Library staff, Board members, and community members continued to work with MSR to explore a vision of the future of library service in Carmel.

Through staff and public engagement sessions, including public meetings at Towne Meadow Elementary and at the library itself, MSR received input and presented opportunities. Now the process shifts to channeling those ambitious possibilities into a phased plan. The top priorities are to identify improvements to make the library's existing space function better and to develop a timeline for longer-term projects.


