<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Supt./cabinet walked through building to strategize solutions to over-crowding planning for 09-10 • Larger than expected kindergarten enrollment with rollout of full day kindergarten with addition of five teachers, certified TAs to accommodate large classes • Determination made need 6 kindergarten classes 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Storage space converted to classroom/office space • Planning for 2010-11 need available space for the 6th K and 5th first grade classroom (if needed) • Submitted ARRA grant for two secured entrances which was rejected—only portion can be used based on special education population to total school population (18%) ADA accessible; washrooms at Holmes/Brooks to better meet student needs was approved • Continued to look for solutions to Lincoln overcrowding • Considerations: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Moving students to Irving/Longfellow (Longfellow is full and parents want neighborhood school) ○ Redrawing boundaries (huge process with ripple effect) ○ Converting media center (recently renovated, substantially decrease size of center, architect said not reasonable solution because of loss of egress) • Option identified: resubmitted ARRA grant with addition to Lincoln for special education students: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Additional classrooms at Lincoln ○ Holmes/Brooks expansion of ADA washrooms to better meet student needs ○ 3/19 received email ARRA approval ○ 3/22—received letter ARRA approval • 2 mobiles needed to accommodate potential 6th Kindergarten and to give proper space to those programs moved this year—GTD • April 7 on Lincoln PTO agenda • April 12 on FAC agenda • April 13 on board agenda 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Portables—set up as soon as school is out; <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ○ Set up=\$17,000 ○ Monthly rental 2 X \$850=\$1,700 ○ Furniture=\$15-20,000 • Can work on project during summer and during year without disruption • Create secured entrance; 	<p>Move into new classrooms</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Keep special education students within school area • Good use off one time revenue source • State of art classrooms designed for needs of special education students • Ease overcrowding • Provides secured entrance for enhanced safety • Collaborate with principal/central office
