We have seen a small increase in most areas. This is good. Our efforts to encourage Latino students by word-of-mouth have had a small result. Also the encouragement to coaches and personnel to encourage Hispanics to go out for sports has added Latinos in the Jr. High and high school football programs. District help for the Pay-to-Play has also had a positive effect to bring students into our programs who other wise could not afford to play sports.

A drawback is that in the Total Percentages of Hispanic students in fall programs we have are 35%, 34% and 38%. Hispanic student population is at least 50% or more. We still don't see the equal numbers of Latinos going into extra-curricular activities commensurate by their percentage numbers.

As the numbers of Hispanic males are involving themselves into American football we need to work on the Anglo males involving themselves into Soccer. Any ideas that turn around this situation are something we ought to consider too.
