mentally, without paper and pencil. This is where students have to verbally justify their strategy on how they solved a problem. Number sense is a key foundational skill to becoming a proficient mathematician. Students who have strong number sense are able to efficiently make sense of numbers visually to mentally perform calculations quickly.

Staff at have received professional development during the month of September on number talks for implementation in their own classroom. Starting October and for the remainder of the year, teachers will use number talks as their warm up. To build teachers capacity on number talks they all received a copy of Sherry Parrish's book, *Number Talks* as their math book study this year and will continue to receive support from the instructional coaches.




STAR Math

Last year our goal was to increase proficient and decrease proficient by 10%, we met both goals in each grade level in STAR Math! This year our goal is to increase proficient and decrease intensive by 15%. In 2nd grade, we currently have 5% proficient in Tier 1. Our goal is to increase that to 20%. Also, in 2nd grade we currently have 76% in the intensive Tier 3. Our goal is to decrease that to 61%.



| 2nd Grade | Number of students | Percent |

In 3rd grade, we currently have 14% proficient in Tier 1. Our goal is to increase that to 29%. Also, in 3rd grade, we currently have 70% in the intensive Tier 3. Our goal is to decrease that to 55%.

Monthly Cultural Day

Last year we decided to have monthly cultural days and it turned out to be a success; in terms of providing an access for students to culture. This year we are structuring it differently; we are having teacher plan out their activity and look for all the ways geometry is tied to that lesson. During their lesson they must verbally tie in the geometric math standard to the cultural lesson. Geometry is our lowest standard and with all our cultural ties to geometry we need to leverage that point. Some of the activities our students had access to this month were: constellations, star quilt, storytelling with a quilt made of geometric designs, traditional game and making the games, fry bread making, making cupsii necklaces, beading, learning about the buffalo, iniskiims, pictographs, ledger art, Guided Blackfeet





workshop at Cuts Wood, and lodge designs.



Traditional Tuesday

The Aapaapaitsitapiipokaiksi (White Weasel Children) Immersion 3rd grade classroom challenged the entire school in having Traditional Tuesday (Traditional clothing could include: Ribbon skirts, Ribbon shirts, bead work, moccasins, Vests, head scarfs, belts, native print, dance outfits (or parts of), OR anything else you can think of that might be considered traditional clothing.) So in response to this some staff members held a sewing night to create ribbon skirts. We will be offering more nights for parents and staff to come a create a traditional item to wear.



Organized Play

We see the need for organized play at BES since Napi 4th graders are beginning tackle football. We are planning a training with the TAs on how to provide organized play during recess in the gym and on the playground. Our PE teacher will be assisting us with ideas and materials.
