PROPOSED REVISIONS

RELATION TO ESSENTIAL KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS The District shall establish instructional objectives that relate to the essential knowledge and skills for grade-level subjects or courses. These objectives shall address the skills needed for successful performance in the next grade or next course in a sequence of courses.

Assignments, tests, projects, classroom activities, and other instructional activities shall be designed so that each student's performance indicates the level of mastery of the designated District objectives.

GUIDELINES FOR GRADING

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that each campus or instructional level develops guidelines for teachers to follow in determining grades for students. These guidelines shall ensure that grading reflects a student's relative mastery of an assignment and that a sufficient number of grades are taken to support the grade average assigned. Guidelines for grading shall be clearly communicated to students and parents.

The District shall permit a student who meets the criteria detailed in the grading guidelines a reasonable opportunity to redo an assignment or retake a test for which the student received a failing grade.

END-OF-COURSE ASSESSMENTS

When required by state law, a student's score on the initial end-ofcourse (EOC) assessment shall count for 15 percent of the student's final grade for the course as reported on the student's transcript.

CREDIT

An EOC assessment score shall affect whether a student receives credit for a course only if the score results in the student earning credit, as calculated in accordance with the District's grading guidelines. If a student's score on an EOC assessment results in lowering the student's grade below passing, the score will not affect whether the student receives credit for the course.

RETAKES

If a student retakes an EOC assessment during the summer after completion of the course, the District will not include the retake score inas 15 percent of the final course grade calculation for the course as reported on the student's transcript. An EOC assessment only if the retake score shall not affect whether the allows a student receives to gain credit for the course. The final course grade will not be above a 70 after the final grade is recalculated following the summer retake. Retakes after the first available retake offered in the summer following the course completion will not be used to recalculate the final grade.

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT GRADING/PROGRESS REPORTS TO PARENTS

SPECIAL EDUCATION

A student's ARD committee shall determine the type of assessment to be administered and how the score on an EOC assessment shall be used for final course grades, credit decisions, and graduation requirements.

GRADING

Calculation of grades with EOC assessment scores shall be in accordance with the District's grading guidelines.

PROGRESS REPORTING The District shall issue grade reports/report cards every nine weeks on a form approved by the Superintendent or designee. Performance shall be measured in accordance with this policy and the standards established in EIE.

INTERIM REPORTS

Interim progress reports may be issued at the teacher's discretion; however, notice of a student's consistent unsatisfactory performance shall be issued in accordance with law.

CONFERENCES

In addition to conferences scheduled on the campus calendar, conferences may be requested by a teacher or parent as needed.

ACADEMIC DISHONESTY

A student found to have engaged in academic dishonesty shall be subject to grade penalties on assignments or tests and disciplinary penalties in accordance with the Student Code of Conduct. Academic dishonesty includes cheating or copying the work of another student, plagiarism, and unauthorized communication between students during an examination. The determination that a student has engaged in academic dishonesty shall be based on the judgment of the classroom teacher or another supervising professional employee, taking into consideration written materials, observation, or information from students.
