Attendance for the month of September was 89.23% (3.56% higher than August) for K-12th Grade and 90.64% for K3-K4 (6.88% higher than August).

- All students have designated library time by grade level in their schedule(s), so all students have the ability to check out books and complete research for classes with the supervision of their teachers.
- Four students qualified for Cross Country State and will be traveling to Anchorage October 5-7. Coach Jonathan Rodriguez and Chaperone Lillian Itta will be accompanying Amber Neakok, Spencer Itta, Zereah Henry, and Harris Henry to the State meet.
- Parent Teacher Conferences were held at the end of September. Attendance was greatly improved this year, and a special shout out goes to Mrs. Bilbrey's class for 100% participation. All students in her class had at least one parent or guardian attend. The students in that class received a popcorn party for their efforts.
- Volleyball has started. The schedule is attached. First home volleyball games in two years are happening!
- Beginning of the Year Assessments have been concluded. Tutoring is set to begin as soon as the plan is approved. Tier I and Tier II reading and math interventions are in place.

Becky recently transitioned from the upper elementary classroom to the reading specialist/interventionist position, and has made great progress with the students. Ms. Long puts in countless hours in her contributions to the school and the district, often working twelve plus hours in a day. With her as the site testing coordinator, we were able to increase our participation rate in beginning of the year assessments and completed testing before the window closed.
