Mr. McAdoo, here is a summary of the Advanced Placement scores we have been discussing.
Participation: 117 students in grades 9-12 took 176 tests in May 2005.

Approximately $6.8 \%$ of the graduating class scored a 3 or higher on one or more AP exams during their years at ACJ (Of course this does not include the number of students who earned college credit by taking one or more of the dual credit courses we offer.

During the past few years we have made progress with our Advanced Placement program. We have increased the number of AP courses offered, the number of students taking an AP course, the number of AP exams taken, the number of students taking exams and the number of scores in the range of 3-5.

This year however, the results are very disappointing. The results are summarized in the chart below.
