Events:

Professional Development:

In March our focus in professional development was to continue to implement and refine our Instructional framework. Mel Riddile has been helping our district in the implementation of our instructional framework. In an article in <u>Principal Leadership</u> (2015) in which how an instructional framework helped his school he states:

Our schoolwide instructional framework is designed to make it easier for teachers to succeed in every lesson. The framework supports bell-to-bell instruction, increases student engagement, promotes purposeful reading, writing and discussion in every classroom and provides opportunities for metacognition and assessment for learning.

The framework that has been developed at BHS is designed to do the same thing. It provides a model for teachers to use, which can be used consistently across the school, and which helps teachers and students as described above. While Mr. Riddle was at BHS he participated in instructional walkthroughs with teachers, administrators, and our instructional coach. We then had discussions onwhat is working within our framework and next steps that we need to take to fully implement it. He then presented to the staff during our extended Wednesday professional development time. He was also able to sit in with our instructional team meetings on Friday to allow staff to discuss what he had presented, clarify how and why we are implementing the framework and answer questions.
