

## FROM THE OFFICE OF THE PRINCIPAL:

Welcome back to school Pirates, families and friends! We are projecting a student population of about 230 students this year, slightly larger than last year with a great new freshmen class coming in! As nearly every year, there are several changes which we hope will be perceived as improvements that will impact how each school day is organized. We will continue with the 75-minute late start every Wednesday. The daily schedule has changed to accommodate high school students having breakfast after first period. We noticed last year too few students were eating the most important meal of the day. We hope this change will encourage more students to eat a healthy breakfast. Advisory has changed in two ways. Students will be assigned to Advisories based on their grade. During the now 30-minute Advisory period, grade level curriculum that will lead to a career learning credit will be delivered. Students will still have designated "study hall" time during Advisory and we will still use Advisory to prepare for informative and comprehensive student led conferences. The new bell schedule has been included in the newsletter, in student handbooks provided to each student, and in the beginning of the year packets of information sent home with each student.

I am excited to welcome three new teachers and two returning staff members who have different roles: Mr. Billstine - English and Assistant Football; Ms. Scott - Social Studies and Speech; and, Ms. Meeks - Math. Mr. Douma is our new Athletic Director and Ms. Gienger is returning to teach Math! We are still in the process of hiring two new Instructional Assistants, one that will work with Mrs. Thayer in our Learning Center, and another that will work with Mrs. Troyer and Mrs. Harmon. I know all of these talented professionals look forward to meeting you and working to give our students the best learning and activity experiences possible!

#### **Excellent** attendance

Being in school every day means your child won't miss out on learning. Try to schedule appointments and family trips outside of school hours. If he asks to stay home "just because," remind him of what he'll miss, such as his reading group or PE class. Explain that he can be absent only if he's sick or if there's a family emergency.



Children who regularly eat meals with their families tend to do bet-

ter in school and avoid risky behavior. Eating dinner together is great, but other meals count, too. If you work at night, maybe you could make time for a family breakfast. Or on a weekend, try a picnic lunch!

#### **Celebrate progress**

Suggest that your youngster create a fun reminder of all the things she has accomplished. Let her cover a container with construction paper and label it "I did it!" Then, she can write each success ("I learned to add fractions") on a slip of paper and put it in the container. If she's feeling discouraged, have her read the slips.

# Conversations about school

When you think of parent involvement, do you picture moms and dads volunteering in classrooms? That's one way to help—but research shows that supporting your child's education at home is even more important. Here are four conversations that will help you stay involved.



Look at completed work to find out what your youngster is learning and how well she's doing. You could comment on her social studies report or pottery project, for instance. ("You know a lot about our state's history!") Also, respond to notes from her teacher, and sign her weekly folder or daily planner if required.

#### "Show me what you have for homework."

It's your child's job to do her homework, but you play a role, too. Make sure she knows what she's supposed to do by having her explain the assignments to you. After she finishes her homework, glance over the work to see that it's complete.

#### "Describe a book you enjoyed today."

This gives you an idea of what your youngster prefers to read. Then, build a daily reading habit by asking what she'd like to read tonight. Encourage her reading and listening skills by reading aloud to her and letting her read to you.

#### "Tell me what you learned that you'd like to know more about."

Use her interests as jumping-off points for activities to share. If she likes geometry, you might do tangrams

together. If she's fascinated by how animals adapt to winter, take her to the library to research the subject or to the zoo to see live animals.♥

# After-school questions

Asking "How was school today?" might not get you far. Instead, ask questions like these for a better picture of your youngster's day:


- "What's the coolest thing that happened? What wasn't so cool?"
- "Pretend you're the teacher. How would you describe the day?"
- "What made you laugh?"
- "What was the most creative thing you did?"
- "How were you kind or helpful today? Was anyone kind or helpful to you?" ♥



# What does respect look like?

Your child's daily dealings with adults and kids alike will be more pleasant if he speaks and acts respectfully. Try these tips for helping him learn respect.

Respectful replies. Think about something that you and your youngster disagree on (say, whether his video game time should be limited). Model having a respectful discussion about it. You might say that his brain and body are growing and that he needs to run and play to stay healthy. Then, suggest a respectful response, such



as, "I want to be healthy, but I love video games."
Have him brainstorm other situations where people have different opinions but still speak to each other with respect.

**Everyday acts.** When you mow the lawn or clean up after your dog, you can teach your youngster about respect for neighbors. Explain that keeping

your neighborhood clean and neat makes it nice for everyone. Ask him to think of other respectful things neighbors should do. If you share an apartment laundry room, he might say that you respect neighbors' time by removing your clothes when they're done so others get to use the washers and dryers.

# A reading challenge

By reading more complex books, your child can learn new words, facts, and ideas. He'll also be exposed to more complicated plots and will grow as a reader. Share these suggestions:

• Knowing something about the topic or setting will make a tougher book easier to comprehend. If

your youngster is reading a novel set in China, he could talk to someone who has been there or look up the country online (try a children's site like *kids* .nationalgeographic.com).

- Encourage your child to look at a simpler book on the same subject. A picture-book biography about Harriet Tubman may help your youngster better understand a textbook chapter on the civil rights movement, for instance.
- Suggest that your child read complicated material with pencil and paper in hand. He can jot down questions, words to look up, or facts he wants to learn more about.♥

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# Strong study habits

Q: My third grader has to spend more time studying this year. How can I make sure she studies effectively?

**A:** Set your daughter up for success by helping her find a distraction-free study spot. Also,

have her come up with a study routine. For instance, she could reserve time each evening to review her textbook and notes in the days leading up to a test or quiz.

Also, many students find it helpful to jot down a purpose each time they study. Your child might write: "I will learn the definitions of all the boldfaced words in chapter 7, section 1."

Finally, encourage her to experiment with study strategies to find what works best. She could close his eyes and imagine how a word is spelled or draw a grid with 9 squares to solve 3 x 3. Or she might find it easier to spell or recite math facts aloud in rhythm or to a familiar tune.



### Talking to kids about money

My children were always asking

to buy things like dress-up shoes or new games. They didn't seem to understand that these items weren't in our budget.

I wanted them to learn about how we spend our money—and that it is limited. So I got a spiral notebook and labeled it "Family Spending Journal." I explained that for two weeks, everyone would keep a record of what they spent money on. I listed items like my

subway fare, the electric bill, and food at the grocery store. The children wrote down expenses such as school lunch, soccer cleats, and field trip fees.

After a few days, they were surprised by how many things we needed money

for. Our kids had no idea, for example, that we paid for taxes on our income, several types of insurance, and membership in our homeowners'

ship in our homeowners' association. Sometimes they still ask to buy too many things at the store, but when I say no, at least they understand why.

#### OTHER NEW YEAR CHANGES AND REMINDERS....

- ◆ <u>Closed Campus</u>: NKN is a closed campus for Freshmen for the entire school year. Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors must earn their off campus privileges by being in good standing academically (checked every three weeks after progress reports) and maintaining acceptable behavior (no office referrals). The complete details can be found in the Student Handbook under the "C"s. At any time, parents may request we limit off campus privileges for their student even if they meet criteria. Our desire is to maintain a safe, responsible, and respectful learning environment both in school and in the community.
- Parking Permits: In order to park on school property, student drivers MUST register with the office, provide proof of driver's license AND insurance. The signed parking permission form will remain on file with the school office and the student's parking sticker MUST be displayed in the driver's side, rear window of the vehicle. IF YOUR SON OR DAUGHTER CURRENTLY HAVE A PARKING PERMIT ON FILE, PLEASE PROVIDE PROOF OF INSURANCE AND VERIFY WE HAVE THE CORRECT VEHICLE REGISTERED. For families that share multiple vehicles, we are happy to issue multiple parking permits.
- <u>Truancy Information</u>: Consistent school attendance is essential and will be strictly enforced. Please see student handbook information under the Attendance section. All attendance calls are to be directed to Rachell Spink in the high school office. Rachell may be reached by phone at 503-355-2272 or by e-mail at rachells@nknsd.org
- <u>School Supplies</u>: We have had a number of inquiries about a school supplies list. Because of the number of varied classes and specific requirements for some classes, we do not publish a school supplies list. It is recommended your student arrive the first day of school with paper, pencils, pens, a spiral notebook or two—basic school supplies. If your student has a teacher with specific class requirements/needs, they will be given that information the first day of classes.
- New Students: If you know of a new family with school-aged children that has moved into the district and has not yet registered their students, please refer them to the appropriate school (i.e. Garibaldi or Nehalem elementary schools grades K-5, the middle school grades 6-8 or high school). If at all possible, we would like to have all high school aged students registered and scheduled into classes prior to the first day of school on September 6th. Please note, students attending Neah-Kah-Nie School District last year do not need to re-enroll. However, if you have moved since last spring and have a new address or phone number, please contact Delpha in the high school office at 503-355-2258 or delphac@nknsd.org with any needed changes or for any additional information pertaining to high school registration.
- ♦ ParentVUE AND StudentVUE: If you current do not have access to ParentVUE or StudentVUE, we would encourage you to contact the office for an activation key and login information. We want all of our students to continue to increase their achievement in the areas of reading, writing and mathematics. #### Mudd Nick Foundation – In Partnership with District 56 Schools By Monica Isbell, President, Mudd Nick Foundation

What is the Mudd Nick Foundation? Since 1993, the Mudd Nick Foundation (MNF) has been funding a wide range of extracurricular Learning Experience activities for children in North Tillamook County that supplement District curriculum. In 2006, the MNF was formed as a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization and a board of nine directors was selected. The theme and goal became "Changing Children's Lives Today and Tomorrow." Over the last ten years, in excess of \$1,100,000 has been raised to support approximately 50 Learning Experiences annually.

The MNF is guided by the following Purpose, Mission and Vision:

I am excited to welcome you back to the 2016-17 school year. Our custodians and maintenance staff (Bob Horton, Luke Nugent, Darren Hastings, Karla Watkins, John Wheeler, Jeff Short, and Paul Short) worked hard to prepare schools for the return of your children. I want to thank our SUPER custodians for their strong work ethic and eye for detail. Levi Nugent, District Technology Director, worked to enhance the district's robust technology infrastructure and added additional security cameras throughout the district. Without Levi's expertise, the district would not have such strong technology rich classrooms. The district office staff (Carol Richmond, Ashley Arthur, Mark Sybouts, Kathie Sellers, and Steve Baertlein) worked during the summer to ensure successful openings of all schools in the fall.

I am sure all of you are enthusiastic for school to begin Tuesday, September 6. Parents of preschool and kindergarten students have been notified of alternate start dates for these programs.

I would like to share with you some of the exciting changes this year at Neah-Kah-Nie School District:


- Neah-Kah-Nie School District welcomes our new teachers: Melinda Rumage, Kimberly Baertlein, Glenn Stelson, Jenna Angelini, Kate Romanov, Ashley Verhulst, Brianna Moses, James Billstine, Jenna Meeks, Beth Gienger (HS Math), and Rhonda Scott. We are also excited to welcome all our new classified staff. Our new educators will complement the climate and culture of the entire school district. Soon it will be apparent to all new staff, the main focus of the school district is people: students, staff, volunteers, parents, and our community partners.
- A ninth teacher and an additional instructional assistant were hired at Nehalem Elementary.
   Now, Nehalem Elementary and Garibaldi Grade School each have nine classroom teachers.
   Class sizes are approximately twenty-one students with instructional assistant support in each classroom.
- Selected elementary teachers will pilot I Ready, a new math curriculum.
- Elementary schools will be in the third year of Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI) in order to increase student achievement for all students and to provide a systematic framework for identifying students with specific learning disabilities.
- A life skills program is being implemented at the middle and high schools.

- Stacey Dills, long time Nehalem Elementary Special Education teacher, was hired as the school district's Special Education/Student Services Director. Stacey will be responsible for Special Education and Title programs.
- High school students will have new Spanish language and science curriculums.
- In the spring, the \$1.7 million dollar community track and field renovation project will begin.
- The Neah-Kah-Nie School District's long range plan will be updated. This long range plan, when updated, will provide the necessary guidance to focus on strategic initiatives. We are excited to partner with community partners to build this roadmap.

- Middle school students enrolled in physical education classes will wear physical education uniforms.
- The NKN District Technology Committee created a new technology plan.
- An employee staff recognition program will begin in the fall.
- The Nehalem Elementary gym was painted and adjustable basketball hoops installed.
- A \$45,000 fuel tank will be installed at Garibaldi replacing the old tank installed when the school was built.
- Five elementary classrooms were painted this summer.
- Ten part time instructional assistant positions were combined into five full time positions.
- One full time classified staff was hired at the middle and high school to assist with state testing, mentor coordinating through the Aspire Program, and media services.
- The district office parking area has been expanded and a sidewalk added for safety and comfort for our visitors.
- The Garibaldi Elementary softball/soccer/football field will have the grass & weeds removed, soil tilled, compost added, and the field leveled & reseeded.

The 2016-17 school year will be my fifth year as Neah-Kah-Nie School District Superintendent. I am honored to serve the many communities throughout the school district with the single purpose of providing the best education system for our students.


