- FORWARD Testing We have completed the state testing for all students grade 3 5. To provide the best situation for students, we provided a hot breakfast each day the students were testing again this year. Most students took these assessments seriously and truly tried their hardest on these assessments. Unfortunately, we did have quite a bit of illness going around the school during the two weeks of testing which led to large number of make-up tests that needed to be completed after all others were through.
- Playground Equipment We have finalized our order for the playground equipment needed to replace the wooden structure on the 4K Gr. 1 playground. The items replacing the broken down, unsafe structure will enhance our Physical Education curriculum. The design is considered "Perpetual Motion" equipment. This new structure will encourage students to climb onto the equipment at one point and transverse all the way to the opposite side without ever touching the ground. We will also add two Comet Spinners to the site which provide vestibular motion activity which stimulates the brain. Thanks to PTO and other donors for the needed resources to allow us to replace the equipment that was no longer safe for our students.
