College Ready:

• Introduction to Teaching

Introduction to Teaching students spent November developing foundational skills such as classroom procedures, behavior expectations, and reward systems. As part of a literacy-focused project, students designed and delivered a Halloween-themed read-aloud experience, incorporating fluency practice along with pre- and post-lesson activities. These authentic learning projects allow students to directly experience the rigor of the teaching profession while building confidence in instructional strategies.

Career Ready:

• Welding Success at ETI Competition

Our Welding students had another impressive showing at the ETI Welding Competition on November 15th. Every participating student earned a \$250 scholarship to ETI. Additionally, two students won \$200 professional welding hoods, and another student received a high-quality welding jacket — a fantastic reflection of their skill and dedication.

• Future Educators Conference – ISU

Students enrolled in our Teaching & Education pathway attended the Future Teaching Conference at Illinois State University, gaining valuable exposure to educator preparation programs and future career opportunities in the education field.

• Dinner & a Show – Culinary Arts

Our Culinary Arts students showcased their professional skills while supporting the Morton 201 Education Foundation during the Fall Musical "Grease." Students planned, prepared, and served a themed meal that brought the 1950s diner experience to life for guests attending the performance. This hands-on event allowed students to demonstrate their culinary, hospitality, and customer service skills in a real-world environment, while proudly representing Morton's CTE programs and contributing to a meaningful community event.

COLLEGE

- Students continued participating in the Morton College field trip series throughout the year to explore academic programs, campus resources, and postsecondary opportunities.
- School counselors visited EDGE classes to discuss credits, graduation requirements, and long-term academic and career planning.
- In Mrs. Kennedy's Chemistry class at East, students engaged in a low-pressure recall activity, verbally reviewing their understanding of periodic table functions without a rubric or formal assessment.
- ASI teams administered academic benchmarks and monitored student progress to support preparedness for post–high school pathways.
- ED students received increased academic support to ensure they are on track and prepared for final exams.

CAREER

- In the FSI program, students participated in a real-world budgeting project in collaboration with their Employability class. Students received "paychecks" for completing jobs around the school, deducted monthly expenses during Applied Math, and practiced managing bills throughout the month. This hands-on experience builds financial literacy, responsibility, and decision-making skills essential for independent living.
- ASI students engaged in a community-based shopping experience at Target to develop real-world purchasing, budgeting, and navigation skills.
- The annual MTC Thanksgiving Feast remained a beloved tradition. Staff planned, prepared, and served a full holiday meal for all students, creating a meaningful community event that many look forward to every year.
- MTC students participated in multiple community outings, including visits to the Morton Arboretum and a local restaurant. These experiences reinforced in-school learning through practical application of skills such as community navigation, social interaction, safety, budgeting, ordering, and payment.
- MTC launched the Student of the Month program. Each teacher selected one student demonstrating outstanding behavior, growth, or goal achievement. Selected students were recognized with a public photo display and a small treat.
- Related students at Morton East volunteered at Feed My Starving Children in Schaumburg. Students collaborated as a team—coordinating roles and job rotations—and helped package enough food to support 68 children for an entire year. This experience also provided résumé-building community service.
- Students visited Riverside Bank to learn foundational concepts in financial literacy.
- The RTA visited work program classes to provide instruction on travel training, reduced fare cards, and public transit trip planning.
- Youth Crossroads facilitated three Zoom-based presentations for work program classes, offering students additional career-related learning and support.

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LIFE

- ASI and FSI students participated in a building-wide trick-or-treating activity, engaging with staff and peers to practice social communication and community interaction.
- ASI and FSI students completed an enrichment project in recognition of Día de los Muertos.
- ASI High Support classrooms celebrated Friendsgiving, practiced expressing gratitude, and continued building essential daily living skills.
- Students shared personal traditions and family experiences connected to Día de los Muertos, fostering cultural awareness and community connection.
- The ED Department placed a strong emphasis on social-emotional learning due to increased student anxiety, providing ongoing breaks, emotional support, and regulation strategies.

































English Learners and Modern Languages- Melody Becker

Curriculum Updates-

College

- At East, all **EL 2**—4 students completed a Student Reflection doc prior to testing. EL 4 took the AAPPL test, while **EL 2 and 3** took the STAMP test. This test is a monitoring tool and practice for ACCESS that EL students participate in annually. These tests are also used to measure English language proficiency for the Seal of Biliteracy.
- Each **EL PLT** has continued to work on Finish Line assessments as practice for each domain (reading, writing, listening, and speaking) which is modeled after ACCESS.
- EL 1 English has finalized their comic and will present for a speaking grade.
- EL 1 Reding has begun writing poetry and incorporating figurative language.
- EL 2 English have submitted their narratives for the mythical monsters. Students have used first person to tell their monster's story.
- **EL 2 Reading** has begun reading Frankenstein after reading about true crime such as Luigi Mangione and Gypsy Rose.
- EL 3 Students are currently reading *Everything We Never Had, by* Randy Ribay, and are beginning CA journal writing activity using Book Creator. EL 3 recently turned in a compare and contrast 5-paragraph essay
- EL 4 is working on ACT formatted essays and analyzing at three different perspectives, deciding which one aligns with individual beliefs, and defending a stance. There is a focus on speaking skills by having multiple discussions. At East, EL 4 has been working with instructional coaches and Multilingual Resource teachers to help students to increase their course grades.
- **AP Spanish Language** students just finished their first CA for the Cultural Comparasion. We are finishing Tema 2 and will complete the CA for Tema 2 this week.
- In **AP Spanish Literature** students are completing presentations about the story, "El hijo de Horacio Quiroga."
- French 1 is learning about telling time in French and just did a writing project for Earned Honors about their school schedule.
- French 2 is learning about food and the past tense and also just completed a writing project for Earned Honors describing a recipe they used to make for the holidays.
- Spanish 1 has started reading our novel Pobre Ana
- Alba" through a guided group reading of the three acts, accompanied by a reflective packet that helped them analyze the play's symbols, emotions, silences, and conflicts. They also completed listening activities in Formative using five explanatory audios recorded by the teacher, answering questions that assessed inference and literary understanding. Throughout the unit, students completed formative reading assessments, created a symbolic mural based on key objects from the play, and designed a Canva poster titled Psychological Profile, connecting each character's emotions, decisions, and dramatic actions. Their oral expression was assessed through a recorded reading, an explanation of a chosen symbol from the mural, and a final reflection on their assigned character. As a culminating activity, students began viewing the film adaptation of the play and used their reflective packet to compare the audiovisual representation with the written text. These integrated tasks strengthened their reading comprehension, critical analysis, oral expression, and symbolic interpretation.

FROM THE OFFICE OF Dr. Josh McMahon Assistant Superintendent for Educational Programs



- Spanish Language Arts IV students began the month by strengthening their use of capital letters, exclamation marks, and question marks to ensure accuracy and clarity in writing. They reviewed the structure of formal letters and emails, receiving direct feedback on common errors from previous assignments to improve their written communication. With this preparation, students completed their writing CA (90%), producing either a formal letter or an email using the rules taught in class. They also completed a listening comprehension CA, likewise weighted at 90%. Students then analyzed the Aristotelian narrative arc through the short film "La leyenda del espantapájaros," identifying the sequence of events and major narrative elements. They also read the legend of "Popocatépetl and Iztaccíhuatl" and applied the narrative arc again to identify the key structural elements of the story. Finally, they examined the Aztec and Maya civilizations, comparing similarities and differences and organizing the information in a summary table to prepare them for a speaking practice in which they had to compare three similarities of differences between both indigenous groups. They are currently working on the required components for the Honors Portfolio
- Spanish Language Arts IV students are learning the plot line with the literary elements and analyzing legends of Spanish speaking countries. They learned the difference between a legend and a tale. When analyzing the legends, they had different ways to analyze them, not only using the plot line. They also wrote their own legend, individually or in pairs, by using the plot line and literary elements to fill in the gaps in their story telling. After they wrote their own legend, they recorded either a video or voice telling their legend to others. Some classes presented a legend from a Spanish speaking country creating a title page to go with their legend and recorded a video explaining the legend and the literary elements.

<u>Career</u>

- Chinese 1 is learning about family in Chinese and are planning to make a family book.
- Chinese 2 is learning about describing skills in Chinese. We finished the Steps to Seals Test.
- French 1 has been practicing spoken description. The students are learning to speak about their classes in terms of preferences and offering reasons for their opinions.


Life

- **EL 2** students are reading *Frankenstein* through an ethical lens looking at different situations within the story connected to real life examples analyzing ethical issues (cloning, technological advancements, etc.)
- EL 4 students are working on leading discussions on their own, rather than having a fishbowl style discussion with teacher-created prompts. Students create the prompts and lead the discussion.
- During November, **EL 1** worked with two texts which they analyzed, created questions, and possible solutions. Speaking practices focused on expressing needs and wants, while the writing skills focused on vocabulary and verbs "to be", "to do", and "to have".
- FC EL teachers have noticed an increase in students coming in for extra support after school.
- Spanish 1 did self-introductions with things they liked to do along with things they did not like to do.
- Spanish 3 have discussed positive qualities and made a survey to determine to determine their own ethical and moral compass, in addition to reviewing the global volunteer programs by BBVA and other organizations.
- French 3 focused on the advantages of social media and a responsible use. The students presented their takes in a recorded discussion as one of the Honors Padlet projects.
- French 2 has learned l'imparfait and used it in a written and spoken description of a festive family occasion also as an Interactive Speaking project for the Honors Padlet.
- **AP Chinese** are leaning airport announcements and students are performing how to take an airplane by checking in, passing the security and boarding.



- In **Chinese 1**, students have done a family tree and to ask family stories at their Thanksgiving gathering. They are currently working on writing about their family members.
- Chinese 3 students are working on a cooking project.








Chinese 1 – Family tree

• AP Chemistry and AP Biology teams met at the District office and worked on alignment of assessments for Skill-based, 90/10 curriculum.

The Curriculum and Instruction steering committee met on November 14th. Staff engaged in conversation around the Mustang "Must-Sees" in Tier 1 instruction and committed to a PLT focus for the remainder of the semester.






English Department - Megan Delaney, Director

Professional Development

Across Morton East, Morton West, and the Freshman Center, English teachers are continuing work on curriculum revision with an emphasis on research, rhetoric, and vertically aligned common assessments that support success from English 1 through AP-level courses. At the Freshman Center and West, curriculum writing days have focused on strengthening writing and speaking/listening units, laying a clearer pathway from Honors English 1 to AP Seminar.

Departments at all three buildings are also collaborating on whole-student supports, including well-planned I-Time lessons that integrate literacy, social-emotional learning, and college and career readiness skills.

Curriculum Updates

At Morton West, Junior Core students moved through a full staged writing process for their argumentative essay, including planning, drafting, feedback, and revision, with teachers highlighting claim, evidence, and commentary as key targets. Morton West Journalism students engaged in peer-editing workshops and played a "Man Bites Dog" headline activity to distinguish primary and secondary headlines and refine their news judgment.

At the Freshman Center, teachers continue to refine English 1 as a clearly defined prerequisite to English 2, using common exams and skill-based assessments to ensure students are ready for subsequent coursework. They are also building out a more specific, honors-level pathway that aligns with expectations in AP Seminar. Morton East remains focused on research and argument units that build student capacity with citation, annotation, and debate, mirroring the department-wide push toward college-level literacy skills.

Student and Staff Accolades

At Morton West, English and Journalism teachers are providing high-engagement opportunities for students to practice authentic writing, such as argumentative essays and publishable journalistic pieces connected to the yearbook and school media. Junior Core and Journalism classes at West have generated strong student work products and peer feedback routines that are being shared as models with colleagues.


At Morton East, teachers continue to highlight students' growth in discussion and debate, with classes regularly engaging in structured argument about text-based issues and author's claims. At the Freshman Center, the English team is recognized for thoughtful implementation of I-Time lessons that support both academic and social-emotional growth for ninth graders.

College, Career, and Life Readiness Focus

The FC English department is intentionally designing assessments that align English 1 expectations to the literacy demands of English 2 and beyond, helping students build a clear on-ramp to college-preparatory and AP coursework. Across East, West, and FC, teachers are embedding research, speaking, and listening opportunities into units so students can practice civic discourse, presentation skills, and informed decision-making.

Curriculum Updates

So far this school year, the Integrated Math III Core teams have been actively aligning their curriculum with the 90-10 grading process. This upcoming semester (beginning in January), the Quantitative Literacy team is also engaging in curriculum writing to transition the course to a skills-based approach and the 90-10 grading model. In addition, the AP Statistics team is refining its skills-based course to ensure consistency and clarity in grading practices.

Looking ahead to the second semester, we plan to dedicate curriculum writing time to begin refining the Integrated Math II curriculum, pending availability of curriculum days. All curriculum days will be taking place second semester and scheduled for **January 8, January 22, February 12, and March 12**. During this time, we will focus on fully implementing the 90-10, skills-based model in Quantitative Literacy, adding additional assessments as needed. We will also ensure that all courses have **at least three assessments per skill per semester** to maintain consistency across the department.

*College Readiness: ACT preparation continues to be a key component of our district's postsecondary readiness efforts. By providing structured practice, strategic instruction, and access to high-quality resources, we are reinforcing the problem-solving, reasoning, and data analysis skills students need for success in college-level math and many career pathways.

West coaches with ACT Prep: Instructional Readiness Committee is also beginging to plan an after school ACT Prep program that will run January to March. More information to come.







*College Readiness: ACT preparation is a key component of our students' postsecondary success plan. By offering structured support and access to practice resources, we help students strengthen the skills colleges value most—problem solving, reasoning, and data analysis.












FC Trig Functions: Ms. Tracy had her students create a real-world problem, model it, and solve the problems using trigonometric functions.
















Achieving Success at East: Several teams, including the Integrated Math II Core, Integrated Math III Core and Honors, and the Quantitative Literacy teams met with building leadership during the week of November 17th to discuss ways to help support their students who are not yet successful in this semester's Mathematics class. Each team has developed new ways to help their students achieve success in addition to the previous methods of reteaching and reassessing. For example, the updated plan for the Quantitative Literacy team is: [Quantitative Literacy] Teachers will allow students to retake quizzes during class time. We'll also start including QR codes on quiz reviews that are linked to instructional videos. We'll continue to do daily check ins with students. The team has improvement plans that can be used with individual students to assist the daily check in process.

Literacy PD: Several Math Teachers, plus other teachers throughout the district took place in the Literacy PD incubator. The PD days and the walkthroughs have been interesting and given the Math Department great ways to incorporate literacy strategies strategically in our Math lessons.

Social Science and Fine Arts- Kevin Vesper, Director Curriculum Updates - College Ready

- On November 2nd, Social Science biliteracy teachers participated in their 2nd curriculum day, this time focused on strengthening comprehension and analysis skills. During the session, teachers completed common instructional strategies, developed a comprehension annotation guide, designed pre-reading analysis activities, and created cause-and-effect graphic organizers. These instructional resources will be implemented across all Social Science biliteracy classrooms to support the development of students' essential social science skills throughout the curriculum.
- On November 12th, Social Science and English teachers held their first-ever collaborative curriculum day, focused on strengthening Tier 1 reading and writing strategies for students. During the session, teachers explored how each department integrates literacy into instruction, emphasizing common skills and shared language to support student development. The team identified key reading skills shared across both disciplines, and the next step will be to develop tangible strategies that specifically target the growth of these common skills in both curricular areas as well as the ACT.
- On November 20th, the U.S. History team held their final curriculum day of the year. The team began by identifying the skills assessed during the second semester and pinpointing any skills that were underrepresented, limiting students' opportunities to demonstrate proficiency. Assessments were then created for these unrepresented skills, followed by revisions to existing second-semester assessments to ensure all skills were accurately represented.

- Morton East had a successful play, *Electricdad*, and Morton West showcased the highly popular musical, *Grease*. Students at both schools dedicated months of hard work, rehearsing tirelessly to bring their productions to life. Their commitment and collaboration were evident on stage, resulting in performances that were not only well-executed but also enthusiastically received by audiences. Both productions were very well attended, with community members and families filling the seats to support the students' remarkable efforts and talent.
- The Ides of March, proud Morton alumni, generously donated two new drum sets to support the music programs at both Morton East and Morton West. Their gift will enhance students' learning experiences and provide valuable new instruments for future performances and classes.
- Morton West's Art Jam brought together students from all visual arts classes in the small auditorium for a collaborative creative experience. Using shared skills and techniques from their courses, students worked side by side to design and build a unified art installation for D-Hall. The event highlighted their creativity, teamwork, and artistic growth while contributing a vibrant new display to the school community.
- Our courses were featured prominently in elective fairs across all school campuses, giving students and parents an opportunity to explore the wide range of offerings available. Attendees were able to ask questions, interact with students, and learn more about the skills and experiences each course provides.
- AP 2D Art & Design students participated in Mini Portfolio Day at Deerfield High School, where
 they had the opportunity to meet with colleges from across the Midwest and receive professional
 reviews of their portfolios. This experience allowed students to gain valuable feedback, explore
 potential postsecondary pathways, and further develop their artistic skills in preparation for future
 opportunities.







FC-

One of the FC students is going to try to beat the Pacer Test record at FC. The record is 131 laps for the 20-meter test. Students have to run in a straight line at 20 meters, they must stay in cadence with the test. The test begins at approximately eight seconds and continues to decrease in time to meet 20 meters. Once a student gets 100 laps, the test is at a 4.8 second interval, which is incredibly fast. We wish good luck to that student that is trying to achieve the FC record.

Students in Fitness classes have taken their Squat Post Assessments, with much improvement from August. College Ready

Across all campuses, November was marked by strong career exploration and readiness efforts. At East, students participated in a full Career Week featuring a resume workshop, career fair, and guest speakers representing industries such as cybersecurity, culinary arts, fine arts, teaching, accounting, and healthcare. East also administered the ASVAB, supporting students exploring both military and civilian career pathways. West expanded career awareness by creating a Trades Guide to support students interested in trades pathways. At the Freshman Center, students engaged in career-connected field trips to Morton College, while counselors continued SchooLinks onboarding and delivered targeted GPA lessons in Freshman Edge classes, which spurred important student academic conversations and highlighted varying levels of gradebook understanding. FC also launched course selection activities in Freshman Edge. Meanwhile, students at MAS visited the Mid America Carpenters Training Center to learn about apprenticeship programs and tour the facility.



Career Ready

College-readiness initiatives continued across campuses. At East, the CCC organized college field trips to Roosevelt University and North Central College and hosted FAFSA completion workshops to support families. West hosted a well-attended college workshop for juniors that introduced target, match, and reach schools, and also coordinated college visits to Elmhurst and Loyola while offering two evening FAFSA workshops. English classes at West additionally benefited from a collaborative networking project tied to postsecondary planning. At the Freshman Center, counselors facilitated additional Morton College field trips for Green 1 and Maroon 2 groups, strengthening exposure to local college programs. Students at MAS also visited Morton College on November 19 for a campus tour and program overview, expanding their understanding of postsecondary opportunities.

Life Ready

Life-readiness efforts emphasized wellness, community involvement, and life skill development. East students contributed volunteer service hours by supporting preparations for the campus posada. West continued offering weekly drop-in support in the library and is transitioning to a new "Find Your Calm Fridays" format. West students also organized a food drive for Youth Crossroads, received structured reentry support upon returning from hospitalization, and attended four-year course selection presentations to strengthen long-term planning. At the Freshman Center, the student support team provided ongoing community-concern check-ins with students and families, while students participated in AP Stress Management (Donut Stress About It) sessions to build skills for managing stress and time. FC also supported a Young Men's Group focused on referral reduction, launched a Newcomer Group whose first cohort volunteered as ambassadors, and introduced a new stress-management group for students. NAMI partnered with FC to deliver mindfulness presentations during health classes. MAS expanded wellness programming by launching an after-school fitness club in collaboration with Youth Crossroads, offering



personalized workouts, nutrition guidance, stress-reduction strategies, and supportive mentorship. At MTC, students participated in a Thanksgiving celebration that allowed them to practice social skills built throughout the semester.

Curriculum Review and Updates

Curricular development continues across campuses. All campus lead counselors participated in the district-wide curriculum planning day at the Freshman Center, where they began integrating new SchooLinks-aligned lessons into the counseling curriculum, aligning PACE activities, and developing consistent materials for SchooLinks implementation. West teams worked to strengthen Tier 1 instructional and life-readiness support by hosting "No E in Thanksgiving" academic workshops for freshmen, operating a sophomore counseling corner, and providing juniors with targeted goal-setting workshops to support end-of-semester improvement. This past month, all counselors collaborated with directors to finalize course selection updates for 2026–27, received training on the SchooLinks Course Planner, and contributed feedback to strengthen our SchoolLinks implementation. Counselors from each campus represented the district at the Illinois School Counselor Association Conference, where our very own Gabe Villanueva presented at a listening session for school counselors.
