| Recommendation: Administration recommends the approval of the revisions to policy EIE Local with updates to information on Student Promotion for implementation beginning with the 2015-2016 school year. |
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| Rationale: Language for promotion has been simplified and grade-levels have been separated to focus on student needs based on their enrolled grade-level. Approving these revisions will allow administration to update grading guidelines and the student code of conduct handbook for the 2015-2016 school year. |

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PROPOSED REVISIONS FOR the 2015-2016 SCHOOL YEAR

CURRICULUM MASTERY

Promotion and course credit shall be based on mastery of the curriculum. Expectations and standards for promotion shall be established for each grade level, content area, and course and shall be coordinated with compensatory, intensive, and/or accelerated services. [See EHBC] The District shall comply with applicable state and federal requirements when determining methods for students with disabilities [see FB] or students who are English language learners [see EHBE and EKBA] to demonstrate mastery of the curriculum.

STUDENTS RECEIVING SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

Any modified promotion standards for a student receiving special education services shall be determined by the student's admission, review, and dismissal (ARD) committee and documented in the student's individualized education program (IEP). [See EHBA series and EKB]

STANDARDS FOR MASTERY

In addition to the factors in law that must be considered for promotion, mastery shall be determined as follows:

- 1. Course assignments and unit evaluation shall be used to determine student grades in a subject. An average of 70 or higher shall be considered a passing grade.
- Mastery of the skills necessary for success at the next level shall be validated by assessments that may either be incorporated into unit or final exams or may be administered separately. Mastery of at least 70 percent of the objectives shall be required.

PRE-K AND KINDERGARTEN

As a general practice, a student in pre-K or kindergarten shall not be retained. If retention is considered, it must be for academic purposes and shall require approval of the student's parent and the Curriculum and Instruction Grade Placement Committee.

GRADES 1-5

In grades 1–5, promotion to the next grade level shall be based on an overall average-final grade of 70 on a scale of 100 based on course-level, grade-level standards (essential knowledge and skills) for all subject areas and a grade of 70 or above in three-four of the following areas: language arts, reading, mathematics, science, and social studies. For English Language Learners (ELL), the language arts grade shall be determined by averaging the English/Spanish language arts grade and the ESL grade only. Reading shall be a separate and independent grade for all students.

A student in grade 5 shall be permitted to take summer school for remediation in no more than three of the following areas: language arts, reading, mathematics, science, and social studies.

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GRADES 6-8

In grades 6–8, promotion to the next grade level shall be based on an overall average of 70 on a scale of 100 based on course-level, grade-level standards (essential knowledge and skills) for all-subject areas and a grade of 70 or above in three of the following subject areas: language arts, reading, mathematics, science, and social studies. For English Language Learners (ELL), the language arts grade shall be determined by averaging the English language arts grade and the ESL grade only.

Students in grades 6 - 8 shall be permitted to take summer school for remediation in no more than three of the following areas: language arts, reading, mathematics, science, and social studies.

GRADES 9-12

Grade-level advancement for students in grades 9–12 shall be earned by course credits. [See EI]

ACCELERATED INSTRUCTION

If a student fails to demonstrate proficiency on a state-mandated assessment, the student shall be provided accelerated instruction in accordance with state law. Additionally, students in grades 5 and 8 shall be subject to all provisions of GRADE ADVANCEMENT TESTING, below.

GRADE ADVANCEMENT TESTING Except when a student will be assessed in reading or mathematics above his or her enrolled grade level, students in grades 5 and 8 must meet the passing standard on the applicable state-mandated assessments in reading and mathematics to be promoted to the next grade level, in addition to the District's local standards for mastery and promotion.

DEFINITION OF 'PARENT'

For purposes of this policy and decisions related to grade advancement requirements, a student's "parent" shall be defined to include either of the student's parents or guardians; a person designated by the parent, by means of a power of attorney or an authorization agreement as provided in Chapter 34 of the Family Code, to have responsibility for the student in all school-related matters [see FD]; a surrogate parent acting on behalf of a student with a disability; a person designated by the parent or guardian to serve on the grade placement committee (GPC) for all purposes; or in the event that a parent, guardian, or designee cannot be located, a person designated by the Superintendent or designee to act on behalf of the student. ALTERNATE ASSESSMENT INSTRUMENT The Superintendent or designee shall select from the state-approved list, if available, for each applicable subject an alternate assessment instrument that may be used for the third testing opportunity. Each student's GPC shall decide whether he or she shall be given the statewide assessment instrument or the applicable alternate instrument for the third testing opportunity. The committee's decision shall be based on a review of the student's perfor-

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mance in the previous testing opportunities, local assessments, and any other circumstances it deems appropriate.

STANDARDS FOR PROMOTION UPON APPEAL If a parent initiates an appeal of his or her child's retention following the student's failure to demonstrate proficiency after the third testing opportunity, the GPC shall review all facts and circumstances in accordance with law.

The student shall not be promoted unless:

- All members of the GPC agree that the student is likely to perform on grade level if given additional accelerated instruction during the following school year in accordance with the educational plan developed by the GPC; and
- The student has completed required accelerated instruction in the subject area for which the student failed to demonstrate proficiency.

Whether the GPC decides to promote or to retain a student in this manner, the committee shall determine an accelerated instruction plan for the student for the following school year, providing for interim reports to the student's parent and opportunities for the parent to consult with the teacher or principal as needed. The principal or designee shall monitor the student's progress during the following school year to ensure that he or she is progressing in accordance with the plan.

TRANSFER STUDENTS

When a student transfers into the District having failed to demonstrate proficiency on applicable assessment instruments after two testing opportunities, a GPC shall convene for that student. The GPC shall review any available records of decisions regarding testing and accelerated instruction from the previous district and determine an accelerated instruction plan for the student.

If a parent initiates an appeal for promotion when a student transfers into the District having failed to demonstrate proficiency after three testing opportunities, the GPC shall review any available records of decisions regarding testing, accelerated instruction, retention, or promotion from the previous district and issue a decision in accordance with the District's standards for promotion.

ASSIGNMENT OF RETAINED STUDENTS

In the event a student is not promoted to the next grade level, the District shall nevertheless assign the student to an age-appropriate campus unless:

- 1. The student's parents request that the student be assigned to the same or a similar campus setting; or
- 2. The student's GPC determines that it would be in the student's best interest to be assigned to the same or a similar

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campus setting. Criteria to be considered for this decision may include:

- a. Recommendations from the student's teachers.
- b. Observed social and emotional development of the student.

REDUCING STUDENT RETENTION

The District shall establish procedures designed to reduce retaining students at a grade level, with the ultimate goal being elimination of the practice of retaining students. [See EHBC]

PARENT REQUEST

A parental request to retain a student who has met promotion requirements shall be denied unless a recommendation for retention is made by the student's ARD committee or Section 504 committee in accordance with federal requirements.
