During the month of January our campus saw an overall increase in our daily attendance rate. The daily attendance rate increased from 82.19% in December to 82.99% in January. PreK had an attendance rate of 83.19%, Kindergarten was 82.02%, and First grade was 84.20% for the month of January.

With our Blackfeet Tribal Court Referrals complete for our first grade and kindergarten students who have significant attendance concerns, the Principals shifted their focus in January for attendance home visits. Home visits in January targeted students with <80% attendance rather than our significant Tier III attendance students. This new group of students is our "bubble group" for Tier II and Tier III. During our home visits, we shared student achievement data, minor attendance concerns, and a positive note about how an improvement in their child's attendance would have positive results in their academic achievement in both reading and math. Six parent contacts via telephone were made, 11 home visits conducted, and 3 Truancy Court meetings were held at KW/Vina Chattin during the month.

## SAFETY MATTERS (School)

January began at KW Bergan/Vina Chattin with reteaching of classroom expectations, routines, and procedures to support ongoing positive behavior supports for students. All classroom teachers took the time after the Christmas break to reteach expectations on our campus. The school counselor, as well as the Teacher's Assistants also planned a Safety Station day to reteach

school-wide expectations. Students rotated through each station reviewing the expectations for the hallway, cafeteria, bus/bus line up, playground, and the bathroom.

Behavior referrals decreased from 29 in December to 28 in January. During the month of December, we utilized the SWIS Suite Behavior Referral Tracking System to document student behavior. January's behavior referrals will also be track in the SWIS program. Tracking behavior referrals in the SWIS Tracking System allows us to target changes for specific areas of the building, times of day, or days of the week that may be especially challenging for our students. Below is the disaggregated data from December's behavior referrals as present inthe SWIS Behavior Tracking System. The behavior referrals for KW/Vina will be tracked with the SWIS program for the remainder of the school year.

January has been a very long month;) and now that it's over I look back at the whirlwind of things we dealt with. Students seem to be having lots of behavior issues so lots of time just sitting with students and working with them until they were ready to return to class. The behaviors seemed to be escalated and coming from students who didn't have issues before.

These babies are coming to school dealing with issues that no human being should ever have to endure, especially our Sacred Beings. My heart breaks for them but showing them lots of love and support is sometimes all that we can do. Giving them the tools to be safe and knowing how to get help when they are not in the school is also sometimes all we can do. Being the only school counselor working in two buildings and 370 students, I feel I am only putting "tiny bandaids" on the situation with the child.

We had an increase in the amount of headlice. Some cases were so bad they were coming out of the clothes. Thankfully, each teacher/staff was given tea tree oil to use in their classrooms. Notes were sent home to the parents to opt out of being treated with tea tree oil. We continue to make sure students are ready to learn by providing them with clean and appropriate clothing. Sadly, some of our students show up unkept so basic hygiene practices are administered before school starts. We continue to work with Blackfeet Social Services, Blackfeet Boarding Dorm, Indian Health Service, Southern Piegan School Based Clinic, State of Montana Family Services, etc. Last year we seen a rise in negative behaviors and referrals so we planned for Safety Stations to be held in January as a review after a lengthy break.

The Safety Stations went well. It's always nice to have the Transportation Department participate. My SPAM Friday's this month were centered around "boogers and germs" because of all the sickness with our kids and staff. I also continue to review the self-identity piece of being Amskapi Pikuni. Solutions meetings and home visits were also on the agenda. Working with AltaCare getting students enrolled in their program kept me busy as well.
