PURPOSE: Credit recovery. Students must have taken the class previously and failed it.

HOW MANY CREDITS CAN BE EARNED?

Up to 1.5 credits (three trimester classes) for credit recovery. Students must be there every day for the full five hours and work hard to complete that much credit. Most students will only be able to complete one trimester class and earn .5 credit.

WHAT ARE THE CLASSES LIKE: All classes will be taken online – through Ed Options. Students will work individually, on the computer to complete classes. There will be support available from teachers and staff.

CHARGE: There will be a charge of \$50.00 for the first class taken, \$40.00 for the 2nd, and \$30 for the 3rd class. However, upon successful completion of the class, half the cost will be deducted from the bill. This means that if you complete three classes – or 1.5 credits, it will cost you \$60. This is how it will work:

- An initial non-refundable deposit of \$5.00 will be required to secure a "computer slot".
- The remaining \$20 for the first class will be paid on or before the first day of summer school.
- If students do not complete the course or drop out of summer school, an additional \$25.00 (or the amount that is not paid from the \$50.00 fee) will be billed to the student's school account. No monies will be refunded.
- If students cannot pay the remaining \$20.00 before summer school, please contact JoAnn Bethany or Patrice Tucker and arrange a payment plan.

SUBJECTS: Various classes in English, Math, Science, Social Studies, Health. Most appropriate classes for you to make up will be decided by counselor and administration.

ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENTS: Depending on what you need to make up, attendance requirements will be set for all or part of the four-week term. Once a commitment of time has been set, it is expected that students will be there every day.

ESSENTIAL INFORMATION FOR THE CLASS OF 2011

In a few short days, our seniors will step into the next phase of their lives. For the most part they are anxious for this to happen and are excited about their futures. Life is a series of milestones, but high school graduation has to be one of the most important. It truly is that event that opens many other doors to students. It is the end of childhood and a step into the "real world" that parents and teachers have been talking about for the last four years.

Parents, this is the time of year to keep in close contact with the academic progress of your senior student. We have some seniors who are on a plan with counseling in order to complete all their credits for graduation on June 8th. Do

not just assume that your student is doing what needs to be done. Stay in contact with their teachers, Ms. Tucker or one of the administrators to make sure your student is on target.

As the year is quickly coming to an end, we need to make sure that students have everything that is required for graduation pulled together.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HOURS

Students must earn 15 community service hours over the course of their high school career as a part of the Career Related Learning Standards. The final day to clear those is June 3rd. Please ask your student if those have been cleared with Ms. Gamble

LIBRARY

All library books must be returned to Mr. Faircloth. If a book has been lost, it must be paid for. This is the time to do a sweep of bedrooms and other rooms in the house to find any library books or textbooks that belong to IVHS and get them returned.

GRADES

All grades must be cleared by Ms. Tucker by noon of June 3rd. No extra time will be given to complete coursework and to walk in graduation. If a student is failing a class or has not completed a class on June 3rd that is required for graduation, the student will not walk in graduation. On noon of the 3rd. we will have the list of students who will be walking on June 8th

2+2 CREDITS

Many of our vocational classes and a few of our core classes can earn 2+2 credit. These credits are transcripted to RCC and will count in most Oregon Community Colleges and Oregon Universities. The credits are at no cost to the students. We have students who start college with 12 or more credits. Students must have received an A or B in the class to earn credit. Students who have taken 2+2 classes must register before the end of the school year if they want credit. Credits do not transfer into the next year. They will NOT be able to come back in the fall and get those credits transcripted.

GRADUATION PRACTICE

There are two graduation practices—both are mandatory-and students must be on time. The first is on Tuesday, June 7th, from 1:00—3:00 PM. It will be in the gym. The second is on Wednesday, June 8th, from 10:00 AM -12:00 PM. It will be in the gym or on the football field, depending on the weather. Seniors need to bring their caps and gowns to the Wednesday practice where a group photo will be taken. Information on purchasing pictures will be given at the **Tuesday practice.**



MORE ESSENTIAL INFORMATION FOR THE CLASS OF 2011

SENIOR PROJECTS-MUST BE COMPLETED TO GRADUATE !

The last opportunity for seniors to present their projects is May 18, 2011 from 4:00 - 5:45. About half of the seniors have presented at the previous two opportunities. Senior parents, please, work with your student and encourage them to not procrastinate. Passing all components of the Senior Project is a requirement for graduation.

Students will present their project to a panel of judges comprised of administrators, school staff and community members. Projects are scored using the state scoring guide. Students must provide evidence of meeting two or more of the *Essential Skills* such as reading and interpreting text, applying math, speaking effectively and demonstrating community involvement. They must also include evidence that their project reflects two or more of the *Work Ethic Sills* such as time management, reliability, initiative, dedication, checking for accuracy, etc.

Senior Project Orals are an opportunity for students to present an accomplishment of which they are proud that demonstrates their overall preparedness to move on to life past high school.

FEES AND FINES

Graduating seniors will not receive their diploma until all fines and fees have been paid. Ms. Hall has kept you and your students informed of these fines. They can still walk at graduation but the diploma cover will not hold their official diploma. Call the school and speak to Ms. Hall if you have questions.

MISSING CREDITS NEEDED FOR GRADUATION ?

We have a number of seniors that must do some credit recovery in order to graduate this year. Since there are only **3 weeks** left to make up any failed credits from your four years of high school, you need to "pour on the fire". You are nearly out of time. All work must be completed and graded by June 3 to walk in this year's graduation. If you have classes to make up and are not currently working on them, see Ms. Tucker immediately. Ms. Engles or Mrs. Merrill will be available in Room 9, Monday— Thursday, from 3:30 to 5:30 to help you. Take advantage of this opportunity to make up those credits needed for graduation.

SENIORITIS!

This is the time of year to keep in close contact with the academic progress of your senior student. We have some seniors who are on a plan with counseling in order to complete all their credits for graduation by June the 3rd. Do not just assume that your student is doing what needs to be done. Senioriitis has already hit! Stay in contact with their teachers, Ms. Tucker or one of the administrators to make sure your student is on target.

The last day of school for seniors is **June 3rd.** Students <u>must have everything completed</u> by the end of that day in order to walk at graduation on June 8th.

SYNERVOICE

After receiving an automated call concerning your student's absences from our new phone messaging system, Synervoice, please call the school in the morning to clear your student's absences. The number is 541-592-2116; ask for the attendance office. It is very important for you and your student to have these absences cleared. Students end up doing lunch detentions for uncleared absences.

We will sometimes use Synervoice to send out important messages about school closures and school events. When you get a call from the school using Synervoice, it is important that you say "hello" as this triggers the message. If you have voicemail, it will leave a message. If you have email registered with the school, we will often send emails as well.

TRSD POLICY JN—STUDENT FEES, FINES, & CHARGES

Per district (policy JN) and state law (HB# 3044 passed in 2003), student report cards, diplomas, and/or other school records cannot be released if fines totaling \$50.00 or more are still owed. Transcript transfer requests will be honored.

It is important that these fines are paid in a timely manner as they stay on the record and graduating students who owe fines will not get their diploma until all fines are paid. Sometimes these fines accumulate to over \$300 and this expense is hard on families at the time of graduation. The district may pursue the matter through a private collection agency or other method available to the district.

Certainly, the first thing you should do is to ask your student to look for the missing books, athletic uniforms, etc. If these items can be found and returned to the school, these fines will be removed and the record will be cleared.

If a part of this fine is an athletic uniform that was used in a club sport, such as wrestling, and you are sure the uniform was turned in, you might contact the coach.
