Subject(s), Grade & School you teach at: Browning High School 9-12 Culture, Song/dance, and Blackfeet History


What is your favorite part of working for BPS? Working with a wonderful staff. Who sincerely cares for the students. The sense of purpose that is given to one life, the lightbulb moment of a student, sense of belonging and teaching the Blackfeet way of life. What better way to make an impact in our students" and community.

What topic is your favorite to teach about in the BNAS curriculum? Songs, dance, culture, language, and Blackfeet history. Blackfoot ways of knowing are inseparable from ceremonies expressing relationship and responsibilities. Thus, making a web that knits together the community. Teaching our songs, language and history conveys awareness of, commitment to, these relationships and responsibilities. This is why I love teaching! Who has inspired you the most as a teacher? Mrs. Ann Lunak never gave up on me. Mrs. Lunak's compassion, love, and most of all her devotion allowed me to have the confidence to follow my dreams. Mrs. Lunak is a class act.

What have you learned the most from virtual/remote learning? I have learned not to be scared of technology. I had to get out of my comfort zone and learn technology. Patience! Subject(s), Grade & School you teach at:

NAPI Elementary: 4th-grade immersion teacher/BNAS teacher. What is your favorite part of working for BPS? Greeting my immersion class Ksisskstukiipo'kaiks every morning and calling on them by their Blackfoot names. More recently, I have been enjoying organizing events that involve Blackfoot language, history & culture with my colleagues. What topic is your favorite to teach about in the BNAS curriculum? I am getting the opportunity to engage students in project-based learning, providing authentic, knowledgeable Blackfoot speakers. The students hear different perspectives. The students in my immersion class are engaged and participating. Teaching this style has been by far my favorite.

Who has inspired you the most as a teacher? My wife, Mrs.Heavy Runner, has always been an enormous support and advocate in my journey of becoming an educator. She always encouraged me to reach my full potential as a teacher. What have you learned the most from virtual/remote learning? I learned how imperative it is to provide structure and consistency to my students during these uncertain times. I want my students to know we are in this together. Technology has made this all possible for us to stay connected and support one another.
