#### FEBRUARY 2013

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#### AFTER SCHOOLTUTORING AND HOMEWORK HELF

We now offer after school homework help **three** nights a week from 3:45—5:45. The afterschool bus will transport students home on two of those nights—Monday and Wednesdays. Students who are staying for after-school tutoring and are riding the bus are expected to stay in the classroom the entire time. Students who are walking, being picked up, or driving themselves may leave when they are finished working. **Students may not leave the campus and return later.** Students are given a 15 minute break and snack about 4:30. There is no cost for this snack.

No student will be allowed to ride the activity bus if they are not in an after school program or a sport.

We will tell the bus drivers to transport the student home, but a referral will be written, followed by consequences.

Students are required to sign in and out. If you are assuming your child is coming to after-school, you may call the school the following day to check on attendance. Many students could benefit from this extra help, so encourage your students to attend if they need the extra help.

Additionally, the computer lab is open every night between 3:30 and 4:15 Monday—Friday for student use. This time is intended for school related research and typing of reports and papers.



#### PROFICIENCY-BASED LEARNING

Three Rivers School District has made a professional development commitment which has involved grant -based support, teachers' personal and professional investment and Professional Learning Communities beginning to adopt a Proficiency-Based approach to most of our core subjects. This change is the result of national and state guidelines giving more-explicit (and accountable) standards of content material and performance level through both performance and assessments. If your student is in one of those courses, it would be worth the time to review the syllabus from those courses, as well as the grading guidelines which may be reflected in your students' Progress Report grades.

#### In short, the shift involves the following key components:


- Homework/Practice Work is given to help students through the exploration and acquisition phase of their learning. As they approach proficiency in a given standard, additional opportunities are provided for those who need more practice to be ready for the standard's assessment opportunities. Generally, this work comprises a smaller percentage of a student's grade and is graded on completion/ participation.
- 2. Assessments are given as the larger portion of the student's grades. There are multiple chances to pass the standard and generally the grade is a reflection of either a composite score of the assessment efforts (a blend) or as the higher score. Assessments may take the form of speeches, projects, activities or traditional exams.
- 3. Grades may change quickly/dramatically based upon the number of assessments the course has covered to date and the makeup-retake opportunities the student has taken advantage of.

If you student is being assessed based on proficiency in one or more of their classes, your student's teachers will explain this is greater detail at the conference.

**Skills** as a graduation requirement. Students must earn 27 credits. The essential skills are process skills that cross academic disciplines and are embedded in the content standards. The skills are not content specific and can be applied in a variety of courses, subjects, and settings.

Specific Essential Skills graduation requirements are based on the year the student first enrolled in Grade 9, as shown below:

- Read and comprehend a variety of text
- Write clearly and accurately

#### CLASS OR 2014 and Beyond (Enrolled in Grade 9 in 2010-11 and beyond)

- Read and comprehend a variety of text
- Write clearly and accurately;
- Apply mathematics in a variety of settings

The remaining **Essential Skills** will be phased-in over subsequent years, timeline to be determined.

- Demonstrate civic and community engagement
- Demonstrate global literacy
- Listen actively and speak clearly and coherently
- Think critically and analytically
- Demonstrate personal management and teamwork skills

Through our ASPIRE program, students and parents can receive one-on-one mentoring on college and technical school options, admissions, financial aid and scholarships. ASPIRE is open to all students. #### **FAFSA**

Register for your FAFSA pin number at:

www.pin.ed.gov and have your student ALSO register for a pin of his/her own. Plan to submit your FAFSA in the first week or two of January, the sooner you complete the form, the sooner the four year colleges will be able to send you their financial aid offer. The online application to complete the FAFSA is: www.fafsa.ed.gov

Round 2 of Senior Project Presentations will be held on February 27th, from 4:00—5:45 PM.

#### **IVHS Scholarship Packet**

Go through the IVHS Scholarship Packet found at: <u>jocoeducationfund.com</u>. Read all of the instructions on the site, and decide which scholarships you want to apply for. You will need:

Two letters of recommendation (one must be a community member, friend of family, church, etc.), two check off recommendation forms from teachers, income verification form, transcript release form, and responses to four essay prompts (about 180 words max each essay prompt).

 Explain your career aspirations and your educational plan to meet these goals.

- 2) Describe a significant change or experience that has occurred in your life. How did you respond, and what did you learn about yourself?
- Describe a personal accomplishment and the strengths and skills you used to achieve it.
- Explain how you have helped your family or made your community a better place to live. Please provide specific examples.

Note: these same essays are used when applying to OSAC scholarships\*

See jocoeducationfund.com for complete instructions and all forms. Seniors, remember you can use the same letters of recommendation that were used in your Senior Forum class.

Apply for the Oregon Student Assistance Commission Scholarships (OSAC): Complete the application at www.OregonStudentAid.gov.

#### Deadline is March 1, 2013

\* Polish up OSAC essays, and let the reader know who you are (tell your story!). Have several people proofread your essays.

#### Apply to Colleges

Don't forget to get your applications for admissions and scholarships in by school's deadlines. Many early admission dates were in November, and many more dates are set for Feb. 1 or Feb. 15. Check the admission deadlines at the colleges that you are interested in. If you qualify for free or reduced lunch, you may qualify for a deferral of application fees. See Ms. Thornhill in the Counseling Center.

Last, but not least, encourage your student to keep his/her grades and courses challenging all through to the end of the year. Student's end of the year transcripts will be going to their colleges of choice, and they could lose out on admission/aid

packages if they let grades/coursework slip too far. U of O no longer accepts any students who graduate early just to get out of finishing the school year. Sticking it out and finishing strong is very much in your student's best interest if a four year school is in the plans.

#### **ASVAB**

ASVAB aptitude test will be administered at IVHS on February 12th, beginning at 8:50 AM. Students who are interested in learning about career options, and students interested in military careers should sign up to take the exam. Contact Ms. Tucker in Counseling if you would like your son/daughter to take this exam.

#### SAT

Students planning on going to universities need to register to take the SAT exams. Go to www.Collegeboard.org to register for an upcoming exam. IVHS will proctor the SATs on May 4th. The deadline to register for the May exam date is April 5th. It is recommended that Juniors take the exam in the spring, and once again as Seniors in the fall.



RCC Scholarship: If your student has a GPA of 3.5 or above, he/she should apply for the Rogue Ambassador Program at Rogue Community College. Students will need to complete the RCC placement test and submit the application at www.roguecc.edu/Rogueambassadors.

This program gives students a 50% break in their first year at RCC, and if they maintain a 3.5 grade point, their second year of college is ENTIRELY FREE. There is a limit to the number of students who will be in this program, so if your child is eligible, the **deadline to apply is** Feb. 25, 2013.





#### SYNREVOICE—AUTOMATED VOICE MESSAGING

After receiving an automated call concerning your student's absences from our new phone messaging system, Synervoice, please call the school the next morning to clear your student's absences. The number is 541-592-2116; ask for the attendance office. It is very important for you and your

student to have these absences cleared. Students end up doing lunch detentions for un-cleared absences.

We will sometimes use Synervoice to send out important messages about school closures and school events. When you get a

call from the school using Synervoice, it is important that you say "hello" as this triggers the message. If you have voicemail, it will leave a message. If you have email registered with the school, we will often send emails as well.







#### PROGRAM TO HELP HOMELESS STUDENTS AND FAMILIES

Dear Parents/Guardians,

I am Barbara Gamble, the Family Advocate for Illinois Valley High School. The purpose of the Family Advocate is to help students overcome barriers to success. I will help students acquire jackets, clothes, school supplies, hygiene supplies, glasses, dental appointments, haircuts, etc. I will also advocate for students: For example, helping them get testing or counseling, acquiring birth certificates, arranging for extra tutoring and other related services.

In addition, there is a federal law called the **McKinney-Vento** which gives additional assistance to students that meet the federal definitions of "homeless" these include:

- Living in a home with no heat or running water
- Staying with friends or other relatives due to economic hardships or loss of housing
- Fleeing a domestic violence situation
- Living in a car, van, bus, tent or other non-permanent structure

Living in one of the above situations may also entitle a student to:

- Transportation to their home school should homelessness require a move
- Immediate enrollment, even if there are issues, such as not having in hand:
- O A birth certificate(s) for the child (ren)
- O Immunization forms

# ATTIENDANCE PROCEDURE FOR AN ABSENCE

- $\Rightarrow$   $\square$  When your child is absent, please call the school prior to the end of the school day. If this is not possible, send a note with your child the day they return to school.
- ⇒ All absences must be cleared within three days of your child returning to school. Otherwise the absence will become unexcused. It is essential that you take care of this.
- ⇒ It is the student's responsibility to ask teachers for missed work. For work that is missed for excused, school related or verified absences you will be allowed **two days** for each day absent in which to make up the work assigned during the absence.
- ⇒ For Extended absences (three or more days), where the illness or injury is of such a nature that students are able to do their homework, homework requests will be honored. The parents/guardians should contact the school office to arrange to periodically pick up homework assignments. Please allow at least one school day for the homework to be turned in by your students teachers.
- ⇒ For a Contracted Absence (prearranged), pick up a "Contracted Absence Form" from the main office. You will need to present a note to the office verifying the absence prior to receiving the form. It is the students responsibility to take the form to all of the teachers for approval and assignments. The student must return the completed form to the office for administrative approval You can then take some of your schoolwork with you and do it before you return.

# RESOURCES FOR STRUGGLING STUDENTS AT IVHS

#### FOR STUDENTS WITH FAILING GRADES IN CORE CLASSES

If your student received a failing grade in core classes (math, language arts, social studies, health, and science), he or she has the option of repeating that class in the regular setting or retrieving the credit in credit make up. For students who have failed multiple classes over time, the only way for them to graduate with their class is to do credit make up. Credit make up is available:

Monday - Friday from 8:15 - 8:45 AM

Monday - Friday from 3:45 - 5:00 PM

Please contact the school to get your student registered into one (or both) of these times. Contact Patrice Tucker in counseling for assistance with this.

There will be afterschool bussing Monday through Thursday. The bus will leave the high school at 5:45 PM. Students who need to ride the bus and who are doing credit make-up may move into Homework Help from 5:00–5:30.

#### HOMEWORK HELP

Afterschool homework help will be available on Monday's, Tuesday's and Thursday's from 3:45—5:30 with bussing available Monday through Thursday evenings. Students can do their homework during this time with assistance from a teacher.

#### COMPUTER LAB

The computer lab is available Monday – Friday before school from 8:15 - 8:45 AM and afterschool from 3:45—4:15 PM. The lab can be used to do internet research, use Google Docs or Moodles to communicate with teachers, or to type reports and other assignments. Students may not use the lab for playing computer games, downloading music, or doing social networking.

#### **ADVOCATES**

We have three staff members who will help your students if they are struggling. They can set them up on a daily or weekly check-in and can communicate with you concerning their progress.

The Director of Transportation will recommend a course of action (delay the start of school(s), close school(s), or keep school(s) open) to the Superintendent.


Utilizing the new *Synrevoice* automated calling system, all staff, parents, substitute teachers and media will be notified of the decision. The calling system sends messages both by e-mails and telephone calls (these calls could begin as early as 5:30 AM).

Important note about the calling system: It is voice activated, so the system must hear a voice when calling. This can be a live person answering the phone, your voice mail, or an answering machine. But it will not activate simply upon lifting the receiver on the phone and just listening without saying anything.

This is an automated system; an attempt to call back the identified number will not be successful. Please take the time to listen to any message left in its entirety.

All closures and/or delays will also be posted on our District website.

- If a two-hour delay is announced in a particular school or area, then school will start two hours later than the regularly scheduled time. All bus pick-up times will be two hours later than normal. School will conclude at its regular time.
- You are also advised to tune in to radio stations KAJO, KLDR, KRWQ and KBOY and TV stations KOBI (5), KDRV (12) and KTVL (10) for updates and in the event you don't have phone or internet service.
- Athletic activities, school events and other scheduled field trips could be canceled if inclement weather is a concern.
- Sometimes weather conditions leave some roads blocked or unsafe to travel, but school is still being held. Under these circumstances "straight line routes" will be run. Please refer to the "Straight Line Bus Route" attachment for your attendance area for this information.
- If you live on one of the roads the buses cannot travel, you may bring your student to the nearest intersection of the main road traveled. This will also be the stop for the afternoon drop off.

Dear Illinois Valley High School parent(s)/guardian(s):

The safety of students at Illinois Valley High School is my most sacred obligation to them and to their families. Because the state of Oregon continues to have a serious economic challenge, many services previously available to students are no longer provided. Some examples of this are the declining use of resource officers, alcohol/drug prevention programs, support of local law enforcement, and even tobacco cessation classes.

Like many other school systems across the state, The Three Rivers School District and Illinois Valley High School will implement unannounced, periodic use of specially trained drug detection dogs this school year. We will do this in a manner as described in school district policy JFG AR. We will partner with local law enforcement staff to detect the presence of drugs in school hallways, lockers, and parking lots. All students will remain in their classes during a search. Searches will be conducted quietly and quickly (usually within an hour). Students whose cars, lockers, coats, lunch bags, etc. are found to contain drugs or the residual odors of drugs will be questioned by school administration and may receive consequences per school policy and the law.

Please understand that the goal of this initiative is to send a powerful message that we do not accept the presence of drugs and alcohol at Illinois Valley High School. Our ultimate intention is to maintain the integrity of our educational process and keep our students safe. The regular use of alcohol and/or other drugs is one of the most common obstacles to a teen being able to reach their full academic, social, and emotional potential.

As a parent, please partner with us to help curb adolescent drug use by talking often with your son/daughter about the dangers of use and abuse. You in your role as the parent in your home are the greatest influence on your son/daughter's use of alcohol and/or other drugs. This being said, we as a school system want to partner with you to lead and support a community wide effort to educate and positively impact the students of the Illinois Valley.
