## **Riverside High School**

#### PROGRESS REPORTS & PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES

Riverside held its 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter progress reports and parent-teacher conferences on Tuesday, November 29<sup>th</sup> from 4:00-8:00. Many parents took advantage of this opportunity to visit with their student's teachers and learn of any problems early in the grading period, giving them time to make adjustments or corrections before final grades are posted.

#### LEA MATHIEU EARNS NATIONAL CERTIFICATION

Lea Mathieu has earned certification in Adolescent and Young Adult Language Arts from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, the most rigorous certification process available to K-12 teachers.

According to the NBPTS, "National Board Certification measures a teacher's practice against high and rigorous standards through an extensive series of performance-based assessments that includes teaching portfolios, student work samples, videos and thorough analyses of the candidate's teaching and student's learning. They also complete a series of written exercises that probe the depth of their subject-matter knowledge, as well as their understanding of how to teach those subjects to their students."

National certification qualifies Lea for a continuing license in Oregon and for employment throughout the United States. She is also certified in Social Studies and is completing endorsement requirements this winter for both English to Speakers of Other Languages and as a Reading Specialist.

Lea is in her 7<sup>th</sup> year of teaching for the Morrow County School District, at Riverside High School in Boardman for the last four years. She will be taking a sabbatical next year to teach at Colegio Mexico-Americano in Puerto Vallarta, Mexico, with the goals of improving her Spanish and deepening her understanding of the Mexican culture, to better serve Hispanic students at Riverside.

#### RHS ATTENDS MUSIC FESTIVAL

Riverside had the honor of participating in the annual MENC Regional Honor Band & Choir Festival which was held in Pendleton on November 7<sup>th</sup> & 8<sup>th</sup>. It was two days of intense rehearsal followed by an evening concert. This was a great opportunity for our students to get together with some of the best high school musicians in the area and to work with first class conductors who are brought in specifically for this occasion. It was a time of incredibly hard work with some fun and social time mixed in culminating in the reward of performing to a nearly sellout out crowd on the final night.

# RIVERSIDE DRAMA PRESENTS

Eighteen high school students and four junior high students entertained the community in "Pirate's Folly" on November 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> under the direction of Kathie Goad, Rick Drake and community member Kathiy Martin. The fall production was set about as a challenge issued to the students to select and produce material to be presented on stage. There were several groups of students who explored the possibility of a play or musical selection. Their field narrowed down to about four or five active groups. One group pursued comedy by combining classic material with today's advertising. Other groups adapted movie material or one-act plays to suit their creative outlet. Another group had a student who wrote and used his vision to cast and stage his dialogue. The material for "Inuyasha: Onaga, the Shadow Demon" is based on anime, form of serial cartoon out of Japan. There was even one piece developed while taking a break during an evening of practice.

The students had to block out their productions, schedule practice time on stage and organize props, costumes and stage settings. "It was a real lesson in collaboration and compromise within the smaller groups and a great sense of cooperation in the group as a whole," said Mrs. Goad.

#### NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY BLOOD DRIVE

The National Honor Society conducted a blood drive in conjunction with the Red Cross. Forty-five pints of blood were collected. Although that was below the goal set by the Red Cross, the amount represented a great opportunity for saving lives in an area that chronically has a shortage of blood.

# **Windy River Elementary**

I will begin my report with some great news for Windy River. We received a \$4,416.00 grant from the Cycle Oregon Organization. This money will be used to for the purchase and installation of a reader board for Windy River. Anna Browne wrote the grant proposal in cooperation with our WRE site council. We are excited about the project and look forward to its completion. At this time we have not established a time line, so look for more information in upcoming reports.

We have also finished our first round of state testing with very encouraging results. 67 % of our 6<sup>th</sup> grade students met or exceeded their math benchmarks and 56% met or exceeded their reading benchmarks. Our 5<sup>th</sup> grade had 60% meet or exceed in Math and 55% in reading. These are exciting numbers considering we still the majority of the school year left to increase our scores.

Our parent teacher conferences that we held in early November were very successful; with 77 % of our parents coming in to visit with their child's teacher.

Overall, the program has been running smoothly and our staff continues to be dedicated towards student-centered achievement. Each day we are blessed to see the learning process take place. Approaching our student's interests as academic learners and as people continues to assure we are working towards our goal of serving the students of Morrow Education Center and providing them with a safe and effective learning environment.

# **Irrigon High School**

**Testing Completed** – This testing window the students at Irrigon Jr. Sr. High School were able to initiate the mobile lap top computers and were able to stay with their Advisory groups. This allowed the students more elbow room, accountability opportunity to test in their advisor's classroom. The testing went very smoothly with many students' scores improving. Teachers and students remarked at how they appreciated this format. One highlight of this testing window was that our math scores were comparable to last spring's scores.

**Booster Club Involvement** – The Knight's Pride Booster club has been working hard with the teachers, administration and coaches to promote and encourage student activities at Irrigon Junior/Senior High School. Halloween Night the community was able to get together by the Booster Club sponsored bonfire. The many people that came enjoyed cookies and Hot Cider. The Booster club is also working to have dinners available at weekend basketball games as well as operating the concession stand. All money raised by the Booster Club is distributed to clubs and sports as well as the establishment of a scholarship. All those that are interested can sign up for membership.

Canned Food Drive – This year giving at Irrigon Jr. Sr. High was exceptional. Our students and staff competed with each other. Over 2100 items were collected in the days leading up to Thanksgiving Break. All the items donated will be given to the Irrigon Fire Department who will distribute them to needy families in the community around the holidays. Mr. David Westenskow's classroom led all others by bringing in over 400 items. Students celebrated their accomplishments by holding a special assembly, which included throwing pies at a number of advisors.

Award Recipients – Students and staff at Irrigon Junior/Senior High School have recently picked up some awards. The Irrigon Chamber of Commerce announced the following outstanding people in Irrigon. Cristina Montes was selected as Irrigon Outstanding Student; she is a junior who is active in the School ASB Leadership. She has coordinated the annual food drive which netted over 2000 cans this year. She serves at the Senior Center, plans activities for all students and is on the Honor Roll. She is also on the Varsity Track Team. The Irrigon Educator of the Year Award was given to our Library Tech Sharon Sample. Sharon works tirelessly to make sure our students are equipped with everything they need in the library.

Other award recipients include Breena Tolar, Cassandra Feyder, and Patrick Barron for their participation in a poster contest put on by the Soil Water Conservation District. Students also received awards for participating in an essay contest put on by the Veterans of Foreign War. The students were Breena Tolar, Trevor Gering, Aaron Gering, and Jered Gering.

**Winter Sports beginning** – Winter sports are off and running. At Irrigon Junior Senior High School we are encouraged by fielding our first High School Wrestling team. Our Girls Basketball teams are looking good by the 25 young ladies that have turned out this year, our boys team will also be supported by a Junior Varsity team. This will also be the first time that we will be playing a full Varsity schedule with the opportunity to win berths in the State Tournament.

**Construction Report** – We are still looking forward to the beginning of Second Semester and the students being able to move into the classrooms and shop classes, this may be possible as the workers are sandblasting the exterior walls and framing the interior walls. Electricity is now hooked up and from all appearances there is good progress on the completion of our Shop Building.

#### **Special Education**

This time period is probably the most stressful for those special education personnel that are involved with the Special Education Child Census. With the new software program are using (Edvantage), there were a lot of quirks with the system that we were not expecting. The other problem we encountered was that our old system did not download student information to the new system. We have been working at a furious pace to get old and new information into the system that funds our district for special education students. That has taken most of our time and will continue to take our time until December 15<sup>th</sup> when all final changes must be in to the state department.

On another note, we held a very successful training opportunity in our district on November 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>. We hosted John Gill, who is an expert in Autism, at the Port of Morrow for two days. His workshop explained how to work with students with Autism at all different age levels. Some techniques could be carried over to other severe disabilities. Through an ESD grant, all substitute teachers, transportation and meals were paid for. There were no costs incurred by the district. We had 45 people participate over the two days. Five were from Milton-Freewater and three were from Umatilla. The other 37 participants were Morrow County School District employees. I was very please with our attendance.

# **ELL Program**

This month and the end of last month have gone by in an hour and a day.

The greatest experience of my educational career was experienced at Dallas, Texas with two teachers and the assistant superintendent.

Our visit to Houston Independent School District was a paradigm shift in our thinking. Visiting the educational nation champions of our educational system led us to believe in bigger things for our entire school program. It gives me too much to ponder, too much to immediately understand to put into perspective in our small end of the state. This for sure I can and will bring back to our school district. I want to have the best ESL program not just in the state of Oregon, but in the whole West Coast. I think we have found our example to beat.

SIOP was fantastic. By good thinking and discussion, Mr. Smith and I have put together a staff development program that follows along the SIOP program's model to educate teachers and administrators in the program. We were excited to have the creators of the SIOP model be our direct teachers, and to be present with other districts across the nation who were at the same place in our programs. SIOP was present also in our visitations in Huston.

With the award and recognition from the Oregon School Boards Association come great expectations. Yet I want to thank the teachers and instructional aids that really make it happen to our ELL students. We are honored and we are challenged. We want to have every ELL student in our programs achieving like our lower elementary schools at the 90% percentile in state benchmarks. I've seen it. It can be done!

Every administrator, school principal, ELL site coordinator and anyone involved in the ELL program is getting ready for the ESL Title III state audit. We are putting together all things that we do and preparing for their program visit. We will be found lacking and we will be found doing good things. What they discover to be changed will be for our own good. We welcome that. What we may be commended for is only our duty and responsibility. Now the time of our program's scrutiny has come, a full special report of their findings will be made to the Morrow County School Board for your knowledge.

### **Technology Report**

The ESD is preparing an RFP for telecommunications systems. Morrow County SD has submitted an E-Rate application to provide funding for a new phone system due to the current system reaching its end of life and support costs rising annually. A new phone system will reduce annual support costs and allow it to take advantage of the ESDs extensive communications network providing toll-free calling to selected areas in Oregon and Washington.

The new library management software (InfoCenter) will go live during Christmas Break. This new web-based product will revitalize the districts library inventory/checkout systems and make interlibrary cooperation much more efficient.

The Information Technology Department has put together a research team to look into the feasibility of providing services for the installation and support of camera-based security systems. Using Riverside High School as a model system, and the feedback from other districts, we believe this will be a valuable service to provide our customers.
