

Dear Community Members,

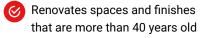
The School District has spent the past two years exploring options to balance the budget, improve operating efficiencies, and address our school facility needs. The District has held community engagement sessions and met with a Facility Task Force made up of parents, staff, and community members to gather ideas and feedback on how best to address these needs.

Ultimately, the District needs to develop a plan to:

Addresses operational budget shortcomings

Improves school safety, security, and accessibility

Replaces aging and failing building systems



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Updates and expands classrooms to meet state guidelines

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Adds gym and performance space for school and community use

The cost to address these needs is greater than the District's annual operating budget can support. Thus, the School Board is considering asking voters to support one or more referendum questions. **Before a plan is finalized, the District wants to give all residents a voice in the planning process.** Therefore, we ask you to please take a few minutes to complete this important survey.

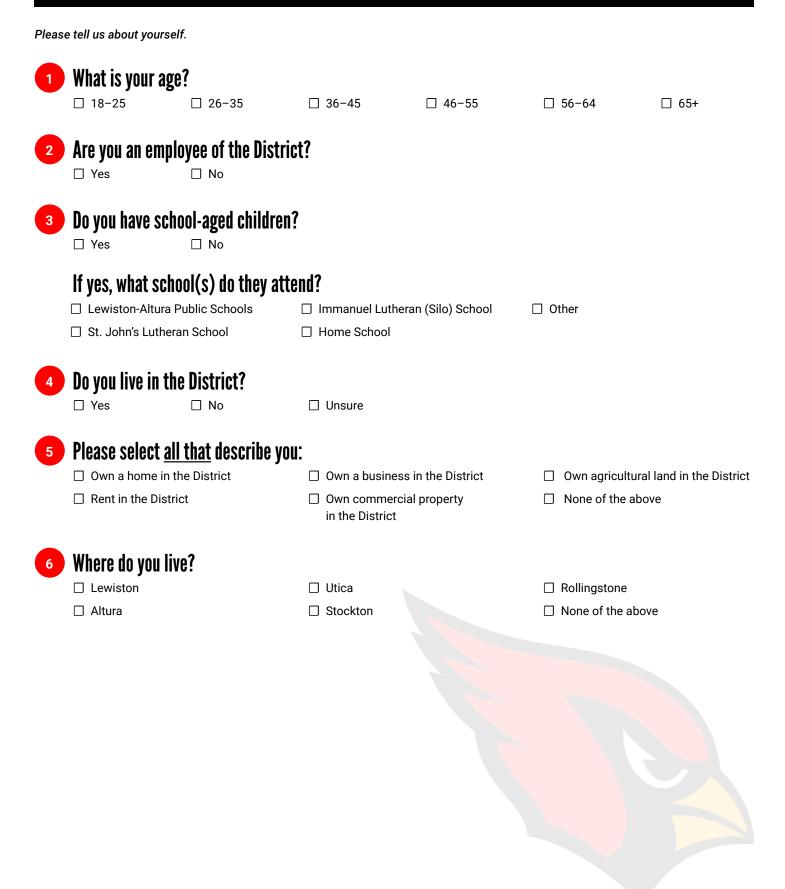

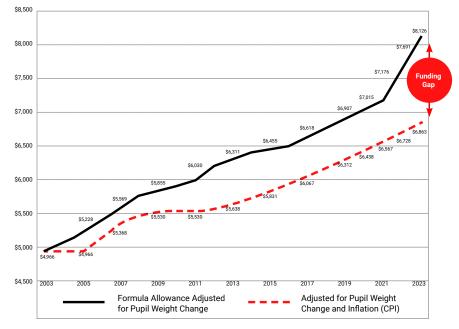
About You



School Operations Funding

The Lewiston-Altura School District is facing significant budget challenges due to **declining enrollment**, **increased costs**, **and a state funding formula that is not keeping up with inflation**. The District has addressed the financial challenges by reducing program budgets, delaying facility updates, and adjusting staffing. The District has also utilized fund balance (cash reserves), <u>a practice not sustainable</u>, as the District needs cash on hand to properly fund daily operations. In the past three years, the District has also filled various budget gaps with federal and state pandemic dollars. However, these are <u>one-time funds that will</u> <u>not be available to the District in the future</u>. As enrollment declines, the District will receive even less revenue from the state.

GENERAL EDUCATION FORMULA ALLOWANCE



The closure of the Altura building will provide approximately \$255,000 additional savings, as the District will have one less building to heat, clean, and operate. Even with this savings and the reductions that have been made to-date, the District is anticipating annual budget deficits in the years ahead.

The District will need a voter-approved operating levy or reduce operating expenses by:

- Increasing class sizes
- Reducing course offerings
- · Eliminating programs and activities
- · Limiting compensations adjustments

The chart to the right identifies the estimated tax impact based on property values for a \$1,000 per pupil unit operating levy.

The District would like to know your willingness to support an operational levy.

DID YOU KNOW?

School districts receive the majority of their funding from the State. The largest portion of this funding, which comes from the basic general education formula, has not kept up with inflation, resulting in school districts **receiving \$1,263 less per student** than they did 20 years ago. This is a major reason why many school districts across the state are facing significant budget challenges.

School Facility Updates

In addition to addressing the District's operating budget challenges, the District has been exploring options to address school facility needs to better serve students and our communities. District voters will need to support a bond referendum to provide the funding to complete school facility updates.

It has been 27 years since District voters supported school facility updates through a bond referendum. As a result, the District has been unable to address major projects nor renovate educational spaces to current needs. The District has identified the following needs and opportunities as they consider potential projects:

SAFETY + SECURITY

The school entrances need to be redesigned to better regulate school visitors. Visitor entrances are needed at the main office so that guests are welcomed by staff before accessing the school. In addition, traffic flow needs to be redesigned around both schools to improve safety.

AGING INFRASTRUCTURE + WORN FINISHES

The high school was originally built in 1965 and the elementary school in 1974. Many of the building systems and finishes are from the original construction, have far reached the end of their service life, and are in need of replacement.

OUTDATED EDUCATIONAL SPACES

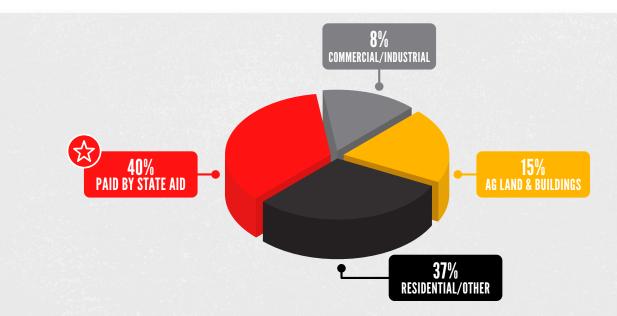
Many classrooms and the high school science labs are undersized and outdated. As a result, they lack the adequate infrastructure to support existing equipment and technologies, as well as student collaboration areas and flexible learning spaces needed for today's educational programming.

LACK OF GYM + PERFORMANCE SPACE

The amount of gym space in the District can no longer reasonably meet school and community needs. In addition, a performance space with appropriate sound and lighting is needed for student and community performances, presentations, and large group events.

STATE FINANCIAL SUPPORT

The District's facility projects would **qualify for the School Building Bond Agricultural Credit**. This credit, approved in 2017 and enhanced in 2019, reduces property taxes paid on agricultural land for school improvements by 70% for taxes payable in 2023 and beyond. **Due to the School Building Bond Agricultural Credit, the state's share of the tax burden of a bonded project benefiting our school community would be approximately 40%**.



Option 1: Academics

After reviewing all of the potential needs, the Task Force created a Base Plan that addresses the most critical academic and building needs of the District. These projects could be funded through a bond referendum. The plan includes:

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL UPDATES

- · Redesign traffic flow to separate bus, vehicle, and pedestrian traffic
- · Remodel the front entrance to better regulate visitor access
- Extend corridor walls to the roof deck to keep noise from transferring from classroom to classroom
- Update plumbing and electrical systems that have exceeded their service life
- · Upgrade gym flooring and classroom finishes
- Replace inefficient exterior windows and complete tuck pointing to address water infiltration
- Expand kindergarten classrooms
- Renovate restrooms

HIGH SCHOOL UPDATES

- Redesign traffic flow to separate bus, vehicle, and pedestrian traffic
- Remodel the front entrance to better regulate visitor access
- Replace the heating and ventilation (HVAC) system in remaining portion of the school
- Update plumbing and electrical systems that have exceeded their service life
- Replace roof sections, inefficient
 exterior windows, and fire alarm system
- Repair exterior masonry and complete tuck pointing
- Renovate the Media Center and identified classrooms to create greater flexibility for hands-on learning
- Replace B Gym flooring
- · Improve the choir and band rooms with additional storage, practice rooms, and acoustical panels
- · Expand the Career and Technical Education (Shop) Labs to allow for additional course offerings and updated equipment
- · Address Americans with Disabilities (ADA) Act code compliance issues
- · Update and expand weight/fitness areas and locker rooms
- · Add multipurpose space for wrestling, dance, and community use
- · Add a transportation garage for safely storing and repairing District buses







Option 1: Academics

The cost to complete all of the projects identified in Option 1 is estimated at \$26.3 million. The chart below shows the tax impacts of a successful bond referendum to support these projects.

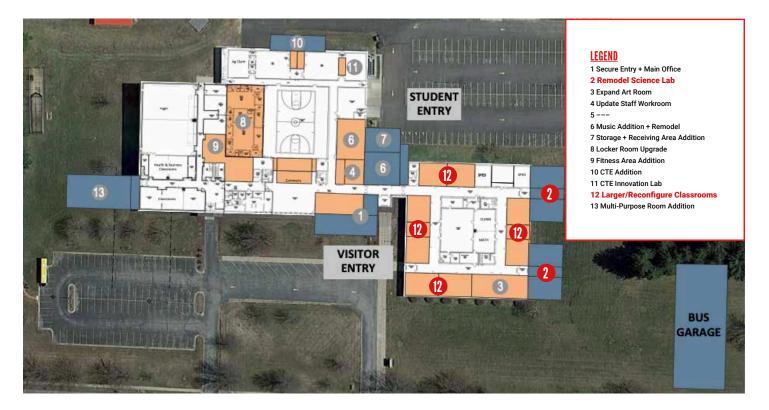

Option 2: Academics Plus

This option completes all of the projects in Option 1 **AND** enlarges and reconfigures some high school classrooms to meet size guidelines and create small group learning spaces.

- · Build larger science classrooms to improve spaces for students to complete labs and group projects
- · Expand and improve existing art room

Funding Support for Option 2

The cost to complete the additional projects is estimated at \$6.9 million. Therefore, the cost to complete Option 2: Academics Plus is \$33.2 million.

The bond could be further expanded to include building a gym and renovating the exiting gym into an auditorium.

ADDITIONAL GYM SPACE FOR ACTIVITIES

The existing gyms at the high school are undersized and the lack of space requires the wrestling team to practice in the lower level of the elementary school. Junior high school teams must travel to the elementary school for practices in the fall (volleyball), winter (basketball), and spring (baseball and softball until the outdoor fields are ready).

A proposed activities gym will eliminate the need to transport high school students to the elementary school for practices, as well as enable the District to have indoor spring practices in spaces more adequately designed for indoor throwing and hitting without damaging lights and walls. An additional gym would also enable the District to host tournaments, which would generate revenue for both the District and community.

A TWO-COURT GYM

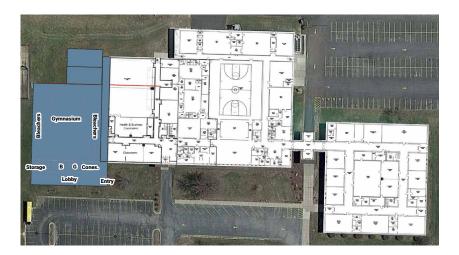
- · Provide more space for physical education
- Increase space for school and community use, especially in the winter months
- Provide needed practice space for school teams and youth programs
- Provide sufficient space to host youth sporting events

THE SPACE COULD INCLUDE:

- · A competition gym with two cross courts
- Storage
- Lobby
- · Restrooms and concessions
- Locker rooms

AUDITORIUM FOR THE ARTS

The existing gym could be renovated into an auditorium.

The District regularly hosts student band and choir concerts, plays, and other performances. These events are held in the gyms with bleacher or folding chair seating, and limited lighting and acoustical equipment. Rehearsals and other performance preparations are limited due to using an unsecured stage that is also easily accessed by users of the cafeteria or gym. Production choices are limited because of our restricted stage size and support spaces. This limits the depth of benefits for students from not experiencing more complex and engaging drama and musical performances.

The proposed auditorium would be used for student assemblies and events, music performances (band/choir), plays, and large group academic presentations. It would also be used for community events with visiting musicians, speakers, or larger audiences for Fools Five, Heartland Days, or other community activities.

This space could include:

- Seating for 450 people
- A stage
- · Dressing rooms and a green room
- Set shop and storage
- Lobby and restroom

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The District would like to know if voters would support the bond referendum being further expanded to include renovating the gym into an auditorium.

The cost to build a gym and renovate the gym into an auditorium is \$12.4 million. Therefore, the cost to address all of the projects identified in this survey is \$45.6 million.
