Secondary School

1. Hanson Presented at Caribbean Conference

The Caribbean Association of Home Economics Inc. (C.A.H.E. 1972) hosted its 25th Biennial Conference in Trinidad and Tobago from April 13-16, 2025, under the theme: "Home Economics, Al, Values, and Attitudes: Interrogating the Nexus." This was their first in-person conference since the covid pandemic.

A release from the Trinidad Ministry of Education stated that this year's conference explored the evolving intersection of Home Economics and emerging technologies, particularly the integration of Artificial Intelligence (AI) into education and daily life.

The conference featured major sessions plus a series of pre-conference and in-conference workshops designed to deepen the knowledge and skills of participants across various Home Economics domains.

Jill Hanson from the United States was asked to present Modern Technology in the classroom, showing several technologies that include classroom organization, teaching strategies, and the advantages and disadvantages of Al. Other presentations in Education and Technology included lesson planning with Al, and a Journal Writers' Workshop—topics which generated high interest among educators as schools increasingly embrace Al-enhanced learning platforms in the Caribbean. Workshops spanned diverse areas, including: Culinary Arts: Roti making, Dhal Puri, Doubles, Samosas, and Tobago's celebrated Blue Food. In the area of Clothing and Textiles, the focus was on: Techniques in African head wrapping, Sari draping, and Cosmetology with a focus on Make-up Artistry.

The Home Economics Association viewed this conference as a powerful platform for both personal and professional development. It provided educators with the opportunity to exchange ideas, learn new skills, and remain at the forefront of pedagogical innovation.

2. Music Department

- a. Hoagies: During the spring hoagie sale, the students sold 2,500 hoagies. These hoagies were made and assembled in 3 hours.

There are two All-State bands, of equal ability; The Symphonic Band and the Concert Band. Nate will be performing with the Concert Band.

He was selected through a vigorous audition process where he competed with Trumpet players all over the state in every school; All state has no divisions for enrollment; They simply take the best players from every school that auditions students; This means he was competing with the largest schools in the state who have more resources and opportunities for their students to study privately. It is VERY difficult for "outstate" students in small schools to get accepted, so this is a huge honor!

Nate will attend All-State camp in the first week in August at Concordia College in Moorhead MN, culminating with a grand concert at the end of the week. Furthermore, he will be performing with the same group at the 2026 MMEA Mid-Winter Clinic next February! That concert will be held on stage at Orchestra Hall.
