The school year is flying by faster than Santa's sleigh. BNAS, Music, Health & PE are diligently practicing for the Stamkisiitsiikim Elementary Christmas concerts. In additions, Mrs. Powell recently read, Ice Breaker: How Mabel Fairbanks changed figure skating. She introduced our Little Learners to ice skating and exposed them to a plethora of new vocabulary. In the meantime, in the library, The reaching forth The Gold Reading Program is climbing to new heights. As of November 22nd, the end of the first round our students are doing amazing this year. We have had a 261% increase of Reading Responses turned in from last year. We had 632 turned in for the academic school year 2023/24 and it's only December and we are at 2283! 1st Grade Mrs. Bird Ratter 547 earned games in the library, Kindergarten Mrs. Shooter 229 earned puzzles and Ms. Small 189 earned colorful pencils. Moreover the staff is engaging as well. We read 25 books last year and this year we are at 42. BNAS Teacher, Kortni Guardipee is in the lead with seventeen books read.
