### **A.C. Houghton Elementary**

- Our preliminary test results have come back, and I and our staff are excited about our early results.
- Again, we have met AYP status as a high school this year. Exciting!
- ➤ We are looking ahead to a great school year and I am enjoying the start of the school year in part to starting school after Labor Day weekend. The extra week in August made a big difference in preparing for students and staff ③.

### **Irrigon High School**

### Extra time

We are looking at our current school schedule and trying to carve out time for those students who are not having academic success or are not meeting state standards. Below are some of the programs that we will be using this school year.

**Main Street -** We are going to continue to promote academic success by giving students the time that they need to meet academic standards. All students will have the opportunity to be in **Main Street**; an academic program that meets during a student's lunch and advisory period where they have the time to catch up on any missing work.

**Math or Language Arts Extension** - Both Junior High and Senior High students that are not meeting Oregon's State Standard in Math and Language Arts will be assigned to a class period of **Math or** 

**Language Arts Extension.** These classes will be in addition to their assigned Math and Language Arts class but will offer a variety of lessons to assist them in their classes as well as on the state test.

**PLATO Program** - High school students that are not on track to graduate will participate in the **Plato program** during the school day and after school. This program individually assigns curriculum to help them in their current classes as well as allow them to make up missing credits.

#### Life Skills Room

We have added the Life skills program this year. Charlene Baker will be teaching the classes. There are currently six students directly receiving services from this program. Other students will benefit through tutoring and extra assistance.

### **Junior High Changes**

If you walked through the halls you will notice a new twist to the school. We have offset the bells for Junior High and High School classes. This simple change will lead to virtually no contact between the two grade levels of students. We are hoping to create an improved identity for the junior high. They

have been lumped together with the high school in the past and that can lead to them feeling left out and on their own at times. The Junior High will have their own activities and establish a sense of a school within a school.

The Junior High staff is also committed creating a smooth transition into the IJSHS for the incoming 7<sup>th</sup> graders. The teachers put together a two hour orientation program for the students during registration. Over half of the students and their parents attended.

### **Lighting Project**

The gym lighting and PTE building projects have been wrapped up and completed. The multi purpose room is now fully useable. The lights in the gym look great and have made a tremendous difference. The field lighting project is coming along nicely. The poles are lying on the ground, the first trenching has been done and more will be completed this week. The most important piece that is still being worked out is the building of the footings for each pole. The completion date for this project centers on when the footings being built. Craig Bensen, Blaine Ganvoa, and Amy Tolar continue to work with community members to organize the work and schedules. Wayne Huwe, Dan Young, Dwight Osborne, Dan Combes, and many others have been volunteering and time and energy into this project.
