The con- tents of these messages were prepared by the student volunteers, and the District refrained from any interaction with student speak- ers regarding the student speakers' viewpoints on permissible sub- jects."	
RELIGIOUS EXPRESSION IN CLASS ASSIGNMENTS	Students may express the students' beliefs about religion in home- work, artwork, and other written and oral assignments free from discrimination based on the religious content of the students' sub- mission. Homework and classroom work shall be judged by ordi- nary academic standards of substance and relevance and against other legitimate pedagogical concerns identified by the school. Students may not be penalized or rewarded on account of religious content. If a teacher's assignment involves writing a poem, the work of a student who submits a poem in the form of a prayer (for example, a psalm) should be judged on the basis of academic standards, including literary quality, and not penalized or rewarded on account of its religious content.	
FREEDOM TO ORGANIZE RELIGIOUS GROUPS AND ACTIVITIES	Students may organize prayer groups, religious clubs, "see you at the pole" gatherings, and other religious gatherings before, during, and after school to the same extent that students are permitted to organize other noncurricular student activities and groups. [See FNAB(LOCAL)] Religious groups must be given the same access to school facilities for assembling as is given to other noncurricular groups, without discrimination based on the religious content of the group's expression. If student groups that meet for nonreligious activities are permitted to advertise or announce the groups' meet- ings, for example, by advertising in a student newspaper, putting up posters, making announcements on a student activities bulletin board or public address system, or handing out leaflets, school au- thorities may not discriminate against groups that meet for prayer or other religious speech. School authorities may disclaim spon- sorship of noncurricular groups and events, provided they adminis-	

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ter the disclaimer in a manner that does not favor or disfavor groups that meet to engage in prayer or other religious speech.
