Hi Corrina and Crystal,

There are a lot of variables at play with this question, that I don't have all the answers to just yet. Once DPHHS let's us know if they are changing the structure (i.e. billing) of CSCT that would impact the match and would give us some answers. Here are a couple examples I'm referring too. \*\*I should note, I struggle with math, so please don't hang your hat on my napkin math.

Scenario 1 = keep CSCT billing as it exists today = 15 minute unit with a cap of 720 units per team per calendar month. Medicaid pays about \$27/unit including the match (YBGR currently gets about \$17/unit after the match). If the school pays 35% of that unit that would be \$9.45/unit. The 720 cap equals \$6,804/team per month or \$81,648 per team per year IF they bill the 720 cap (most teams do not get to the 720 cap each month)...that would be the ceiling.

Scenario 2 = DPHHS change to daily billable per youth, no 720 cap (this is what is on the table with DPHHS). The daily rate was proposed to be \$96ish/youth/day billed. If the school pays a 35% match that would be \$33.60 per day per youth served. The provider gets the 65% to cover the expense of running the program (wages, etc.). The ceiling is less known in this scenario because there is no cap on number of youth served, other than what is realistic for a therapist and behavior specialist to provide adequate quality services. Let's say it was capped at 10 youth per team for math purposes and a team bills every school day and some summer days, so let's say 220 billable days per calendar year (that's a guess on my end). 220 billable days x \$96 x 10 youth = \$211,200 x 35% = \$73,920 per 10 youth served...that's assuming each youth is served on each of those 220 days out of the year.

So it's difficult to determine what to say as far as budget until we know what DPHHS is officially proposing. Mental health centers across the state are in limbo right now with these unknowns. I'm guessing you were in the June 14<sup>th</sup> meeting with DPHHS and OPI. I've gotten other questions like this from other school partners trying to figure out next steps.
