Over the course of the past year, districts in Illinois have had the opportunity to experiment with offsite learning days, dubbed *eLearning Days*. The goal of an eLearning Day is to engage students in learning when school may be closed due to extreme weather. eLearning Days simply make sense given the abundance of personal devices and relative ease of access to internet connectivity. Pleasantdale School District 107 joined several other districts throughout the state in experimenting with eLearning days twice last year. On these days, students in grades 3-8 used their district issued iPads to access learning activities throughout the day. Below, you will learn more about eLearning in Illinois and in our district as well as our proposed plan to implement eLearning days this school year.

**Background:** From 2015 to 2018, three Illinois school districts piloted eLearning programs. These school districts included two high school districts (Leyden School District 212 and West Chicago High School District 94) and one elementary school district (Gurnee SD 56). Over the course of the pilot, a total of only four eLearning days were called due to severe weather. Some commonalities in the districts' programs include providing students with devices, ensuring internet connectivity for all students, and requiring teachers to monitor student progress remotely. The success of the pilots can be seen through the expansion of eLearning throughout the state.

In Pleasantdale, the district piloted two elearing days last school year (February 19, 2019 and April 19, 2019). These were scheduled eLearning Days which gave our staff and students time to prepare activities and gave the administration time to work through the logistics. The work done last year and the lessons learned can be applied to our eLearning proposal for this school year. Our proposal differs in that we would call an eLearning day the day of an emergency closure. It is our intention to fully recommunicate the logistics of the plan as well as the work expectations to parents at the beginning of the winter season. These logistics and expectations were laid out in an FAQ distributed to parents prior to the eLearning Day (Appendix A). Students in grades three through eight were provided lessons and activities through our Learning Management System, Schoology, and were able to access materials using their school issued device or any other internet connected device. Our Preschool through second grade teachers communicated lessons and activities through the use of the Learning Management System SeeSaw, or via email and families were able to use a personal computer, tablet, or phone to access the material. Students were assigned work in academic areas as well as specials. Attendance was determined based on work completion. Prior to the eLearning day, teachers provided the administration with an overview of the work to be assigned to the students including modified work for students who receive special education services (Appendix B). Additionally, students were able to access "read alouds" from community members via Facebook live. This added an extra special layer to an already exciting day. Finally, at the conclusion of the eLearning experience, a survey was distributed to parents, staff, and students in grades four through eight to gain insight into how we can improve the program (Survey results available in Appendix C).

On June 1, 2019, the new eLearning rules went into effect in Illinois. The new law states a school day consists of a minimum of five hours of instructional time. Public Act 101-0012 also allows school districts statewide to utilize e-learning days in lieu of emergency days and maintains flexibility for students to engage in career-connected learning outside of the classroom. Based on this new law, the district has developed a proposal to have eLearning as an option for our students.

The requirement for eLearning plans were laid out in an email sent to Superintendents by West Cook Intermediate Service Center director, Dr. Mark Klaisner, on August 9, 2019 (Appendix D). This memo contained twelve issues that must be addressed as part of a district's eLearning Day plan. Below are each of these points as well as a description as to how Pleasantdale SD 107 will address each requirement. All evidence documents can be found in Appendix E.

- Ensure that all teachers and staff who may be involved in the provisions of e-learning have access to any and all hardware and software that may be required for the program.
  - All certified staff in PSD 107 are issued an iPad and a MacBook which are able to be connected to the internet and have all applicable software. All ESPs in PSD 107 have been issued an internet enabled iPad which includes all applicable software. Evidence: Device inventory, copy of invoices for Google and Schoology.
- Ensure and verify at least 5 clock hours of instruction or school work, as required under Section 10-19.05, for each student participating in an E-Learning day.
  - Teachers will provide students with the appropriate lessons, activities, and work in advance of beginning the eLearning Day. Staff will be available from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM, will have an hour lunch break, and then be available from 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM. All student work will need to be submitted by 9:00 PM the night of the eLearing day. Evidence: Copy of the table of activities and eLearning day work schedule.
- Ensure access from home or other appropriate remote facility for all students participating, including computers, the Internet, and other forms of electronic communication that must be utilized in the proposed program
  - A survey will be issued to all families in the month of September. The goal of this survey will be to assess if families have internet access either through home wifi, a hot spot, or through the use of a phone. If families do not have internet access, the district will issue hotspots which can be used on an eLearning Day. Evidence: Copy of the home access survey and invoices for hot spots.
- Ensure that non-electronic materials are made available for students participating in the program who do not have access to the required technology or to participating teachers or students who are prevented from accessing the required technology. We will develop procedures and processes to provide students with missed learning experiences that are similar to what we currently do on a normal school day. Each teacher will be assigned a "back up" teacher in the event they are unable to access the internet. Evidence: School policy on make-up work and list of "back-up" teachers.
- Ensure appropriate learning opportunities for students with special needs.
  - Special Education staff will provide students with modified work and adjust expectations for the work. Likewise, special education staff will be available from 9:00 AM - 12:00 PM and 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM to support students. Evidence: Table of activities.
- Monitor and verify each student's electronic participation.
  - Teachers will be available to monitor students' progress and participation from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM and from 1:00 PM to 3:00 PM. Teachers will be able to monitor students using our Learning Management System and Google Drive, and they will be available via

email. Additionally, teachers will log students attendance on an electronic attendance sheet. Evidence: eLearning day work hours sample of attendance sheet (student names redacted).

- Address the extent to which student participation is within the student's control as to the time, pace, and means of learning.
  - Each student can complete assignments in any order and at whatever pace is appropriate for the individual learner. While teachers will be available on a set schedule, students can work on and submit lessons until 9:00 PM on the night of an eLearning Day. Evidence: eLearning Day Family FAQ
- Provide effective notice to students and their parents or guardians of the use of particular days for eLearning.
  - Notification of the usage of eLearning days will be sent to parents in the fall. Parents will be provided with an FAQ that outlines the logistics of an eLearning Day. The district will also use social media as well as our telephone notification system to provide notice to parents. Evidence: eLearning FAQ for families.
- Provide staff and students with adequate training for eLearning days' participation.
  - Staff will be trained during plan times at both schools in November. Following the teacher training, teachers will train students. Evidence: eLearning Day FAQ for Teachers
- Ensure an opportunity for any collective bargaining negotiations with representatives of the school district's employees that would be legally required, and including all classifications of school district employees who are represented by collective bargaining agreements and who would be affected in the event of an eLearning day.
  - The administration met with TAP leadership to review the proposal and discussed any impacts to bargaining unit members. Evidence: email to staff.
- Review and revise the program as implemented to address difficulties confronted
  - At the conclusion of each eLearning day, a survey will be distributed to parents, staff, and students in grades four through eight. Evidence: Copies of parent, staff, and student surveys.
- Ensure that the protocol regarding general expectations and responsibilities of the program is communicated to teachers, staff, and students at least 30 days prior to utilizing an eLearning day.
  - An FAQ will be distributed to parents, students, and staff at least 30 days prior to utilizing an eLearning day. Evidence: eLearning FAQ for families and eLearning FAQ for staff.

**Conclusion:** Based on the new flexibility provided by the Illinois legislature, school districts in Illinois have the opportunity to develop eLearning Day plans. These plans allow for innovative new ways to ensure the continuity of learning during emergency weather days. It is the administration's recommendation that the Board approves our proposal and gives the district the opportunity to call an eLearning Day if warranted.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ)

An eLearning day or engaged learning day may occur when school is cancelled due to inclement weather or used to make up a school closure. Instruction is provided by each student's teacher through the use of multiple means (electronic and paper/pencil).

How do children or parents find out about the assignments or activities for the eLearning Day?

- On planned eLearning days, students will receive assignments and activities the day before the eLearning day.
- On unplanned eLearning days (snow/cold/etc) middle school students will have access to assignments or eLearning Modules through Schoology by 9:00 a.m.
- On unplanned eLearning days (snow/cold/etc) elementary school students will either be contacted by the teacher through email, or a digital tool such as Schoology or Seesaw by 9:00 a.m.

What activities/classes will my child complete on an eLearning Day?

- Preschool through fourth grade students will be engaged in ELA, math, and one special.
- Fifth through eighth grade students will be engaged in ELA, math, social studies, science, Spanish/reading lab/math lab\*, specials, and PE.
  - \*5th and 6th grade students will complete assignments for the classes in which they are currently enrolled.

Does my child need to complete all modules/assignments in one sitting?

 No, students can take as much time as they need to complete assignments, however, the time teachers are available to answer questions is limited. Students must turn in assignments by 9:00 PM on and eLearning Day.

Are there any learning activities that are required or can my child complete whatever he/she would like to complete?

• Students are required to complete ALL learning modules to receive credit and qualify for a day of attendance.

How will my child submit the assignments?

- Based on the activities, students will submit electronically through Schoology or SeeSaw no later than 9:00 PM on an eLearning Day
- Some online programs like Freckle and Raz-Kids automatically record student work completed. Students complete the work and no other submission is required.
- Paper and pencil activities will be submitted to teachers in class on the next school day.

If an extended due date is required, please contact the teacher directly to discuss the circumstances.

How will I (or my child) verify that the learning activities or assignments are complete?

- Parents may wish to ask their child to show them the completed work prior to submitting
  it.
- Teachers will be checking in the work the next school day to determine participation and verify attendance.

How is attendance recorded?

 Completion of all assignments will verify attendance and will be recorded as a full day of attendance.

If my child has a question about an assignment, what do we do?

- All teachers will be available via email and/or through Schoology at the below schedule/
  - o 8:00 9:00: Teacher Plan time (no teacher availability)
  - o 9:00 12:00: Teachers available
  - o 12:00 1:00: Lunch (no teacher availability)
  - 1:00 3:00: Teachers available

What If there is a power outage within the community or WiFi goes out on the eLearning day?

 The District would likely adjust the due date for the eLearning Modules if needed and adjust attendance accordingly.

If my child needs tech support on the eLearning Day, what can we do?

- Technical support will be available all day (9:00 to 3:00) by emailing:
  - PES: Mr. McAtee (<u>imcatee@d107.org</u>) or Mrs. Bubulka (<u>mbubulka@d107.org</u>)

What if my child does not have access to a device to complete assignments?

If students need to borrow a device, one can be checked out through the school library.

What if I do not have internet access in my home?

Students will be issued a hotspot if internet connectivity is an issue.

How will the district determine if the eLearning day was a success?








eLearning -- Our Results (Students)

Was the amount of work in English Language Arts, Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies enough?













#### Good evening all,

**E-Learning Days:** You are probably already aware that the General Assembly adopted a resolution to allow school districts the option of using E-Learning days "while students are not physically present in lieu of the district's scheduled emergency days." (Public Act 101-0012 pg 15 of the pdf) On Wednesday, Governor Pritzker signed this act into law. The legislation requires that your program be verified by the ROE/ISC on or before September 1. The ROEs/ISCs do not have the guidance we need at this time to approve those programs. Therefore, September 1 is to be considered a "soft" deadline, which means we have permission to approve these programs after September 1.

Before Board adoption and before your program can be sent to the ROE/ISC office, your school board must hold a public hearing at a regular or special BOE meeting for the initial proposal or renewal of your E-Learning program. At least 10 days before the public hearing, notice must be published for the public, to your collective bargaining unit representatives and to those employees not covered in a collective bargaining unit.

Specifically, the law states that your E-Learning program must:

- Ensure that all teachers and staff who may be involved in the provisions of e-learning have access to any and all hardware and software that may be required for the program
- Ensure and verify at least 5 clock hours of instruction or school work, as required under Section 10-19.05, for each student participating in an E-Learning day.
- Ensure access from home or other appropriate remote facility for all students participating, including computers, the Internet, and other forms of electronic communication that must be utilized in the proposed program
- Ensure that non-electronic materials are made available for students participating in the program who do not
  have access to the required technology or to participating teachers or students who are prevented from
  accessing the required technology
- Ensure appropriate learning opportunities for students with special needs
- Monitor and verify each student's electronic participation
- Address the extent to which student participation is within the student's control as to the time, pace, and means of learning
- Provide effective notice to students and their parents or guardians of the use of particular days for E-Learning
- Provide staff and students with adequate training for E-Learning days' participation
- Ensure an opportunity for any collective bargaining negotiations with representatives of the school district's employees that would be legally required, and including all classifications of school district employees who are represented by collective bargaining agreements and who would be affected in the event of an E-Learning day
- Review and revise the program as implemented to address difficulties confronted
- Ensure that the protocol regarding general expectations and responsibilities of the program is communicated to teachers, staff, and students at least 30 days prior to utilizing an E-Learning day.

The ROE offices are still waiting for guidance from ISBE. I anticipate that we will use a form/checklist to make sure that you have provided the proper notice to those who need it and that your program addresses the bullet points listed above.

I will share out more on this topic as it develops.





#### Extended Absence Procedures

Regular attendance is vital to success in school. Parents or guardians are expected to maintain a regular attendance pattern for their children and to inform the school of any absence and its cause. Family vacations planned on school attendance days are discouraged.

An extended planned absence constitutes five or more missed school days. Parents are requested to notify their child's teacher and the school office in writing five days prior to an extended planned absence, stating the specific dates the student will not be in attendance.

There are many different learning activities and opportunities going on in classrooms each day. Not all can be done independently as most require some level of prior instruction from the classroom teacher. Therefore, teachers will gather work as feasible. Other assignments will be saved for the child to do after the extended absence. Any work that is given at the beginning of an extended absence should be done by the time the child returns to school.

There are several ways to assist your child in the maintenance of his/her skills during an extended absence:

- Read books for pleasure.
- Practice math facts (flashcards).
- Write about the events each day in a journal.
- Learn interesting facts about the place being visited.

These procedures are intended to help parents and students understand the academic responsibilities relative to extended absences. Questions should be directed to teachers or the school office.

### 2.30 - Release Time for Religious Instruction & Observance

A student shall be released from school, as an excused absence, for the purpose of observing a religious holiday. Prior to the holiday, parents and/or guardians should inform the school of the absence and reason for the absence.

### 2.40 - Make-Up Work

Students are responsible for their schoolwork when they are absent. Parents and students can use Schoology, our online Learning Management System, to check for assignments. Arrangements be made for someone to pick up the assignments from the school office between 3:20 and 4:00 p.m.

Family vacations while school is in session are discouraged. When the student returns, it is the responsibility of the parent and student to arrange for completion of work that has been missed.

If a student's absence is excused or if a student is suspended from school, he/she will be permitted to make up all missed work, including homework and tests, for equivalent academic credit.

Teachers will assist and determine a deadline for making up the missed work.

#### **2.50 - Truancy**


A chronic or habitual truant, as defined by Illinois School Code, is a student who misses 5% or more of the previous 180 regular attendance days without valid cause. Chronic or habitual truants could be referred to the county truancy service and/or the police department.

The following resources and supportive services are available as appropriate to students with chronic or habitual attendance problems and their parents or guardians (as indicated in 26.13 of the School Code):


- Conferences with school personnel

# eLearning Day Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) for Teachers

An eLearning day or engaged learning day may occur when school is cancelled due to inclement weather or used to make up a school closure. Instruction is provided by each student's teacher through the use of multiple means (electronic and paper/pencil).

How/when should we share assignments or activities with students and parents for the eLearning Day?

- On the eLearning days we plan in advance you can share assignments and activities with students the day before the eLearning day.
- On unplanned eLearning days (snow/cold/etc):
  - For middle school, share or give access to assignments or eLearning modules through Schoology by 9:00 a.m.
  - For elementary students, either send out assignments through email, Schoology, or Seesaw by 9:00 a.m.
- We encourage the use of our learning management systems, Schoology and SeeSaw, for assigning work and having students submit work for eLearning to the greatest extent possible.
- Staff will follow the below schedule:
  - o 8:00 9:00: Plan time
  - o 9:00 12:00: Available to students
  - o 12:00 1:00: Lunch
  - o 1:00 3:00: Available to students

How do students get attendance credit for an eLearning day?

- Students receive attendance credit when they complete all learning modules.
- Please allow students the ability to make up the assignments just as you would if a student missed a regular day of school.

How will attendance be collected?

 Teachers will be asked to simply check "present" students off a list and submit the list to the office where it will be entered into Skyward.

Who will contact parents of students who are deemed absent that day?

• The nurse will send a form email to parents notifying them that their child has been marked absent for the eLearning day.

What types of activities or modules are appropriate for eLearning?

 eLearning activities can be a continuation of the sequence learning in your classes, and/or enrichment activities that enhance the areas of study in your classes. The rule of thumb for rigor should be that if you wouldn't have a student do the activity for your class on a regular school day, then do not assign it for eLearning. We want to ensure that students are completing activities of high quality.

- Rikki and Meagan are available to help you plan activities and/or use Schoology/SeeSaw features to assign and have students submit work.

What if, on an unplanned, eLearning day, I am not able to access the internet or have a personal emergency that keeps me from helping my students?

- If that is the case, please do your best to communicate with your administrator and we
  will work with you on a solution. You may simply have to make yourself available later in
  the day to support students.
- We will also pair each teacher with a "back-up teacher" in the event you are unable to access your student for any portion of time.

What if a student doesn't complete the learning modules, can they make up the work?

• In regards to make up work, please follow whatever process you currently have in place in your classroom.

Do the activities I assign for an eLearning day have to be digital or can I assign more traditional paper/pencil assignments?

We trust your judgement when it comes to creating and assigning assignments.
 However, we would prefer you use the tools we have provided to students and staff as a vehicle of instruction.

How will the district determine if the eLearning day was a success?

 The district will distribute an online survey to parents, teachers, and students at the completion of the eLearning day.

What if I need technical support during an eLearning day?

Technology staff will be available to answer questions via email on eLearning day.

How will specialists and ESPs account for a day of attendance on eLearning days?

- Many of the certified specialists will have the opportunity to interact with students similar to classroom teachers.
- Those without supervisory duties will submit an agenda for work completed, similar to the process we use for institute days or paid summer work days.

•	ESPs will have the opportunity to engage in professional learning through GCN videos or other online tools.

An eLearning day or engaged learning day may occur when school is cancelled due to inclement weather or used to make up a school closure. Instruction is provided by each student's teacher through the use of multiple means (electronic and paper/pencil).

How do children or parents find out about the assignments or activities for the eLearning Day?

- On planned eLearning days, students will receive assignments and activities the day before the eLearning day.
- On unplanned eLearning days (snow/cold/etc) middle school students will have access to assignments or eLearning Modules through Schoology by 9:00 a.m.
- On unplanned eLearning days (snow/cold/etc) elementary school students will either be contacted by the teacher through email, or a digital tool such as Schoology or Seesaw by 9:00 a.m.

What activities/classes will my child complete on an eLearning Day?

- Preschool through fourth grade students will be engaged in ELA, math, and one special.
- Fifth through eighth grade students will be engaged in ELA, math, social studies, science, Spanish/reading lab/math lab\*, specials, and PE.
  - \*5th and 6th grade students will complete assignments for the classes in which they are currently enrolled.

Does my child need to complete all modules/assignments in one sitting?

 No, students can take as much time as they need to complete assignments, however, the time teachers are available to answer questions is limited. Students must turn in assignments by 9:00 PM on and eLearning Day.

Are there any learning activities that are required or can my child complete whatever he/she would like to complete?

 Students are required to complete ALL learning modules to receive credit and qualify for a day of attendance.

How will my child submit the assignments?

- Based on the activities, students will submit electronically through Schoology or SeeSaw no later than 9:00 PM on an eLearning Day
- Some online programs like Freckle and Raz-Kids automatically record student work completed. Students complete the work and no other submission is required.
- Paper and pencil activities will be submitted to teachers in class on the next school day.

If an extended due date is required, please contact the teacher directly to discuss the circumstances.

How will I (or my child) verify that the learning activities or assignments are complete?

- Parents may wish to ask their child to show them the completed work prior to submitting
  it.
- Teachers will be checking in the work the next school day to determine participation and verify attendance.

#### How is attendance recorded?

 Completion of all assignments will verify attendance and will be recorded as a full day of attendance.

If my child has a question about an assignment, what do we do?

- All teachers will be available via email and/or through Schoology at the below schedule/
  - o 8:00 9:00: Teacher Plan time (no teacher availability)
  - o 9:00 12:00: Teachers available
  - 12:00 1:00: Lunch (no teacher availability)
  - o 1:00 3:00: Teachers available

What If there is a power outage within the community or WiFi goes out on the eLearning day?

 The District would likely adjust the due date for the eLearning Modules if needed and adjust attendance accordingly.

If my child needs tech support on the eLearning Day, what can we do?

If students need to borrow a device, one can be checked out through the school library.

What if I do not have internet access in my home?

Students will be issued a hotspot if internet connectivity is an issue.

The goal of the program would be to give the district the option to call an eLearning day in lieu of a non-attendance day for severe weather. The public hearing will take place at the beginning of the regularly scheduled Board meeting at 7:00 PM on September 18, 2019 and will be held in the Board room at the District office (7450 S. Wolf Rd., Burr Ridge, IL 60527).
