Helping Students in the Moment

Helping students regulate in the moment—during emotional outbursts, shutdowns, or challenges is a key focus in staff development. Rather than waiting for behaviors to pass or reacting with consequences alone, staff are learning how to recognize signs of escalation early and step in with calm, coregulation strategies. These timely interventions are helping students return to learning more quickly and building trust that lasts.

Supporting Every Student, Every Day: A District-Wide Commitment to Understanding Challenging Behavior

What makes the Unity School District truly exceptional is the people. From classrooms to cafeterias, buses to playgrounds, offices to maintenance—every staff member plays a vital role in supporting the students.

This year, a district-wide professional development session was held for all staff, including teachers, educational assistants, bus drivers, food service workers, custodians, daycare, maintenance personnel, kitchen teams, office staff, and other support personnel. The goal was simple: to equip everyone with the tools to understand student behavior better and support it, regardless of where or how they interact with them. Additional sessions were held for educational assistants and special education staff.

Karen Cass Felling, a licensed psychologist who has been consulting with Unity for over 20 years, returned. Her session, "Reframing Challenging Behavior," focused on what happens in the brain when students become dysregulated—and how we, as adults, can respond in ways that help rather than escalate.

Karen emphasized that what may appear to be defiance is often a student struggling to cope with their emotions. She shared strategies to:

- De-escalate emotional intensity
- Co-regulate with students in distress
- Create emotionally safe environments across all settings

The message was clear: Every interaction matters. Whether it's a kind word in the lunch line, calming actions and words during a meltdown, or a smile at the front door—these moments build connection and trust. And connection is what helps kids succeed. Staff appreciated not only the practical tools but also the acknowledgment that their roles are essential to student growth and well-being. No matter what the role, everyone makes a difference helping the students feel safe, supported, and successful—every single day.



DOTL Board Report September 2025

NEW TEACHER INDUCTION AND MENTORING PROGRAM

The 2025-26 New Teacher Induction and Mentoring program began on August 13th with new staff and their mentors attending an all day orientation. The day consisted of community building, district systems overviews, and mentoring time.

Unity's New Teacher Induction and Mentoring program has been updated to better reflect best practices in teacher mentorships. Mentors will be spending 30 minutes per week, on average, with their mentees each week. Trent Rasmussen, Director of Teaching and Learning, will be spending 15 minutes per week, on average, with new staff. Mentorship activities include one-on-one meetings, co-observations of experienced teacher, and mentor/mentee observation cycles.

In addition, mentors and mentees will be engaging in monthly seminars facilitated by Trent to cultivate sound instructional practices, instill district values, and develop the professionalism of our new staff.

The Unity Administrative Team has also developed a written handbook for the mentoring program to standardize and sustain our program for future years.
