A.C. Houghton Elementary

- Our third-grade class will be going to Pendleton to view Beauty and the Beast at the Vert Auditorium. This will be April 10. This is a great cultural and educational opportunity for students.

We have received the CDs with musical compositions prepared by each class during their weeklong visit at ACH. Accelerated Reading: Our students continue to exceed all reading expectations. This quarter, our students earned 4781.4 points; fifth grade earned 2770.7 and sixth grade earned 1989.0. The average level of book read was 4.5-5.0 grade level. Our total for the year sits at 13,167.9! This is truly incredible when you take in to account that 126 kids have done all the reading. That's 104.5 points per student......AMAZING!

They then tested their designs. During the Car Race competition they designed, constructed and raced their dragster designs.

This month of March has brought the ELL director into having the second PAC Parent Action Committee in Spanish for parents in Irrigon. There were about four parents at ACH and 25 parents at IES. About ten Irrigon Spanish speaking parents joined the PAC to formulate a parent group in Irrigon. Now we have Two-PACs. They will be visiting different school groups learning what school business is all about.

Three New Temporary Migrant Education Aids

The ESD provided more temporary funding to help give more supportive instruction to the district's identified Migrant Education students. We have hired three temporary educational aids to work in Sam Boardman, Windy River, Riverside, AC Houghton, Irrigon Jr./Sr. High and Irrigon Elementary schools. These three individuals are now in place and serving those identified students.

School Volunteers at SBE Carnival

A lot of work went into the Sam Boardman Carnival. It was an economic success! The ELL director was able to be involved by coordinating the student involvement of over 50 high school and junior high schools students from Riverside High. Students received credit for community service and other incentives for helping in such a large endeavor.

Morrow Education Center

We begin the month of April with 86 students currently enrolled, 46 of which are Morrow County students. As spring break is now over and the fourth quarter is off and running, students at MEC are trying to focus on sustained progress and academic growth.

An important emphasis this month at Morrow Education Center has been placed on leadership and the willingness to allow our students to independently make decisions based on the well-being of our program and their academic growth. Thus, this month at any given point in the day students can be found developing life skills essential to their success outside of these classroom walls. Students have actively been involved in the routine cleaning of our building, helping serve lunch to other students, cleaning of our buses and van, and other non-intrusive clerical duties such as placing address labels on outgoing mail. It is our vision at MEC to create an environment in which the student body takes great pride in. No doubt the additional development of such self directed hands on learning has lead to greater student motivation and engagement. I also believe that it has helped in lowering our drop-out rates.

In addition to our focus on self-directed learning, we have also implemented an additional weight training period, giving our students more access to the new equipment purchased with the innovation in the classroom grant. The MEC staff will also continue to demand growth in the fields of academics, attendance and behavior. While credit recovery is often a necessity for MEC students, we continue to offer a wide variety of classes using multiple delivery methods. We enjoy working in the classroom here at MEC and welcome the daily challenges that go along with this program. We remain committed to serving the students of Morrow Education Center and providing a safe alternative learning environment for all students to thrive in.
