

Please find below a summary of the past month's professional development, curriculum design, and personnel updates for each of the departments.

#### <u>CTE Department – Colleen Del Monaco, Director</u> <u>Curriculum Updates –</u>

- ♦ West Fire Science Chief Chiappetta brought a Thermal Imaging Camera (TIC) from the fire department. Mr. Nolan was kind enough to give accommodation for the fire science class to testthe TIC. The device is used for search and rescue operations and for fire source detection when there's zero visibility. There are different models/sizes in every fire department. This is a small version red in color, held by a student.
- ♦ West Welding assisting fire protection class by providing the fire for their thermal camera
- ♦ East Accounting II and IV classes had the opportunity to have a guest speaker this month. Jonathan Ruiz, a financial advisor from Merrill Lynch spoke to the students during career week. Students were exposed to potential college majors and career opportunities in the industry.
- ♦ East students from all areas of CTE did a fabulous job talking with Freshman at the FC Elective fair on November 26th about their course options as they transition over to Morton East next year.
- ♦ East Accounting II and IV students had the opportunity for a guest speaker, Jonathan Ruiz, a financial advisor from Merrill Lynch spoke during career week at East. Students were able to hear about potential college majors and various career opportunities related to accounting.
- ♦ Accounting students have adapted well to the "old fashioned" accounting methods and have been completing work on traditional journals, exposing students to how accounting was done before technology.
- ♦ East Early Childhood Education III students planned a family STEAM day for the Mini Mustang Preschoolers.
- ♦ East Culinary arts had a successful grab n' go breakfast the Friday before Thanksgiving break, selling homemade goodies to students and staff including the infamous scones, chocolate chip cookies, yogurt parfaits, overnight oats, breakfast sandwiches and of course coffee and lattes.
- ♦ Morton East Teaching Methods students participated in a regional Education focused team-based challenge at Triton College. 12 schools and over 200 students participated in various events focused on the field of education. The judges were amazed at what our Morton students came up without the use of any technology. One of our student groups took 2<sup>nd</sup> place in the "interdisciplinary lesson plan" competition.


























#### **Career and Work Based Learning**

#### • Programmatic Updates:

- Career Focus Week took place November 18-22. The week included a resume workshop, a trades & expo fair, a military fair, and industry professionals who visited classrooms as guest speakers. Three Morton alums were guest speakers. Dania Melendez from FGM Architects (West), Oscar Barraza from the CME Group (East) and Jonathan Ruiz (East) from Merrill Lynch Wealth.
- 7 students attended the Education Pathways Team-Based Challenged sponsored by Ridgewood HS held at Triton College on November 22nd. One team, Interdisciplinary Lesson Plan Team, won a 2nd place medal. Teacher Ashley Engebretsen accompanied and coached the students during the challenge.

#### **East College & Career Center highlights:**

- Since the beginning of the school year through 12/1/24, the Morton East CC Center has had 2,083 student contacts.
- Career Week- November 18-22
  - o Events held included Trades Expo, Military Career Fair, and career speakers in classrooms
    - Fifteen different trades related organizations were in attendance for the trades expo.
    - Approximately 1,400 students took part in the various career week events
- Six college admissions representatives scheduled meetings with students interested in learning more about opportunities within their institutions.

#### **English Learners and Modern Languages- Melody Becker**

#### Curriculum Updates -

#### **College**

EL 3 students compared and contrasted themselves. In the middle they shared their similarities. They shared someone else's part to the class in the target language. This activity will help EL 3 students practice for their compare and contrast essay.

EL 4 students continued with their persuasive unit. Students: - created a visual stance of their research topic (pictures), participated in "Dialogue Dash w/ Peer Feedback" (video/images) a version of speed dating, students present their position and reasons to their partner and try to convince them. Afterwards their listener gives them feedback on what they did well and what they can do to improve their argument - did a "Persuasive Essay" escape room. They had to figure out the clues to form a thesis statement and use the clues to get them to the puzzle (the parts of a body paragraph they had to put back in order) to "escape" and claim their prize completed the final drafts of their persuasive essay the old-fashioned way, paper and pencil. AP Spanish Lang moved from writing to speaking. They are working on cultural comparisons Spanish Lit continues to practice the FRQs independently. SLA V is reading "La casa de Bernarda Alba", acting it out as well as watching a movie to see the difference between reading a play and actually seeing one. Through November, SLA IV began their second unit about our ancestors. Looking at different indigenous groups in Spanish speaking countries and read different legends and talked about what a real legend is. They learned how to analyze reading. They also learned the difference between verb tenses for the past, imperfect and preterit, and when to use them to get ready for them to write their own legend. Students began adding work to their honor's portfolio and have written their introduction as well as the reflection to the category they have added to their portfolio. This way they won't be stressed during the second semester working on their portfolio.





- English II Core and AP Seminar will begin the curriculum writing process later this semester to have a new curriculum ready to roll out next school year.


#### **Professional Development -**

#### **Curriculum Updates**

- The Math Department wrapped up our first semester curriculum writing at the end of October. We had many teachers writing and refining curriculum for the courses:
  - o Integrated Math II Honors
  - o Integrated Math III Honors (new course this year)
  - o AP Precalculus (new course this year)
  - While we have a long way to go to complete our current status of writing, we have 5 days scheduled next semester to continue working on curriculum. The classes that will be focused on will be:
    - o Integrated Math II Core / Honors
    - o Summer Bridge Courses
    - Summer STEM Course

**Hanover Research:** Dr. Josh McMahon and Megan Holub met with the representatives from Hanover Research on October 21<sup>st</sup> to discuss the finalized Benchmark Project. We also discussed the survey that 67 teachers completed in November. We look forward to seeing the results to this survey.

Next, Megan Holub will be sending Hanover the names and contact information of about 20 teachers and administrators to complete an in-depth and in-person survey about Carnegie Learning.


**Integrated Math III:** The Integrated Math III Core and Honors teams at East and West completed their yearly catapult activity. Students build and use the catapult to model parabolas.

#### <u>Curriculum Updates –</u>

This has been a challenging few weeks, but the teacher and students have adapted and stayed on track to wrap up the semester. #### <u>Professional Development – </u>



- The Social Science and Fine Arts teachers did an excellent job this month navigating the network issues by continuing to provide quality and engaging learning opportunities for our students. Below are just some of the many examples of what was happening in the classroom during this unique time:
  - o Created daily SEL check-ins, with a strong focus on goal setting.
  - Provided more opportunities for students to engage in peer revision on argumentative and analysis answers.
  - O Students analyzed physical pictures, artifacts, and writings that they otherwise would have seen only on their laptop screen.
  - Video students worked on creating physical storyboards for future projects.
- Due to the network issues, two of our November department curriculum revision days had to be rescheduled for next semester. They will now take place on January 30<sup>th</sup> and February 25<sup>th</sup>. We will still remain on track for those course and their curriculum wave/timeline.
- On November 21<sup>st</sup>, the Chicago History PLT went on a field trip to the Chicago History Museum and several landmarks in the area. Students focused on a primary source from the trip and practiced their *analysis* skill on the following school days.



#### <u>Multi-Tiered System of Supports Department – Gloria Ramirez-Solis, Director</u> Curriculum Updates –

Our counselors have been busy planning and taking students to tour different colleges to spark more interest in post-secondary options. Recently, the East counseling team provided students the opportunity to visit Concordia University, while the Freshman Center counseling team partnered with the Morton College admissions team to tour Morton College.

The FC counselors and assistant principal of operations partnered with directors to host a two-day 10th grade Elective Fair. Several Morton East students attended to answer specific questions about electives and promote the courses they showcased. The first day featured fine arts, music, physical education, social studies, and modern language courses, while the second day focused mainly on career and technical education courses. We thank all who participated in showcasing the wide range of electives offered, as these courses help prepare our students to be college- and career-ready.





East hosted a Trades and Manufacturing Fair, as well as a Military Fair. Students were provided with valuable information about these career pathways, including detailed descriptions of job opportunities, required skills, and potential educational paths. Representatives were present to answer questions, offer insights into the work environment, and discuss potential internships. The event allowed students to explore different options, ask questions, and consider how these fields align with their interests and career goals. Opportunities like these ensure that our Morton graduates are career-ready.







#### **Professional Development –**
