To support students in all classes, we offer two study halls per week in addition to study skills classes and advisory classes. As you review student report cards, we hope you will have conversations with your students about taking advantage of opportunities to improve their success or involvement here at school and develop their skills in alignment with their post high school goals.

#### COLLEGE APPLICATION WEEK: NOV 9-13

Seniors have just completed a week focused on applying for colleges and getting acquainted with the OSAC Application. And they're not done! Applications are still being completed (watch those deadlines!) and students are already gearing up for the "Cash for College" event coming up in January. There are some important tasks that students and parents should both be looking into.

College applications in by deadlines: <a href="http://oregongoestocollege.org/caw/students">http://oregongoestocollege.org/caw/students</a> is a great website to link to colleges and their applications.

Students and parents need to apply for an FSA ID. This replaces the pin that we used to use for the FAF-SA. There is a link at the top of page on the FAFSA website at <a href="http://fafsa.ed.gov">http://fafsa.ed.gov</a>. Please note: you are not yet applying for the FAFSA – just the FSA ID! One for the student...and one for the parent...

OSAC Application: This is one of the main scholarship applications we ask students to submit. There is a lot of information regarding financial aid on this site as well! Spend some time at <a href="http://oregonstudentaid.gov">http://oregonstudentaid.gov</a>.

Students who are planning to attend an Oregon community college should also submit the Oregon Promise Application. This can also be found at <a href="http://oregonstudentaid.gov">http://oregonstudentaid.gov</a>

Last but not least, be planning ahead for the FAFSA application. Students and parents will want to file by the end of January (even if you have to estimate!). Plan to attend the financial aid night here at the high school in December to get a head start!

#### **The Importance of Regular Attendance:**


Regular attendance and punctuality is essential to the academic success of students. Neah-Kah-Nie's goal is a 90% attendance rate! With this achievement comes academic rewards as suggested in the article below.

"Evaluating the Relationship Between Student Attendance and Achievement in Urban Elementary and Middle Schools: An Instrumental Variables Approach"

Gottfried, Michael. American Educational Research Journal, Vol 47 (2), June 2010, 434-465.

Past research—and conventional wisdom—has suggested a link between school attendance and academic achievement. But does good attendance cause kids to do well in school, or are high-achievers just more likely to have high attendance? This study analyzed data from all elementary and middle schools in the Philadelphia School District, covering more than 200 schools and roughly 86,000 students. It found that students with better attendance have higher GPAs and standardized test scores, and this is true even from the early years in a child's education. What's more, it uncovered evidence suggesting that **high attendance actually causes kids to do well in school**, at both the elementary and middle school levels, rather than high achievement simply predicting good attendance. —**Jason Marsh** 

#### HIGHER ATTENDANCE EQUALS HIGHER ACHIEVEMENT



Please note, by Oregon law, students are considered having irregular attendance (ORS 339.065) when the student meets any of the following: Eight (8) unexcused one half days absences in any four week period; Five (5) absences (excused OR unexcused) in three (3) months; Ten (10) absences (excused OR unexcused) in six (6) months.

When your child's absences exceed these amounts, the school district will notify you of your child's irregular attendance. The school may contact our truancy officer to assist families and students with chronic irregular attendance.
