ELL Report to the Morrow County School District Board 6-13-2005

The beginning of May brought the close of in-putting all our LAS (Language Assessment Scales) information on testing our 700 ELL students into School Master and sending it to the Oregon Department of Education. With all the help of our ELL site coordinators, and Mrs. Rose Dirksen, we were able to eventually have our data be received by the State with no errors. This assures that we will receive our ELL funding for every ELL student served in our school district.

The District ELL Plan was under review by the State, as was every ELL plan in the state. Our ELL plan received a Differed Approval status. Thus the ELL director had to undergo to add the adjustments that the State required of the District ELL Plan of Morrow County School District. The plan was adjusted to, then sent back to the State, and it is waiting for its adjusted status to be recognized by the State Department of Education. On State approval, the plan will be submitted to administrative review, and then given to the school board for final approval.

Each school, through their ELL site coordinators, has been getting ready to finish off the school year with pertinent data necessary in following our plan. Coordinators have been developing lists of ELL students who will be exited or monitored out from the district's ELL program. We are aiming to get 10 to 20% to be in this category. We are also collecting school review data about the ELL programs in each building. It is a self-review the State provides. It is also in our plan to conduct such annual reviews about the program's needs and progress.

All in all, I am happy with my first year as ELL director. The results of student progress will be know at the beginning of next year when we get all our report cards for the schools and the district. We have followed, as close as possible, the ELL District Plan. I especially want to thank all of the ELL site coordinators for their long hard work, and their patience with me as their director. It has been a good year. Deep in my heart, I give thanks to whom thanks is due.

Special Education Report

With the few days left in the year, we are actually gearing up for the start of the next school year. We have hired two new special education teachers for next year. One will be at ACH and one will be at IES. For the last two weeks students with severe needs have been working in the new special education classroom at IES. That transition seems to have gone very well so far. The room offers more space, easier handicapped access and a larger bathroom. Students with less severe learning disabilities will be seen in a regular classroom in the building.

At the last special education directors meeting at the ESD, twelve school districts voted to go with the new Edvantage software that will be used to write Individual Education Programs and track information on special education students for the state handicapped census that is due in December. The new program will be web based, meaning that it can be accessed from any computer that has Internet capabilities. Special education teachers from our district will be participating in all day training in Hermiston on August 8th to learn about the new program.

The final report to the state on our special education program for monitoring, called the Systems Performance Review was sent in. There were two areas in paperwork that we need to improve on, but overall we have done very well, without one complaint to the state department this year on services to special education students.

Our state tests recently completed have third-graders achieving 97% passing in reading and 81% passing in math. Our fourth graders have 93% passing in both math and reading. These are exceptional scores, the highest in these grades ever in our school. We are very proud of our student efforts and of our staff diligence in using research-based, effective curriculum to its fullest. We look forward to continuing hard work in the future and success.

-Bear Day/night-270 students qualified for the Bear activities this year. By reaching their fourth quarter reading goals, kindergarten through second graders participated in the Bear Day activities. Students played games, did crafts, played bingo, and did a reading activity. They concluded with the infamous Running in the Halls. Fourth and fifth grade students did the same activities and in addition got to sleep overnight in the gym. A great time was had by all.

-You've probably noticed that we have green grass in front of our parking lot on the Irrigon Greenway once again. We are working hard to keep it alive and its good to come out the other side of sewer construction. No joke intended.

-Summer School Planned-ACH will be having migrant and benchmark Summer School again this year. This program, as well as our after-school program has shown to be tremendously effective, increasing student learning at a faster rate for the students participating in comparison with those not participating. From the spring of 04 to the spring testing of 05, third-graders who became this year's fourth graders increased their state benchmark scores by 13 points if they had participated in Summer school and/or after-school programming. Those who did not, increased their scores by 7.5 points, or about a year of progress. More time put in means more progress.

Teacher Appreciation Week: The first week in May was National Teacher Appreciation Week. Teachers at Riverside were recognized by the Administration and treated to a different international cuisine for lunch each day from the Classified Staff. The Leadership Class also honored teachers by making signs and presenting them with small gifts of appreciation each day.

IHS/IES Principal Report for the June 2005 board meeting.


Activities at IHS and IES:

For this board report I thought it would be valuable to highlight our testing results for this year, as well as our 4-year trend at Heppner Jr/Sr High School. The graph below represents the average of our 8th and 10th grade scores(these are the numbers that ODE uses for report card ratings). The teachers and I have worked extremely hard aligning our curriculum and instruction with the State Standards, as well as modifying our instructional techniques to meet the needs of ALL of our students. You'll note that we have made substantial growth in our reading, writing, and math scores. Although our science dipped slightly when averaging the 8th and 10th grade results, we maintained an 88% passing rate for our 10th grade scores!
