II. Information and Action Items

	Description
1.	Lac welcomed the Council and thanked everyone for their attendance.
2.	Adult Education and Literacy (Handout attached) Tara Zekavat provided an overview of the services and programs the AEL department offers. She also reviewed data on enrollment, benchmarks, and completion and success rates. A recent audit by HGAC Quality Assurance Regional Monitoring Team revealed the AEL program met 100% satisfaction with no findings. WCJC was the only provider in the Houston-Galveston consortium with no findings.
3.	Academic & Career Advising and Title V Grant Lindsey McPherson announced that the academic advising and Title V areas are fully staffed. The center on the Wharton campus is open and all renovations are complete. The Title V grant is currently in year 3 of 5. The team is in the process of institutionalizing the grant into current operations to integrate a unified department between advising and career and transfer. The advising department recently hosted a number of events and workshops including career fairs and transfer events resulting with over 20 university visits on the Richmond and Wharton campuses this semester alone. A Summer Bridge program, focusing on career development, was held on the Wharton campus in June. Seventeen students attended the program of which 100% of those students registered for the fall semester. Assigned advising, required per the QEP, is underway and is focusing more towards intentional and proactive advising. Future goals for the advising area include the implementation of Degree Works and Handshake (career management system), utilizing career assessments in career advising sessions, and developing an internship program on campus to network with local employers.

	Phyllis Appling provided a handout and reviewed results from comparison data on College				
	Readiness Reading/Writing enrollment and success rates for AY 2019-2020, AY 2020-2021,				
	and AY 2021-2022. Significant improvement has been recorded when students co-enroll in				
	the developmental support course along with the credit course.				
	Phyllis also announced her retirement effective the end of AY23.				
5.	College Readiness Math (Handout attached)				
	Jennifer Mauch provided a handout and reviewed comparison data on enrollment and				
	success rates for College Readiness Math for AY 2019-2020, AY2020-2021, and AY 2021-				
	2022. Improvement has also been recorded with students who co-enroll in the support				
	course along with the credit course.				
6.	Continuing Education (Handout attached)				
0.	Danny Bacot recently joined WCJC as the new CE Program Director. Danny provided an				
	update on CE programs and enrollment as well as grant and corporate training projects.				
	Several CE healthcare courses are aligned to transition into credit level certificates.				
	The CE Department has several vacant staffing positions and is currently understaffed.				
	The hiring process is underway to fill these positions.				
7.	Dean of Vocational Instruction				
	Don Smith provided an overview on staffing changes and program updates within the DVI				
	areas.				
	 Continuing Education – New director, Danny Bacot. CE department experiencing 				
	staffing shortages. Vacant positions have been posted.				
	 Vocational Support Services/Perkins Grant – Rose Ochoa has resigned. The 				
	position is currently posted.				
	• EMS – The EMS program received \$500,000.00 from TRUE Grant (Texas Re-skilling				
	& Up-skilling Education) to provide equipment to the EMS program on the				
	Richmond campus as well as offer student scholarships.				
	Computer Science – Game Development Level II Certificate, Computer Simulation				
	& Game Development AAS degree, and Digital Media Level I Certificate and AAS				
	degree have been deactivated and closed due to continued low enrollment.				
	Information Technology and Networking – New Department was created under				
	the Technology & Business Division. Hiring process underway for faculty and				
	Department Head.				
	 Early Childhood – The EC program moved from the Richmond campus to the 				
	Wharton campus as part of the Community Connections initiative. The program				
	has a new director, Sandra McCarstle. The initiative will focus on developing EC				
	programs in Wharton County.				
	• Curriculum for new short-term certificates in Business Office Technology, Process				
	Technology, and Manufacturing Technology is being developed. If approved by				
	THECB, these certificates will be effective fall 2023 and will be included in the				
	2023-2024 College Catalog.				
	 A School to Work Task Force has been created and is comprised of Wharton 				
	County Economic Development Director, Wharton City Manager, Wharton County				
	Chamber of Commerce President, Wharton ISD CTE Director, and other chamber				
	members. The task force is working to identify current and future talent needs for Wharton County employers				
	Wharton County employers.				
	Collaboration is underway in Bay City with the Economic Development Council				
	and local businesses to open a WCJC Trade School in Matagorda County to				
	provide instruction and/or training in construction trades.				
	WCJC was recently the lead on the steering committee for the Community College				
	Partnership in Workforce (CCPIW). The steering committee coordinates and hosts				
	two events annually: The Women in Industry Conference and the CTE Fall				
	 WCJC was recently the lead on the steering committee for the Community College Partnership in Workforce (CCPIW). The steering committee coordinates and hosts 				

	Seminar. Over 1,500 women participated in the Woman in Industry Conference held in Galveston, TX earlier this year.
8.	Distance Education (Handout attached)
0.	Michele Betancourt provided a handout and reported that the transition from Blackboard
	to D2L Brightspace was a success.
	Ellucian ILP and Brightspace were integrated to transfer student data. DE is still
	experiencing issues primarily with web drops. Michele expressed the urgency for faculty
	to check student rosters and to notify DE via <u>DE@WCJC.edu</u> if discrepancies are found.
	All students, faculty, and staff have been trained on Brightspace. DE will continue to offer
	Brightspace training as well as other instructional-related trainings i.e. SoftChalk, Yuja,
	and Zoom. Division chairs need to inform the DE department of new employees and DE
	will initiate trainings.
	The Online Course Evaluation/Accessibility Compliance Review process is being revised
	and streamlined to conform to the new LMS. DE will pilot the new process in the spring
•	2023 semester.
9.	Library (Handout attached)
	Marissa Saenz provided an overview of the library services offered during AY 2019-2020,
	2020-2021, 2021-2022, and Fall 2022. These services include Service Desk, Computer Lab,
	Library Instruction (F2F), and Online Library Orientation. The Library Database Usage,
	Facility Usage, and Library Resources were also reviewed.
	New TexShare and TexQuest contracts were approved by the Texas State Library and
	Archive Commission (TSLAC) in August. The TexShare contract for access to Infobase
	resources will end December 31, 2022. Several additional TexShare contracts for access to
	EBSCO resources will end August 31, 2023. Marissa urged Division Chairs to inform faculty
	since EBSCO is a popular database and will no longer be available through the state
	contract.
10.	Dual Credit
	Natalie Stavinoha reported a total of 504 area high school students are enrolled in dual
	credit courses for fall 2022. Currently, 15 schools, including 2 private schools, are
	participating in dual credit with WCJC. This fall, Matagorda HS was added to the list.
	Brazos ISD will join the program beginning fall 2023. 100% of Brazos ISD freshmen class is
	scheduled to take dual credit courses. Twelve core courses as well as Spanish will be
	offered via online.
	Rice HS is interested in adding PSYC 1300 (Learning Framework) for sophomore students
	to better prepare them for dual credit core courses. They are also interested in creating a
	Business CTE Track in the future.
	Wharton ISD administrators toured the WCJC Wharton campus in October. Natalie
	thanked all those involved with demonstrations and for making the tour informative.
	Following the tour, discussions occurred on how to better support Wharton ROAR
	students and to increase completion rates. There are currently 8 Wharton HS seniors on
	track to graduate in the spring with an AA degree. There are currently 10 Wharton ROAR
	students taking welding classes on the Wharton campus as part of the Pathways and
	Technology (PTEC) Early College HS.
	Introductory welding and automotive courses are currently being offered at El Campo HS.
	A substantive change has been submitted to SACSCOC seeking approval to increase F2F
	course offerings at Needville and Bay City HS. The decision will be announced at the
	SACSCOC annual meeting in December. If approved, Psychology courses will be added to
	the spring 2023 courses offered at Needville HS and Drama courses will be added for Bay
	City HS.
11.	Senior Citizens (Handout attached) Traci Myers, new Sr. Citizens Program Director, provided an overview of the services and
	Traci Myers, new Sr. Citizens Program Director, provided an overview of the services and
	activities offered to senior citizens through the Sr. Citizens Program. The program

	currently provides congregate and home delivered meals to 121 seniors in Wharton County (Wharton, El Campo) and to 67 seniors in Colorado County (Eagle Lake, Columbus, Weimar). Additional services such as educational programs, table games and activities, health screenings, nutritional information, and local transportation are offered at the Wharton site.
	The program is currently under staffed at all sites in Colorado County. The hiring process is underway to have vacant positions filled as soon as possible. The Sr. Citizens program is funded through federal and regional government bodies, fund
	raising, and individual donations. Fundraisers for the annual 5K Race and BBQ Baked Potatoes are in the planning stages for spring 2023. The dates will be announced once finalized.
12.	Lindsey McPherson reported that the assigned advising process, per the QEP, continues to improve each semester and is working well.
	The Academic Alerts process, also part of the QEP, is being managed through the Faculty Feedback system. Faculty submit an alert into Faculty Feedback which generates an email to the student. Counselors also receive a copy of the alerts and will monitor and reach out to students who receive two or more alerts or for any alert that indicates concern. The Facilitated Learning Centers on the Richmond, Sugar Land, and Wharton campuses have merged with the computer labs on each campus. The benefits of combining the learning centers with the computer labs provide students with more access to resources, science models, etc.
	Tutors are now available on each campus. The Richmond campus has one Reading/Writing tutor and one Math. Wharton has one tutor for Reading/Writing and Sugar Land has one tutor that is well versed in both Reading/Writing and Math. A part- time faulty member also provides weekly tutoring in business math and accounting on the Sugar Land campus. The search continues for two additional math tutors. The TRiO staff work independently and collaborative with Academic Advising to provide eligible students with advising and course selection, FAFSA assistance, financial literacy, academic support, and graduation assistance. Most first generation students qualify for the TRiO program. The grant is funded to serve 144 students; however, there are currently 187 students in the fall 2022 cohort. The TRiO Annual Performance Report process will begin soon. The report takes approximately two weeks to complete.
13.	
14.	Division Chair Highlights David Kucera gave a brief update on the Technology and Business Division. A new Level I Certificate, Payroll Specialist, has been approved by CIR and will be offered fall 2023. Teach-out plans are currently in progress for Game Development Level II Certificate, Computer Simulation & Game Development AAS degree, and Digital Media Level I Certificate and AAS degree.
	New department, Information Technology & Networking, effective fall 2022. Hiring

process underway for a Department Head and faculty.
Engineering Design and Electronics Engineering departments are developing curriculum
for new Level I certificates and, if approved, will be offered fall 2024.
Electronics Engineering students recently toured FW Murphey Production Controls in
Rosenberg, TX. Schlumberger Technology Corp. and Tidal Power Services have also
expressed an interest in site tours and/or presentations.
Early Childhood program moved from the Richmond campus to Wharton. Sandra
McCarstle, new Early Childhood Program Director, is gathering data, visiting sites, and
setting up an early childhood lab in the Peace building.
Paralegal Studies site visit has been re-scheduled for April.

Academic Affairs Meeting (AEL Report Fall 2022)

- 1) As of today, Adult Education and Literacy (AEL) has enrolled almost 600 students in the following counties (WCJC service areas and assigned counties by Houston Galveston Area Council)
 - Austin County (in-person & remote day and evening classes)
 - Colorado County (remote day and evening classes)
 - Fort Bend County (in-person and remote classes)
 - Matagorda County (remote day and evening classes; in-person classes resume in Spring 2023)
 - Waller County (remote day and evening classes)
 - Wharton County (remote day and evening classes)
- The following Career Pathway programs or Integrated Education and Training (IET) programs are offered at no cost for Level 1 certificate programs and at low cost for the CE programs (90% of tuition is paid by AEL):
 - Business Office Technology
 - Early Childhood
 - Computer Science
 - Medical Assistant (MA)
 - Phlebotomy
 - Certified Nurse Aide
 - Billing and Coding Specialist
 - Pharmacy Technician

- 3) In addition to FREE English as a Second Language (ESL) and High School Equivalency (HSE)/GED program, AEL offers FREE TSI Math and Reading & Language prep courses to WCJC students. These courses are currently offered inperson at the Richmond campus. The plan is to expand these courses to other WCJC campuses in the spring and fall 2023.
- 4) AEL department got audited by the HGAC Quality Assurance Regional Monitoring Team in 21-22 program year. The audit resulted in %100 satisfaction with no findings. WCJC AEL program was the only provider with no finding in the Houston-Galveston consortium (15 providers).
- 5) In fall 2023, AEL plans to expand free services to provide a transition or bridge program to WCJC students who need more academic skills to be successful in academic courses.
- 6) AEL department has been expanded by adding a full-time Admissions and Registration Specialist at the Richmond campus to serve students more efficiently. The title for the full-time Career Navigator position changed to Career Advisor to provide more academic support to the career pathways students. The title for the full-time Testing Technician position changed to Testing Specialist to provide more technical support and to improve the testing process.

Carl D. Perkins Academic Affairs Meeting November 21, 2022

The Carl D. Perkins grant is focused on improving the academic and technical achievement of Career and Technical Education (CTE) students. Funds are allocated to Wharton County Junior College for instructional equipment, instructional resources, and student services assistance.

Vocational Support Services -

Students majoring in an Associate of Applied Science Degree or one year certificate as listed in the WCJC course catalog may be eligible for financial support. Funds are used to support or reduce out of pocket expenses for CTE students who have monetary challenges.

Who is eligible for Perkins Vocation Support Services? To be considered, students must identify with one of the following categories:

- Disabled: physical, academic, or mental disability documentation must be on file with the Office of Disability Services
- Economically Disadvantaged: also receives Pell Grant, WIA, AFDC, food stamps, Texas Public Education Grant, or proof of income below the poverty level
- ESL (English as a second language)
- Homeless individuals
- Nontraditional field of study
- Out-of-workforce individuals
- Single parent or single pregnant woman
- Youth who are in, or have aged out of, the foster care system
- Youth with a parent who is a member of the armed forces and is on active duty

Vocational Support Services Offered:

- Tech Connect Laptop and Webcam Rental Service
 - o 10 ACER Laptops and 10 LogiTech Webcams available for semester rental
- Childcare Reimbursement
 - o \$10 per day
- Transportation Reimbursement
 - .10 per mile, maximum reimbursement of \$100
- Vocational Advising
 - Coordinator of Vocational Support Services works closely with Title V and Academic Advisors to support student success
