Beaverton Foursquare financially supports the Backpack and SHINE program. They partner with the school to serve our families through Brain Break, Thanksgiving food boxes, and Compassion Clinic. Members of their staff and church volunteer to help with classes during SHINE.

Cedar Hills Baptist Church worked hard to provide and deliver Holiday Food Boxes for over 25 Barnes families this season.

Community members have been coming to read with our Kindergartners, so our read to me students can achieve the goal of being a 500-Book Kid.

Barnes Elementary received a grant through Let's Move Active Schools to start a Marathon Kids program. The runners meet for an hour after school on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The 57 students will continue to meet through the end of the school year with the goal of accumulating 104.8 miles (four marathons).

We are working hard to continue the programs we have as well as initiate new ones, like a Lunch Buddy Program to help our students engage with our community members socially within a controlled environment.

Barnes is reaching out to our other Faith Partners to help with the second half of our school year, providing support for staff.

Plans for the 2015-2016 school year:

Oregon Food Bank: Partnership to provide the first full service food pantry open to all Greenway students/families. The pantry will include fresh produce along with non-perishables. OFB provided all equipment, training and will provide ongoing support.

Tualatin River National Wildlife Refuge: Agency partnership to provide urban wildlife outreach pilot program with our students and access to Fanno Creek. Team will provide ongoing support for science based learning integrated with reading and writing. Plans to also support field trips, materials and natural science experts to collaborate with teachers. Provided space and education at no cost during teacher pre-service week.

TRNWR has presented in our 1st grade classrooms in preparation for their field trip. In addition, they have worked with our Kindergarten classes to provide a Puddle Stompers program to prepare students for their field trip in January.

THPRD: Attends Back to School Night to share resources with families, hosts ESL family swim night and tour of facility. Assists our ESL team with registering non-English speaking families for programs and activities.

Greenway Parent Teacher Organization: Supports all school and community engagement efforts.

Latino Parent Teacher Organization: Supports all school and community engagement efforts in partnership with PTO. Facilitating multiple fundraising events. This group is also working to increase the school volunteering capacity of our Latino parent population.

Safe Routes to School/Washington County: Collaborates with principal, parent representative, Beaverton Police and central office to provide safe routes to school encouragement, education and reinforcement. Facilitates Walk and Bike to School Day, and attends Back to School Night to share resources and education with families.

Greenway Staff: ESL Teacher, Counselor, Parent Educator, & Social Support

Liaison: Each member represented on the CPT is the lead contact person for one or multiple groups represented on our team.

Greenway Neighborhood Association: Supporting our Food Pantry needs through regular volunteering. Due to this partnership, our food pantry is able to allow for more capacity of service to 5 surrounding schools on an as needed basis. The Greenway NAC would like to donate some funds towards purchasing scooter racks so more students are able to ride their scooters to school to decrease the amount of parents driving their children to school. The Greenway NAC would like to become more involved in supporting Greenway and finding new avenues to collaborate. Plans include students' academic success through volunteering at Greenway's homework club for kindergarten through fifth grade English Language Learners support students' with homework.

Beaverton Library: In Fall of 2015, the Beaverton Library has come to parent education events at Greenway to share with parents how to utilize the library, the resources that are available to them, and the importance of reading to their children at home. The Beaverton Library will be coming to the Kindergarten Roundup in the spring. This summer multiple grade levels will be challenged to complete the program with 100% participation to help reduce summer reading loss. Library events are now listed on the school calendar in the glass case in the lobby area of Greenway. This informs families of current events at the library. The library is scheduled to come to Homework Club twice for story time in February and March.

We have solidified some amazing community partnerships to benefit our Rock Creek students this school year. The first is our partnerships with Westview High School. We started by meeting with student groups from WHS including the SNHS (Science National Honor Society) group. These students have been applying their love of science through a partnership at Rock Creek that includes our Garden Club (the garden was built through a community partnership involving Remedy Church in July 2015), as well as through teaching science at Rock Creek after school. These students have been playing a critical role in helping teach and promote science at Rock Creek this school year.

We continue working with many community partners and boosters in order to build a running track at Rock Creek this school year. The track will support increased exercise and movement throughout the school day and will reduce the time students will spend having PE in the portable. Updated plans for the 2015-2016 school year:

- Continue connections to local resource that support our expeditions (inquiry units) – Tillamook Forest Center, Jackson Bottom Wetlands, PCC Rock Creek and other locations for field studies. PCC Rock Creek's resources for us include: gardens, wetland, and bat houses.
- Bethany Prebyterian – Campus clean-ups, in cooperation with local Cub Scout Pack. Bethany Presbyterian is also a source of volunteers for Springville programs. In addition pastor Trevor Walters is collaborating with Sparrow Clubs USA in order to have a local representative of Sparrow Clubs for a project at Springville.

- Cedar Mill Public Library, Marianne Coleson. We have plans for inviting a Cedar Mill librarian to classrooms in the spring to tell students about summer library opportunities. Marianne will be coming to our Kindergarten Orientation to support our message of reading as one of the most important things that parents can do with their children.

- Sparrow Clubs USA: The organization found a Sparrow family for us to support and corporate donors. Our students have been doing community service at our school and in the local community to "earn" the donations. One group of students made and sold things to earn money for our Sparrow. Hundreds of hours of service have been completed on our Sparrow's behalf. Thus we are both providing support to the family AND our students are growing by doing service at school and in their community. Our Sparrow Club celebration will be February 19, and Trevor from Bethany Presbyterian has been the local link to make this happen at Springville.

Plans for the 2015-2016 school year:

- We are continuing the Backpack Program in partnership with the St. Vincent de Paul Food Pantry at St. Pius X Catholic Church.
- We are continuing our Math Lab for all students in grades 3, 4, and 5.
- Sunset High School continues to be a Community Partner.
- We would like to coordinate a campus clean-up event this spring.
- Reconnect with Laurel Park at Bethany Village; establish regular volunteer opportunities at Terra Linda for their residents.
- Investigate the possibility of building a track on Terra Linda's campus and possibly build the track in Summer 2016.

Summary of Progress: *(please use additional pages if needed)*

- Our backpack program is continuing. We currently have 37 students accessing the program, but St. Pius has recently informed us they can support up to 45 students. Terra Linda ran a food drive in November, and we were able to support 43 students and their families with food

baskets just prior to Thanksgiving. Our community partners supported 30 students and their families with food and gift boxes prior to Winter Break. We plan to approach these students' families about opting into the Backpack Program as well. We are also looking for additional resources to expand the program beyond 45 students.

- Math Lab is still running strong. 3rd grade students meet with their math lab coaches every Monday, 5th grade students meet with their coaches every Tuesday, and 4th grade students meet with their coaches every Wednesday.
- Regarding the Elementary School Tutor program, we are trying a new method for connecting Sunset students with Terra Linda teachers. We have created a spreadsheet shared between Sunset and Terra Linda where Terra Linda teachers can identify when they would like a Sunset student assigned to their classroom. Sunset staff can look at the list and assign a student to a specific teacher. We are hoping this method will allow us to better meet the needs of Terra Linda students and staff and more efficiently allocate the amazing resource of Sunset High School students.
- The Campus Clean-up project is on hold due to the track project.
- Laurel Park update: Terra Linda will have the updated online volunteer system installed this spring. After it is installed, we will look for ways to create an online sign-up system to more efficiently offer volunteer opportunities to our community volunteers. We will then share this with Laurel Park residents. We are partnering with them on March 1st for Dr. Seuss's Birthday. They will be providing "Cat in the Hat" hats and a catered breakfast of Green Eggs and Ham to some of our students. Some of their residents will attend this event, too.
- Our track project is well underway. The PTC formally approved the project in November, so fundraising is our current focus. We have applied for several grants, and we have already received quite a number of community donations. We also have an anonymous donor who has offered to match up to \$100,000 in fundraising. Our plan is to begin construction in June of 2016 to install a quarter-mile track with a high-quality running surface, assuming all fundraising can be completed by June 1. We are very excited about this project!

Sunset Presbyterian Church is seeking to recharge their vision for supporting and building the community and as such would like William Walker to revision the types and timings of support. In previous years, they have sponsored one weekend in May in which over a hundred volunteers participated in a planned project. Now, they would like to have more projects at a smaller scale, hoping that volunteers will want to connect with the community on an on-going basis.

This is the third of a five-year Twenty-First Century grant through Impact Northwest. This, and the subsequent years, will see a decrease in the

funding provided each year. Along with the SHINE program, we will be seeking additional support and grants in order to maintain the SHINE afterschool and summer school program at William Walker.

Summary of Progress:

On January 29th, volunteers from Sunset Presbyterian spent the afternoon in teacher's classrooms assisting with labeling classroom libraries with IRLA levels. This activity will increase students' opportunities to independently choose a book at their reading level.



February 3, thirty-three volunteers from the Sunset Presbyterian's Senior Care group (55+) participated in our "Read to Me" program. At this time, we continue to seek additional resources so that together we can run a full summer program. Currently, we are applying for grants, such as the BEF grant. In January, Amy and Joann were contributors for a US Department of Ed Webinar, sharing information for other school sites at various stages of creating partnerships.

Remaining steps to complete the bio-swale include replanting and the placement of an informational sign. Clean Water Services will work with our sixth, seventh, and eighth grade SUMMA students to complete this project.

8th Grade Climate Change and Indigenous Peoples Culture Study (STEAM Narratives): We will once again partner with the Wisdom of the Elders and provide an in-depth study of climate change and its effects on Pacific Northwest and Alaskan indigenous peoples. We will host nine interactive learning sessions for our 8th grade students in April and this activity will culminate with a series of field trips in the community.

STEAM Fair: Our parents and community will be invited to join our Summa and 7th grade classes in an exploration of hands-on Science, Technology, Engineering, the Arts and Mathematics activities. The STEAM Fair will be built to be an interdisciplinary, engaging evening of activities and learning around STEAM. As of this date, confirmed participants include:

This year's BHS Key Club is very organized and committed to service. During the October Saturday session the Key Club organized a refurbishment of the front landscaping. The group contacted four local landscape

companies that donated materials and supervisory support. During the Saturday students replanted the flagpole roundabout, redid an abandoned swale, placed boulders for sitting near the cafeteria, pruned shrubbery throughout the campus, and spread bark dust.

Community partnership team: This group began last year and includes about 4-6 partners from various faith-based groups in the BHS area. We have added some additional faith partners since November. This fall, the group met and is developing plans for the group to support the existing programs of support that exist within the BHS community already—Beaver Den (food closet), Becca’s closet, homeless birthday baskets, and food support for families over holidays and breaks. We hope to expand the reach of the committee this year to include support for AVID and ASPIRE.

BHS Booster Club: They have provided ongoing support to “boost” student participation in activities and athletics as well as supporting students in many other ways. This year, already the club provided funds to support the BHS Dragon Boat team, ticket for a playoff football game, and last year gave five \$1,000 college scholarships to BHS graduates. In addition, the Booster Club is forging strong connections with the BHS Alumni community of over 30,000 and bringing them back to support BHS.

PSU: For the past two years BHS benefited from a strong partnership with Portland State University’s counseling program. This year PSU located two half time mental health interns at BHS during the day. In combination these two interns are able to provide 4 days of support for BHS students. Their total caseload is already close to 40 students. In addition, PSU marriage and family counseling interns are on campus every Tuesday evening to provide low cost couples and family counseling.

Beaverton School Based Health Center: The SBHC continues to grow in the number of patients served. The student committee is planning the year’s projects that will include various health related campaigns and events.

Success Fund: This year, the BHS Success Fund continues to support BHS students by providing resources in the areas of Academics, Student Supports, and Technology. Last year, 15 teachers applied for micro grants through the Site Council and these projects are already providing rich experiences for teachers and students alike. In the area of facilities, last summer the BHS library; student center, college and career center, and community room underwent remodels. The new spaces offer environments for collaboration and learning that all BHS students enjoy.

BHS Centennial Celebration: We started the official 100th year celebration in January with the release of the first Hall of Achievement inductees from the BHS Golden Grads. There are many activities being planned by the school and community partners.

Plans for the 2015-2016 school year:

1. To expand the opportunities for HS2 students to apply their learning in the community. In particular, we are trying to develop very specific and long-term experiences for students to work in small group or individual settings with industry professionals.
2. We will strategize how we can elevate community involvement in our Makerspace Project/Initiative. Our group will not only formulate the communication plan but also lead the outreach to community partners about the HS2 Makerspace.

Summary of Progress: *(please use additional pages if needed)*

Our community partnership team took part in a thoughtful brainstorm specifically looking at each High School grade level. We used the Socio Ecological Model to discuss how we can best support students, understanding the interconnectedness of students, school and community. We assessed a variety of needs specific to each grade level and identified challenges and expectations. In parallel, we asked students to participate in the same type of brainstorm. They were asked what skills they thought were necessary in each grade level to be successful. Based on the results, our team identified current projects and initiatives happening at HS2 that would benefit from our brainstorm and from increase community involvement.

Moving forward our community partnership team will participate in the planning process and launch of the HS2 Makerspace. Our team will work along side our Makerspace committee of staff and students. Together we will plan how to foster a combination of “soft” and “hard” skills in students, under the umbrella of the Makerspace. Inherent in any Makerspace is the idea that work is collaborative and creative, that students take control of their learning in a meaningful way.

Plans for the 2015-2016 school year:

ISB and Vose are continuing our partnership that supports free after school activities for Vose students. As part of the IB Middle Years and Diploma Programs, ISB students are required to design and implement service projects that benefit our community.

Friends of ISB volunteers annually plan a Culture Week that involves a school-wide philanthropic project, assemblies with keynote speakers, and a variety of breakout sessions. In light of current events, the theme of "human migration" emerged and a partnership with Mercy Corps was created.

Summary of Progress: *(please use additional pages if needed)*

Our partnership with Vose Elementary School continues to develop as ISB high school students lead after school activities there. The fall running program concluded in November. This spring additional activities will be added.

During the week of February 2-6, FRISB hosted ISB's annual Culture Week featuring keynote speaker Hartford, Education Manager of Mercy Corps. She delivered an address focusing on the Syrian crisis particularly the impact on teenage refugees, the countries receiving them, and the potential long-term impact on Syria. Students followed up in Advisory classes by exploring their own family's migration story after interviewing family members. Later in the week students were able to select from 40+ workshops that all included some aspect of human migration. Two philanthropic efforts included donations to Mercy Corps and participation in StudentsRebuild's Healing Classrooms Challenge. During lunch, students created pinwheels, a symbol of peace. For each pinwheel our school sends in, the Bezos Family Foundation will contribute \$2 to the International Rescue Committee's Healing Classroom program, which partners with schools in crisis zones to ensure students can recover, grow, develop and learn. Students are continuing this project at home and we will send our pinwheels in before Spring Break.

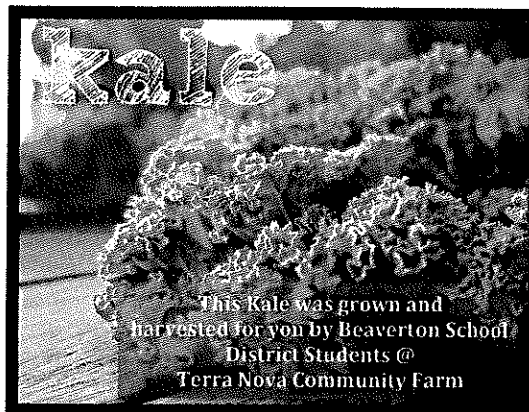

Updates for this school year:

1. Local Farm-to-School:

- a. Continued to use Oregon Farm-to-School grant funds to subsidize purchases of organic apples and pears for 2015-16 school lunches and suppers. Added Kale from BSD's Terra Nova Farm and Dried Cranberries from Vincent Family Farms in Bandon, Oregon.



2. Wellness Policy Revision Update

- a. The WP Advisory committee met in December and January to work on revised language to propose for the district's Wellness Policy and WP administrative regulations. The WP Advisory Committee worked in

conjunction with the Active Students Task Force Committee on proposed language that would split the district's overall Wellness Policy into two separate policies. - a. Provided a location and assistance to the OHSU Moore Institute in filming lunch at Five Oaks middle school's lunch. The Moore Institute was using the film footage to add to a nutrition education webinar that they were producing "*to disseminate widely as a tool for inspiring more nutrition education in Oregon schools. We wanted to bring alive the concepts of healthy school environment and active engagement with students as part of the production.*"
