Updates for this school year & Summary of Progress:

- Our faith based community partners continue to support us with SMART readers, field trip volunteers, and collaboration with our Impact Northwest and our SHINE program to provide our food backpacks for families every Friday. They fill and deliver close to 100 backpacks each week. We also count on them to help with our community activities such as our Earth Day celebration and the annual Barnes cleanup day in the fall. Cedar Hills Baptist also runs a significant food drive each year in December for our families who experience food instability over the winter break.
- STEM Connect provides science and engineering instruction for our 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students. They are currently conducting a survey of former 4<sup>th</sup> graders to follow up from last year's units of instruction.
- Morrison Center has joined the Barnes family and is currently providing mental health services for 10+ families. Our bilingual therapist will be able to serve approximately 25 families who may otherwise experience barriers to accessing mental health resources.
- Impact Northwest/SHINE has collaborated with our assistant principal and counselor to provide games for families to take home as part of our family engagement group called "Family Connections". We are also collaborating with the Welcome Center for this

- group, working with our district bilingual social worker to provide the group materials in Spanish.
- NIKE supports us by sending multiple volunteers to coordinate and run athletic activities
  during our yearly field day. They generously donate their time and gear to make this
  event more spectacular than it could be without them. NIKE employees also serve as
  SMART readers and occasional classroom volunteers. NIKE volunteers are also running
  with students twice a week, working towards running a marathon worth of miles.



## Plans for the 2015-2016 school year:

- 1. In addition to continuing 3<sup>rd</sup> grade Supply Chain and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade Lemonade Activity programs, we are adding the Intel Day program for 1<sup>st</sup> grade this year to allow more students STEM-focused learning opportunities.
- 2. Continued partnership with Cedar Mill Library to promote reading and community-based service projects.
- 3. Book Fair Book Drive: Findley students and families can support students at a neighboring elementary school by donating books from the annual book fair. The intention is for staff at McKinley to give books to students at their discretion to promote literacy and allow for books to remain in the home. The team also discussed providing school supplies in the future.
- 4. The team discussed ways to support surrounding organizations with gently used school supplies at the end of the school year as well as ways to involve students more directly with partnerships.
- 5. West Hills Homes NW is the company developing the property adjacent to Findley. The developers have connected with the school, as the children in this development will eventually attend Findley.

#### **Summary of Progress:** (please use additional pages if needed)

- 1. At this point in the year, all 3<sup>rd</sup> grade classes participated in the Lego Supply Chain and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade classes participated in the Lemonade Activity. First grade is still awaiting their STEM-focused learning opportunity. Intel employees volunteer their time to lead the activities.
- 2. The Cedar Mill Library is coming to a school assembly to kick off the summer reading program. We are continuing conversations about other service projects to collaborate on, following the "Read for Goats" Winter Reading Challenges.
- 3. Students and families donated 67 books to McKinley Elementary from purchases made during Findley's Book Fair. The books were donated for McKinley students to take home and encourage a love of reading. The PTO plans to continue this project in the future and hopes
- 4. On Friday, April 8th, West Hills Homes NW invited kindergarten and 3<sup>rd</sup> grade students to participate in the groundbreaking ceremony for the new development adjacent to Findley. This experience connected with both grade levels' PYP units. Kindergarten recently finished a unit of inquiry into how homes are similar and different, the influence of resources and location on home design and the connection between culture and homes, under the central idea, "Resources, location and culture impact homes." Third grade's unit involved an inquiry into skills needed to collaborate, how perspectives impact collaboration and the roles within a collaborative community, under the central idea that, "Collaboration creates a thriving community." Thanks again to West Hills Homes NW for the learning opportunity and experience provided to students.

#### Plans for the 2015-2016 school year:

**Oregon Food Bank:** Partnership to provide the first full service food pantry open to all Greenway students/families. The pantry will include fresh produce along with non-perishables. OFB provided all equipment, training and will provide ongoing support. To date, we have provided **20,000 pounds** of food to **2,073 individuals** in our immediate community.

**Tualatin River National Wildlife Refuge:** Agency partnership to provide urban wildlife outreach pilot program with our students and access to Fanno Creek. Team will provide ongoing support for science based learning integrated with reading and writing. Plans to also support field trips, materials and natural science experts to collaborate with teachers. Provided space and education at no cost during teacher pre-service week.

TRNWR has presented in our 1<sup>st</sup>grade classrooms in preparation for their field trip. In addition, they have worked with our Kindergarten classes to provide a Puddle Stompers program to prepare students for their filed trip in January.

**THPRD:** Attends Back to School Night to share resources with families, hosts ESL family swim night and tour of facility. Assists our ESL team with registering non-English speaking families for programs and activities.

Greenway Parent Teacher Organization: Supports all school and community engagement efforts.

**Latino Parent Teacher Organization:** Supports all school and community engagement efforts in partnership with PTO. Facilitating multiple fundraising events. This group is also working to increase the school volunteering capacity of our Latino parent population.

Safe Routes to School/Washington County: Collaborates with principal, parent representative, Beaverton Police and central office to provide safe routes to school encouragement, education and reinforcement. Facilitates Walk and Bike to School Day, and attends Back to School Night to share resources and education with families.

**Greenway Staff:** ESL Teacher, Counselor, Parent Educator, & Social Support Liaison: Each member represented on the CPT is the lead contact person for one or multiple groups represented on our team.

**Greenway Neighborhood Association:** Supporting our Food Pantry needs through regular volunteering. Due to this partnership, our food pantry is able to allow for more capacity of service to 5 surrounding schools on an as needed basis

**Beaverton Library:** In Fall of 2015, the Beaverton Library has come to parent education events at Greenway to share with parents how to utilize the library, the resources that are available to them, and the importance of reading to their children at home. The Beaverton Library will be coming to the Kindergarten Roundup in the spring. This summer multiple grade levels will be challenged to complete the program with 100% participation to help reduce summer reading loss. Library events are now listed on the school calendar in the glass case in the lobby area of Greenway. This informs families of current events at the library. The library is scheduled to come to Homework Club twice for story time in February and March. The library will also attend our last day of school assembly to promote summer reading in addition to reading during our summer lunch and pre-k programs. They will work with parent engagement during our pre-kindergarten summer school.

**Kindred Partners:** Supporting our Food Pantry needs through volunteering. . Due to this partnership, our food pantry is able to allow for more capacity of service to 5 surrounding schools on an as needed basis. This group is also supplying funds and donations for fundraising efforts, school supplies and holiday help.

**Metro West Women's Club:** Supporting our Food Pantry needs through volunteering. . Due to this partnership, our food pantry is able to allow for more capacity of service to 5 surrounding schools on an as needed basis. This group also regularly reads to kindergarten and 1<sup>st</sup> grade students so we can support the reading of 500 books to each student this year.

Student tutors (for credit) our students during the school day and student volunteers support our after school academic clubs focused on struggling students. In addition, our three second grade classes are each partnering with a tenth grade class at Sunset on a writing and editing project. Several sports teams at Sunset offered experiences for Terra Linda students next year to support our recent Auction.
- The clean-up event continues to be on hold due to the fast progress on our track project.
- Laurel Park update: Representatives came to Terra Linda during Dr. Seuss week to read Green Eggs and Ham to our first graders. The staff brought Dr. Seuss hats for each student, real green scrambled eggs and ham for the students to eat, and cans of apple juice for each student to drink, not to mention plates, forks, and straws. The students loved the event! We plan to visit Laurel Park in the fall to offer a regular volunteer opportunity to residents. We are looking forward to an expanded partnership.
- Our fundraising efforts to install a track have been highly successful.
  We have raised over \$200,000 for a quarter-mile, all-weather surface
  track. We had incredible contributions from our Terra Linda families,
  the greater Terra Linda community, businesses, and corporations.
  We are looking forward to an installed track as soon as all planning
  steps can be completed.
- Our new dismissal plan improved supervision and safety for all students in the afternoons. We appreciated the input and support from Lynne Mutrie from Safe Routes to School. She partnered with one of our parents to design a traffic flow pattern in the neighborhood. We have a full-color map with a recommended traffic

flow and no-parking zones. Our goal is to eliminate any U-turns, backing up, and two-way traffic at the intersection closest to Terra Linda's campus. We are hopeful that this parent-designed plan will result in adoption by our Terra Linda families. As part of the plan, we are also encouraging more students and families to walk home rather than picking up students in a vehicle. We are implementing the new recommendations this spring in hopes that is a regular habit in the fall.

### Updates for this school year:

Sunset Presbyterian Church is seeking to recharge their vision for supporting and building the community and as such would like William Walker to revision the types and timings of support. In previous years, they have sponsored one weekend in May in which over a hundred volunteers participated in a planned project. Now, they would like to have more projects at a smaller scale, hoping that volunteers will want to connect with the community on an on-going basis.

This is the third of a five-year Twenty-First Century grant through Impact Northwest. This, and the subsequent years, will see a decrease in the

funding provided each year. Along with the SHINE program, we will be seeking additional support and grants in order to maintain the SHINE afterschool and summer school program at William Walker.

### **Summary of Progress:**

In December, we created a new program we named *Read to Me 500 Books*. We sent emails and made phone calls to various volunteers and connections in the community seeking volunteers and a coordinator (also a volunteer position). Many volunteers answered the opportunity and retired administrator, Linda Hall, volunteered to coordinate the program. To date, we have 35 volunteers, between 3 to five each day, coming to our school from 8:30 to 11 AM to read with our kindergarten students each morning as part of the center rotation for all kindergarten classrooms. With Linda's outstanding coordination with the kindergarten team and weekly emails to the volunteers, this program has contributed to the academic growth of our kindergarten students and the enjoyment and sense of connecting with the school for our community.

Additionally on April 19<sup>th</sup>, with plans for a May date in the works, students from Cedar Park and their teacher joined the volunteers reading with the kindergarten students. (See photos below)





The SHINE facilitators (Amy Powers and Anna Vo) have established ongoing relationships with current partners and added partners to support the afterschool and summer program, enabling William Walker to further stretch the limited budget for these programs. At this time, we continue to seek additional resources so that together we can run a full summer program. Currently, we are applying for grants, but at this time we have not received additional funding. Thus, our summer school program will serve fewer students (incoming kindergarten through fifth grade) than we have in the previous two years.

companies that donated materials and supervisory support. During the Saturday students replanted the flagpole roundabout, redid an abandoned swale, placed boulders for sitting near the cafeteria, pruned shrubbery throughout the campus, and spread bark dust.

Community partnership team: This group began last year and includes about 4-6 partners from various faith-based groups in the BHS area. We have added some additional faith partners since November. This fall, the group met and is developing plans for the group to support the existing programs of support that exist within the BHS community already—Beaver Den (food closet), Becca's closet, homeless birthday baskets, and food support for families over holidays and breaks. We hope to expand the reach of the committee this year to include support for AVID and ASPIRE.

BHS Booster Club: They have provided ongoing support to "boost" student participation in activities and athletics as well as supporting students in many other ways. This year, already the club provided funds to support the BHS Dragon Boat team, ticket for a playoff football game, and last year gave five \$1,000 college scholarships to BHS graduates. In addition, the Booster Club is forging strong connections with the BHS Alumni community of over 30,000 and bringing them back to support BHS.

**PSU:** For the past two years BHS benefited from a strong partnership with Portland State University's counseling program. This year PSU located two half time mental health interns at BHS during the day. In combination these two interns are able to provide 4 days of support for BHS students. Their total caseload is already close to 40 students. In addition, PSU marriage and family counseling interns are on campus every Tuesday evening to provide low cost couples and family counseling.

**Beaverton School Based Health Center:** The SBHC continues to grow in the number of patients served. The student committee is planning the year's projects that will include various health related campaigns and events.

**Success Fund:** This year, the BHS Success Fund continues to support BHS students by providing resources in the areas of Academics, Student Supports, and Technology. Last year, 15 teachers applied for micro grants through the Site Council and these projects are already providing rich experiences for teachers and students alike. In the area of facilities, last summer the BHS library; student center, college and career center, and community room underwent remodels. The new spaces offer environments for collaboration and learning that all BHS students enjoy.

**BHS Centennial Celebration:** We started the official 100<sup>th</sup> year celebration in January with the release of the first Hall of Achievement inductees from the BHS Golden Grads. There are many activities being planned by the school and community partners.



Each student was given a \$125 voucher to shop for new clothing at Fred Meyer. Once again Assistance League provided us with additional funds to go over the original goal.

In March we held our annual consultation meeting for participation in ESEA Federal Grants Program with the Private schools in the district area.

Our next annual Child Care Symposium meeting for preschools and child care providers in the Beaverton school district area will be held on May 24<sup>th</sup>. Our theme this year is Joyful Literacy Learning Starts with a Book. This is an opportunity for child care providers to come and participate in an evening of information, practical ideas and activities designed to support children in their development of foundational skills and knowledge. Attendees will receive a certificate of participation, which will count toward professional hours for CDA Competency #2 or Oregon Registry Core Knowledge Category: Learning Environments and Curriculum.
